3. <u>Draft NCTC Legislative Platform</u> Resolution 24-01

Kiana Valentine and Chris Lee of Politico Group gave a presentation on the Draft NCTC Legislative Platform. The platform contains the policy principles that will guide NCTC's advocacy on state legislation, budget issues, policy and regulations. The platform focuses on five key legislative priority areas, including supporting safe multimodal travel for Nevada County communities; planning land use, fire safety and emergency response; public transportation operations and funding; transportation, demand management and broadband; and general government flexibility.

These foundational principles will be updated at the start of each new legislative session and will be used to actively engage with our state representatives to advance NCTC's project priorities, and help achieve overall advocacy goals. The legislative platform also streamlines the ability of NCTC staff to respond effectively to immediate action on pressing legislation, budget policy or regulatory issues throughout the year.

4. <u>Congestion Mitigation Air Quality/Carbon Reduction Program Projects Approval</u> Resolution 24-02

NCTC Deputy Executive Director Aaron Hoyt gave a presentation on the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) program and the Carbon Reduction Program (CRP). Both of these federal programs target air quality improvements, and NCTC manages these programs through a multi-year approach.

CMAQ can only be used in areas that do not meet the national ambient air quality standards for either ozone, carbon monoxide, or particulate matter. Western Nevada County was designated non-attainment in June 2004. Eligible projects include active transportation, pedestrian sidewalks, bike trails, roundabouts, improvements that reduce traffic congestion and improve traffic flow, travel demand management such as vanpooling, and encouraging employer trip reduction programs.

The CRP program was approved through the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, a 2021 Federal bill that is intended to fund reduction of carbon dioxide through road and highway sources. This is the first apportionment of funding we've received for CRP of a total of approximately \$180,000 going forward for the next four years, for a total of five years' worth of funding. The continuation of this program beyond these five years will be dependent on future federal legislation to either extend the program or roll it into the next federal transportation bill.

The call for projects resulted in about \$857,000 in additional funding requests for cost increases of previously approved projects, along with almost \$2 million of new requests for projects, which would result in a shortfall in the current fiscal year. In addition, the longer projects are delayed, the more funding ends up going to cost increases over time.

In light of this, the recommendation is to secure a small loan with Tehama County Transportation Commission for \$411,569 in order to advance the projects that are being recommended for Fiscal Year 2023/24. The advantage to us is the ability to deliver these projects without pushing out in the future and potentially seeing greater cost increases, and it works well with our timing of other projects coming up in the future.

The projects proposed for CMAQ funding include the McCourtney Road Active Transportation Connection Project – Construction Phase, Ridge Road Active Transportation Project – Preliminary Engineering Phase, Boulder Street Sidewalk Project – Construction Phase, Railroad Avenue Sidewalk Project – Construction Phase, Searles Avenue Sidewalk Project – Construction Phase, Combie Road Multi-Purpose Trail – Construction Phase, and Rough and Ready Highway Roundabout & Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities on Ridge Road and Adams Avenue – Preliminary Engineering and Right-of-Way Phase.

For the Carbon Reduction Program funding, the Truckee Vanpool Pilot program is a collaboration with the Washoe County Regional Transportation Commission, and will help residents living in the Reno area to participate in the Vanpool program, making it easier for employees to get to employer destinations in Truckee.

There was a request for signal signage at the proposed roundabouts to avoid the traffic backup that often happens when drivers do not use signals when entering and exiting the roundabout.

Robin VanValkenburgh, the Transit Services Manager for Nevada County, addressed the idea of a thirty-minute shuttle service between Nevada City and Grass Valley, saying they have the funding and approval for implementing that service, but they would need the drivers in order to do it. He said if implemented, it would be another option for mitigating some of the parking and congestion issues in those areas.

6. <u>Executive Director's Report</u>

Executive Director Mike Woodman gave an overview of his report. The California Transportation Commission approved the staff recommendation for the Local Transportation Climate Adaptation Program Grant Funding Awards. Included in that approval was NCTC's \$35 million request for the State Route 49 Grass Valley Wildfire Evacuation Route Project. The approved \$35 million funding would be combined with another \$66.5 million of State Highway Operations Protection Program funding provided through Caltrans District 3, allowing us to address the whole segment between Ponderosa Pines Way and Wolf Road/Combie Road to provide those critical improvements.

NCTC staff in coordination with the California Transportation Commission hosted an Active Transportation Program branch workshop to look at the upcoming Active Transportation Cycle, and allow opportunities for the jurisdictions to interact with the CTC on potential projects to see how they can make their projects more competitive in the upcoming cycle. NCTC staff coordinated with CTC staff and the local jurisdictions to do two site visits, looking at the Rough and Ready/Adams Avenue/Ridge Road Accessibility Improvement project, and toured the Wolf Creek Trail Accessibility Connectivity project for the expansion of the Wolf Creek Trail.

In January, NCTC staff, working with Robin VanValkenburgh and Nevada County Transit Services, submitted a grant application for the FY 2024/25 Caltrans Strategic Partnership Transit Planning Grant Program to fund a Comprehensive Operational Analysis, which will look at how existing services are delivered, and possible alternative delivery methods such as micro transit that may be more cost effective and efficient in the western side of the county. Grant awards will be released in the summer of 2024.

7. <u>Project Status Reports</u>

A. Caltrans Project Report: Sam Vandell, Caltrans District 3 Project Manager, Nevada County.

Caltrans District 3 Project Manager Sam Vandell reviewed the November Caltrans Project Status Report. On Interstate 80, the slope stabilization project near Truckee, the roadway rehab project near Truckee from the Donner Park overcrossing to Trout Creek undercrossing, and the rockfall protection projects in Nevada and Sierra Counties are all complete.

There was a discussion on the perception that the improvements that were made on State Route 20 in Yuba County have caused an increase in traffic volumes. The improvements were essentially alignment and safety corrections rather than adding capacity to the roadway. Commute traffic tends to be higher during certain times of the day in the morning and afternoon. Caltrans is planning to look at addressing the section of Highway 20 between Grass Valley and Penn Valley to see what potential safety measures could be incorporated to improve safety on the corridor at that location.

There was a request to place merge arrows on Highway 49 southbound at the on and off ramps at the Wolf Road/Combie Road intersection, and to add traffic cameras at Higgins Corner and at the junction of Highways 49 and 80 in Auburn to get more accurate reports of the traffic conditions in those areas.

Appreciation was given for the improvements done on Highway 20 in the Omega project, the road feels very smooth and safe after the completion of the work.

8. <u>Election of Officers</u>

It is the Commission's policy to elect a chair and vice chair at the first meeting of the year. Chair Scofield opened the floor for nominations for the chair and vice chair for 2024.

Commissioner Scofield was nominated to remain Chair of the Commission, and Tom Ivy was nominated to remain Vice Chair of the Commission. The motions passed with a unanimous vote of the commissioners present.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 24-03 Revised Findings of Apportionment for FY 2023/24, and Resolution 24-04 Preliminary Findings of Apportionment for FY 2024/25.

BACKGROUND: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Preliminary Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants.

The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

California Code of Regulations Section 6655.5 provides that "the transportation planning agency may, at any time before the close of the fiscal year, issue a revised determination of apportionment based on a revised or updated estimate furnished by the county auditor pursuant to Section 6620."

The attached letter from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller to NCTC, dated January 31, 2024, provided the estimate of revenue expected to be received in FY 2023/24 (see Resolution 24-03), and an estimate of the amount of revenue available for allocation in FY 2024/25 (see Resolution 24-04). This information has been sent to NCTC claimants, to assist them in their budgeting process.

RECOMMENDATION: Approve Resolution 24-05 adopting the revised Transportation Development Act allocations to Nevada County for FY 2023/24 transit/paratransit operations.

BACKGROUND: On July 19, 2023, the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) approved Resolution 23-12, allocating the amounts eligible to be claimed from State Transit Assistance Funding (STA) and Local Transportation Funding (LTF) to Nevada County for FY 2023/24 transit operations. Subsequently, on January 31, 2024, the Nevada County Auditor/Controller pursuant to California Code of Regulations (CCR) section 6620 issued a revised estimate of LTF funds available for FY 2023/24. The revised estimate forecasted a reduction in the amount of LTF funding available for FY 2023/24. Additionally, on August 1, 2023, State Controller's Office revised the estimated STA revenue under Public Utilities Code (PUC) Section 99314 for FY 2023/24.

NCTC in accordance with CCR 6655.5 has issued a revised determination of LTF apportionments (Resolution 24-03) and has prepared the attached revision (Resolution 24-05) to the previous FY 2023/24 Transportation Development Act allocation of LTF/STA funding for transit/paratransit operations to account for the reduction of projected LTF revenue and slight increase in STA revenue to ensure that Nevada County does not exceed its maximum TDA eligibility.

REVISION OF TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ACT ALLOCATIONS TO NEVADA COUNTY FOR TRANSIT/PARATRANSIT OPERATIONS DURING FISCAL YEAR 2023/24

WHEREAS, Nevada County received allocations of STA and LTF on July 19, 2023 (Resolution 23-12), as shown in **Exhibit 1** below; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CCR section 6620 the Nevada County Auditor/Controller on January 31, 2024, has furnished a revised estimate of LTF funds to be available for FY 2023/24; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to CCR section 6655.5 the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) has issued a revised determination of apportionments (Resolution 24-03); and

WHEREAS, the August 1, 2023 STA revised estimated revenue under Public Utilities Code (PUC) Section 99314 for FY 2023/24 available for allocation to Nevada County is \$31,211; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County meets the qualifying criteria set forth in PUC Section 99314.6(a)(1)(B); and

WHEREAS, Nevada County is eligible to receive an allocation of STA funds under PUC Section 99313 in the amount of \$0, for a total STA allocation of \$31,211; and

WHEREAS, under PUC Article 4.5, Section 99275(a), Nevada County is authorized to claim LTF for CTS; and

WHEREAS, the Revised Findings of Apportionment, Resolution 24-03 estimates that \$161,639 of LTF for CTS is available for FY 2023/24 and Nevada County's bid target amount \$134,877; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County has requested an allocation from the FY 2023/24 CTS apportionment of LTF to support transit/paratransit operations; and

WHEREAS, NCTC has reviewed the claim for allocation of LTF for CTS under PUC Section 99275.5; and

WHEREAS, PUC Section 6681 states that CTS claims for operating costs are eligible under Article 4.5 of the Transportation Development Act (TDA); and

WHEREAS, NCTC has reviewed the Nevada County claim for allocation of LTF for CTS and has made the following required findings under PUC Section 99275.5:

- 1. The proposed Community Transit Service is responding to a need currently not being met in the community of the claimant.
- 2. The service shall be integrated with existing transit services, as appropriate.

- 3. The claimant has prepared an estimate of revenues, operating costs, and patronage.
- 4. The claimant is in compliance with fare recovery ratio set forth in PUC section 99268.4.
- 5. The claimant is in compliance with PUC sections 99155 and 99155.5; and

WHEREAS, the Revised Findings of Apportionment, Resolution 24-03 estimates that for FY 2023/24 there is \$2,049,475 of LTF available for allocation to Nevada County under PUC Section 99260(a) and 99400(c)(d)(e); and

WHEREAS, as of June 30, 2023, there are estimated funds remaining from prior year LTF apportionments in the amount of \$1,255,702.42; however, Nevada County has requested that NCTC hold \$174,507 to fully fund the six-month operating reserve in the amount of \$2,842,116. This leaves an LTF Carryover Balance available to allocate of \$1,081,195.42; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County has requested an allocation of \$1,963,805.54 of their FY 2023/24 LTF apportionment; an additional allocation of \$911,436.46 from the LTF Carryover Balance will make a total LTF allocation for FY 2023/24 of \$2,875,242; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the California Code of Regulations Section 6649, the sum of the claimant's allocations from LTF and from the STA Fund cannot exceed the claimant's Maximum Transportation Development Act (TDA) Eligibility for FY 2023/24; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County Transportation Commission has determined that Nevada County's Maximum TDA Eligibility for transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24 is \$3,554,506; and

WHEREAS, the Nevada County combined total LTF and STA claim for FY 2023/24 is \$3,041,330; and

WHEREAS, the revised LTF apportionment to the City of Grass Valley is \$411,273, and the revised apportionment to the City of Nevada City is \$101,903; these amounts combined with the allocations to Nevada County will provide a total of \$3,554,506 for FY 2023/24, which equals the Maximum TDA Eligibility for Nevada County; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expenditures are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the level of passenger farebox recovery is sufficient to enable the operator or transit service claimant to meet the fare revenue requirements of PUC Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.4, 99268.5, and 99268.9, as they may be applicable to the claimant; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County is making full use of federal funds available; and

WHEREAS, priority consideration has been given to claims to offset reductions in federal operating assistance and the unanticipated increase in the cost of fuel, to enhance existing public

transportation services, and to meet high-priority regional, countywide, or areawide public transportation needs; and

WHEREAS, Nevada County has made reasonable efforts to implement productivity improvements recommended pursuant to PUC Section 99244; and

WHEREAS, PUC Section 99251 states: "No claim submitted by an operator pursuant to this chapter shall be approved unless it is accompanied by a certification completed within the last 13 months from the Department of the California Highway Patrol indicating that the operator is in compliance with Section 1808.1 of the Vehicle Code."

WHEREAS, NCTC policy regarding utilization of State Transit Assistance (STA) funds was adopted on March 20, 2019 in Resolution 19-06 (the "Policy"), which reads as follows:

"Transit agencies will utilize LTF apportionments as the first source of funding for existing services or service expansions. If an agency's apportionment of LTF is not sufficient to fund continuation of existing transit services, capital needs, or service expansions identified in an approved transit development plan, the agency may submit a claim for STA. Claims for STA funds by agencies holding unused allocations or unclaimed balances of LTF from prior years will not be considered."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that Nevada County is allocated \$31,211 of STA 99314 funds as authorized by California Code of Regulations (CCR) 6730(a) and 6731(b) for support of transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Nevada County is allocated \$134,877 of LTF for CTS as authorized by PUC Section 99275(a) to support transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Nevada County is allocated \$2,875,242 of LTF as authorized under PUC Section 99260(a) and 99400(c)(d)(e) for transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24.

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee is eligible to receive an allocation of STA funds under PUC Section 99313 in the amount of \$305,168, for a total STA allocation of \$332,489 to be used for transit and paratransit operations under PUC Section 6731(b); and

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee meets the STA qualifying criteria set forth in PUC Section 99314.6(a)(1)(B); and

WHEREAS, under PUC Article 4.5, Section 99275(a), Truckee is authorized to claim LTF for Community Transit Services (CTS); and

WHEREAS, the Revised Findings of Apportionment for FY 2023/24 Resolution 24-03 estimates that \$161,639 of LTF has been designated for CTS purposes, and the Town of Truckee's bid target is \$26,762; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee has a revised allocation of \$26,762 from the FY 2023/24 CTS apportionment of LTF to support transit/paratransit operations; and

WHEREAS, NCTC has reviewed the claim for allocation of LTF for CTS under PUC Section 99275.5; and

WHEREAS, PUC Section 6681 states that CTS claims for operating costs are eligible under Article 4.5 of the Transportation Development Act (TDA); and

WHEREAS, NCTC has reviewed the Town of Truckee claim for allocation of LTF for CTS and has made the following required findings under PUC Section 99275.5:

- 1. The proposed community transit service is responding to a need currently not being met in the community of the claimant.
- 2. The service shall be integrated with existing transit services, as appropriate.

- 3. The claimant has prepared an estimate of revenues, operating costs, and patronage.
- 4. The claimant is in compliance with fare recovery ratios.
- 5. The claimant is in compliance with Sections 99155 and 99155.5 of the Public Utilities Code; and

WHEREAS, the Revised Findings of Apportionment for FY 2023/24, Resolution 24-03, estimates that for FY 2023/24 there is \$508,481 of LTF available for allocation to the Town of Truckee under PUC Section 99400(c)(d)(e) for transit and paratransit purposes; and

WHEREAS, as of June 30, 2023, there are estimated funds remaining from prior year LTF apportionments in the amount of \$887,943.46; however, the Town of Truckee has requested that NCTC hold \$887,765 to fully fund the six-month operating reserve. This leaves an LTF Carryover Balance available to allocate of \$178; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee has a revised allocation of \$508,481 of their FY 2023/24 LTF apportionment and \$178 of LTF Carryover Balance, totaling \$508,659; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with the California Code of Regulations Section 6649, the sum of the claimant's allocations from LTF and from the STA Fund cannot exceed the claimant's Maximum Transportation Development Act (TDA) Eligibility for FY 2023/24; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee Director of Administrative Services has determined that the Town of Truckee is eligible to receive \$867,910 in TDA funds for transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24; and

WHEREAS, the proposed expenditures are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan; and

WHEREAS, the level of passenger fares and charges is sufficient to enable the operator or transit service claimant to meet the fare revenue requirements of PUC Sections 99268.2, 99268.3, 99268.4, 99268.5, and 99268.9, as they may be applicable to the claimant; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Truckee is making full use of federal funds available; and

WHEREAS, priority consideration has been given to claims to offset reductions in federal operating assistance and the unanticipated increase in the cost of fuel, to enhance existing public transportation services, and to meet high priority regional, countywide, or area wide public transportation needs; and

WHEREAS, Town of Truckee has made reasonable efforts to implement productivity improvements recommended pursuant to PUC Section 99244; and

WHEREAS, PUC Section 99251 states: "No claim submitted by an operator pursuant to this chapter shall be approved unless it is accompanied by a certification completed within the last 13 months from the Department of the California Highway Patrol indicating that the operator is in compliance with Section 1808.1 of the Vehicle Code."

WHEREAS, NCTC policy regarding utilization of State Transit Assistance (STA) funds was adopted on March 20, 2019 in Resolution 19-06 (the "Policy"), which reads as follows:

Resolution 24-08 Page 3 of 3

"Transit agencies will utilize LTF apportionments as the first source of funding for existing services or service expansions. If an agency's apportionment of LTF is not sufficient to fund continuation of existing transit services, capital needs, or service expansions identified in an approved transit development plan, the agency may submit a claim for STA. Claims for STA funds by agencies holding unused allocations or unclaimed balances of LTF from prior years will not be considered."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Truckee is allocated \$332,489 of STA Funds as authorized by TDA 6731(b) for support of transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24. Payment will be made toward the end of the fiscal year as need is verified.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Truckee is allocated \$26,762 of LTF for CTS as authorized by PUC Section 99275(a) to support transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Truckee is allocated \$508,659 of LTF as authorized under PUC Section 99400(c)(d)(e) for transit/paratransit operations during FY 2023/24.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that full payment of these allocations is contingent upon completion of the FY 2022/23 Fiscal Audit. If Unearned Revenue for FY 2022/23 is identified, NCTC may demand repayment, or may deduct the amount from the claimant's FY 2024/25 eligibility. This is in accordance with CCR Section 6649.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that NCTC requires the Town of Truckee to submit reports of transit financial activity in order to receive payment from these allocations. Payments will then be made as monies become available.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Executive Director of the Nevada County Transportation Commission is hereby directed to issue allocation instructions in accordance with this resolution to the Nevada County Auditor-Controller.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 24-09, rescinding the remaining balance of \$14,774.50 of Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds allocated in Resolution 19-11 and reallocate the funds to General Maintenance.

BACKGROUND: On May 15, 2019, NCTC approved Resolution 19-11 allocating \$160,000 of RSTP to the County of Nevada for the Donner Pass Road Improvement Project. All invoices applicable to that allocation have been paid and the project is complete. County of Nevada staff is requesting that the balance of \$14,774.50 be rescinded and reallocated to Countywide General Maintenance. The 2023 Nevada County Capital Improvement Plan General Maintenance defines General Maintenance as pavement repairs, road maintenance, snow removal, and graveling.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) of 2021 reauthorized the Regional Surface Transportation Program. RSTP funds originate from federal excise tax on gasoline and are distributed to counties based on population. Federal RSTP funds are exchanged annually for State Highway Account funds for rural counties with a population less than 200,000, such as Nevada. RSTP funds provide an important funding source for the maintenance, preservation, and to improve the conditions and performance of facilities along the Federal-aid network, bridge and tunnel projects, pedestrian and bicycle infrastructure, and transit capital projects.

Nevada County Department of Public Works staff is scheduled to present the rescission and reallocation of funds to the Nevad County Board of Supervisors for approval on March 26, 2024. NCTC staff recommends rescinding the RTSP balance of \$14,774.50 from the Donner Pass Road Improvement Project and reallocating the funds to General Maintenance contingent on the approval by the Board of Supervisors.

RESOLUTION 24-09 OF THE NEVADA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, this rescission and reallocation is contingent upon receipt of the Board of Supervisors' signed Resolution and a memo from the county.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that NCTC's Executive Director is hereby authorized to execute a RSTP Subrecipient Funding Agreement with County of Nevada and is directed to issue allocation instructions in accordance with this Resolution to the Nevada County Auditor-Controller.

BACKGROUND: On September 21, 2022, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) approved an agreement with DKS Associates for a total sum not to exceed \$125,000. On July 21, 2023, the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF) approved an additional \$25,000 to provide additional funding for the consultant team to conduct additional analysis and assist the RCTF and NCTC in presenting the technical findings and state guidance recommendations to the California State Transportation Agency, Caltrans, Governor's Office of Planning & Research, and California Transportation Commission. Amendment 1 amended the scope of services to include the additional engagement activities and increase the compensation amount by \$25,000.

On January 19, 2024, in response to the significant interest in the study and multiple requests for presentations from regional agencies, the RCTF approved an additional \$50,000 to provide funding for the consultant team to assist the RCTF and NCTC in additional public outreach activities following release of the draft and final report. The cost of the additional consultant work brings the total contract amount to \$200,000. The termination date of this agreement is being extended to June 30, 2025.

Consultant will not perform work, nor be required to perform work, outside those services specified in this Agreement which would result in billings in excess of \$200,000 without the prior written agreement of both parties.
- 3. Except as expressly amended herein, all terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain in full force and effect.

This Amendment 2 to the Agreement between the Nevada County Transportation Commission and DKS Associates is effective March 20, 2024.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 24-11 approving the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program 2023 Nexus Study Update Final Report – 2024 Revision and annual inflationary adjustment for the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF).

BACKGROUND:

The western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) program was established in 2001 through a partnership of Nevada County, Nevada City, Grass Valley, and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). The program provides a mechanism for new development in western Nevada County to pay its fair share towards the cost of construction of the regional system of roads, streets, and highways needed to accommodate forecasted growth in western Nevada County. The RTMF program operates pursuant to the Mitigation Fee Act, also known as California Assembly Bill 1600 (AB 1600) or California Government Code Sections 66000 et seq., which governs impact fees in California.

The RTMF was last updated in July 2023 to meet the requirements of Assembly Bill (AB) 602 that changed the basis for assessing impact fees on residential units. New fee programs are required to calculate a fee imposed on a housing development project proportionally to the square footage of the proposed housing units. The prior basis for assessing fees on housing developments was based on the number of trips a typical housing unit would generate based on the Institute of Traffic Engineers trip generation rates.

The NCTC Commission endorsed the adoption of the 2023 Nexus Study update in July 2023 and each participating agency adopted the Nexus Study and corresponding fees in Fall 2023.

Revisions to the 2023 RTMF Nexus Study

NCTC was notified in February 2024 by the consulting firm that developed the 2023 Nexus Study that a calculational error was identified in the residential fee component of the Nexus Study. NCTC has worked closely with the consultant and the RTMF Technical Advisory Committee (TAC), representing all participating agencies, to understand the error, determine the process to address the issue, and prepare a revision to the 2023 Nexus Study.

In order to calculate the fee for residential categories (e.g., single family, multi-family, mobile home, etc.), several calculations are involved. Two of these calculations resulted in overestimating the effect of residential unit type on trip generation. The first calculation estimates the number of trips that each residential category by size (e.g., small, medium, and large) are anticipated to generate. The second calculation occurs when allocating project costs amongst the various residential use types (fee calculation). Because the fees are attributable to the relative square footage of the residential units, an adjustment for the floor area was made twice in both the calculations when it should have only been applied once for each calculation. This had the effect of shifting the proportion of the fee among residential building types, with single-family dwellings being charged a higher fee than intended and multi-family dwellings, mobile homes, and senior housing being charged less than was intended.

Table 1 below compares the adopted 2022 residential fee (prior to AB 602), the Adopted fee (AB 602 compliant), and the Revised 2024 Fee. The Revised 2024 Fee results in the following:

- Reduces single family residential fees across all size categories in comparison to the 2022 and 2023 adopted fees
- Increases multi-family residential fees across all size categories in comparison to the adopted 2023 fees; however, the fees will remain lower than the adopted 2022 fees
- Increases the mobile home residential fees above the 2022 and 2023 adopted fees
- Increases the senior housing residential fees for all size categories in comparison to the adopted 2022 and 2023 adopted fees, with the exception of the small (<1,500 square feet) residential unit that will remain lower than the adopted 2022 fee

The calculation for non-residential was determined to be accurate.

Inflationary Adjustment

The adopted RTMF 2023 RTMF Administrative Plan allows for an annual review to consider adjusting the fees to account for inflation of project costs. The Administrative Plan states, "The RTMF may, at NCTC's discretion, be adjusted to account for the inflation of construction, right-of-way, acquisition, and design costs." The Administrative Plan recommends that the RTMF should be reviewed annually, to determine if inflation adjustments to the RTMF should be made based on the San Francisco Construction Cost Index (CCI) as reported in the *Engineering News-Record* (ENR) "20-City Construction Cost Index" for the 12-month period ending December of the prior year. The RTMF Technical Advisory Committee, consisting of representatives from the participating agencies, have reviewed the data and support NCTC recommending the annual inflation adjustment in the amount of 3.59%.

Table 2 below shows the change in the San Francisco Construction cost index and associated percentage between December 2022 and 2023.

ENDORSEMENT OF THE ADOPTION AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE 2024 REVISION TO THE REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION MITIGATION FEE 2023 NEXUS STUDY UPDATE FINAL REPORT AND ANNUAL INFLATION ADJUSTMENT

WHEREAS, the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) has endorsed adoption of the *Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee 2023 Nexus Study Update Final Report - 2024 Revision*, to fund improvements to the regional transportation system needed to avoid unacceptable levels of congestion, improve safety and mobility; and

WHEREAS, the revisions included in the *Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee 2023 Nexus Study Update Final Report - 2024 Revision* prepared by GHD Inc. corrects calculational errors found in *2023 RTMF Nexus Study Update Final Report* and satisfies the requirements of the State of California Mitigation Fee Act, and outlines the purpose and use of the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee, defines the relationship between new development and impacts on the transportation system, identifies the estimated cost to complete necessary improvements to the regional street system, and establishes the "rough proportionality" or "fair share" fee for differing types of development; and

WHEREAS, the NCTC finds that the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee will raise additional revenues needed to construct improvements to accommodate traffic that will be generated by development of land within the City of Grass Valley, the City of Nevada City, and within the unincorporated portions of western Nevada County; and

WHEREAS, the NCTC also finds that the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program establishes a fair and equitable method for distributing the cost of transportation improvements necessary to accommodate the traffic volumes generated by new development in western Nevada County; and

WHEREAS, the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee 2023 Nexus Study Update Final Report - 2024 Revision was approved by Nevada County Transportation Commission on March 20, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the RTMF Administrative Plan states: "The RTMF may, at NCTC's discretion, be adjusted to account for the inflation of construction, right-of-way, acquisition, and design costs"; and

WHEREAS, the RTMF Administrative Plan recommends that the RTMF be reviewed annually and that fee adjustments should be based on the San Francisco Construction Cost Index as reported in the *Engineering News-Record* (ENR) "20-City Construction Cost Index" for the 12-month period ending December of the prior year.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Nevada County Transportation Commission endorses adoption of the *Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee 2023 Nexus Study Update Final Report - 2024 Revision* and directs NCTC staff to recommend approval by the RTMF member agencies to proceed with preparation of the RTMF Agreements with the City of Grass Valley, the City of Nevada City, and Nevada County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chair of the Nevada County Transportation Commission is authorized to sign the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program Agreements, subject to non-substantive modifications as may be made by Legal Counsel or the Executive Director of the NCTC.

DATE: March 20, 2024

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 24-12 approving Amendment 2 to the FY 2023/24 Overall Work Program (OWP).

BACKGROUND: Resolution 24-12 approves the changes to the FY 2023/24 OWP Work Elements and Budget described below:

- Staff has adjusted LTF revenues in the FY 2023/24 OWP Budget as shown in Table 1, Budget Summary. This change was made to make the OWP Budget consistent with the FY 2023/24 Revised Findings of Apportionment, which are lower than the Preliminary Findings of Apportionment from May 2023. The adjustments made changes to reduce LTF planning revenue in the affected funds. The reductions were offset with LTF Carryover funds.
- On March 11, 2024, NCTC staff received a notice from Caltrans Division of Transportation Planning, that the RPA Carryover amount shown in Table 4 of FY 2023/24 OWP Amendment 1 did not match with the Overall Work Program Agreement (OWPA) approved by Caltrans. Staff determined that the discrepancy occurred because the OWPA used the original consultant budget amount of \$230,000 in WE 2.4.6, while FY 2023/24 OWP Amendment 1 used the actual consultant contract amount of \$228,252. This resulted in a difference of \$1,748. This has been corrected in Amendment 2 by putting the original consultant budget amount of \$230,000 back in WE 2.4.6. and in Tables 2 and 4.
- State Rural Planning Assistance (RPA) Grant Funds were increased by \$120,000 to add Project 2.4.3, the Zion St. Mobility/School Access Study.
- On January 19, 2024, in response to the significant interest in the study and multiple requests for presentations from regional agencies, the RCTF approved an additional \$50,000 to Project 2.4.3, RCTF Rural Induced Demand Study. The funds are for the consultant team to assist the RCTF and NCTC in additional public outreach activities following release of the draft and final report.

The OWP Amendment 2 Budget total is \$2,072,960.18. The budget includes a 4.2% contingency for FY 2023/24.

RESOLUTION 24-12 OF THE NEVADA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

WHEREAS, Section 99233.2 of the California Public Utilities Code provides for the transportation planning agency to utilize up to 3% of the annual Local Transportation Fund revenues for the conduct of the transportation planning and programming process; and

WHEREAS, NCTC has determined it is necessary to amend the OWP budget to accurately reflect activities that have occurred and will occur through the end of the fiscal year; and

WHEREAS, the requirements of the Master Fund Transfer Agreement No. 74A0798 are incorporated by reference as part of the FY 2023/24 OWP.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the modifications recommended in the attached memorandum are adopted as Amendment 2 of the FY 2023/24 Overall Work Program.

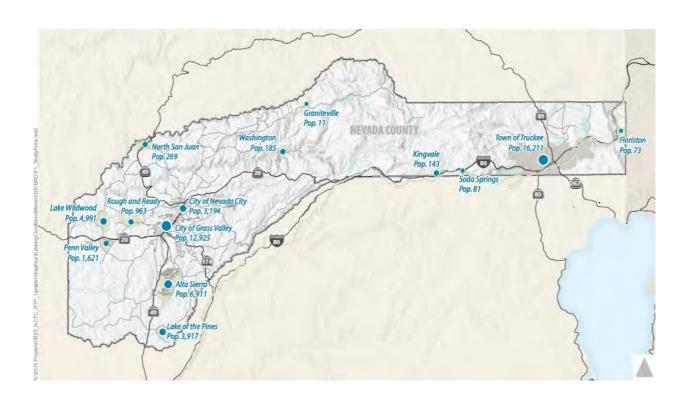

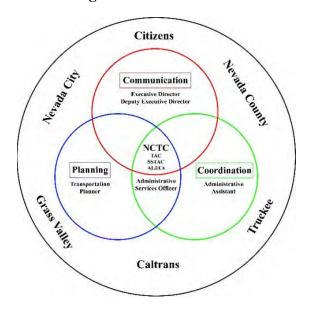
MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Nevada County Transportation Commission is to plan, communicate, and coordinate with the citizens and decision makers of Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, Town of Truckee, and with Caltrans to identify transportation needs, propose solutions, and assist in implementing projects to create a balanced regional transportation system, while protecting the rural qualities and historic character of Nevada County.

Activities to Achieve the Mission Include, But are not Limited to, the Following:

- ✓ NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- ✓ NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media, the NCTC website and electronic newsletter.
- ✓ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) that is consistent with the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ✓ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- ✓ NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- ✓ NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.
- ✓ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ✓ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program funds, and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC)

NCTC is a Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) created pursuant to Title 7.88 of the State of California Government Code, Section 67920. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee. The NCTC board has seven members. Four members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and three are appointed by the incorporated municipalities in the County. The Board of Supervisors appoints two of its members and two County at-large representatives. The municipalities appoint three city/town council members; one each from Nevada City, Grass Valley, and the Town of Truckee.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The TAC is made up of representatives of public transit operators, local public works and planning departments, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, and Caltrans. The Committee provides technical input on transportation issues and ensures there is coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC)

The SSTAC is made up of potential transit users who are representatives of the general public; seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local social service and consolidated transportation providers; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Latino communities. The goal of the SSTAC is to maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the underserved and under-represented members of the community, such as the elderly and disabled. The SSTAC recommends action to the Commission relative to the unmet transit needs findings, and advises the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.

Airport Land Use Commissions (ALUCs)

The Nevada County Transportation Commission has been designated as the Airport Land Use Commission for the Nevada County Airport and provides staff for the Truckee Tahoe ALUC. The purpose of Airport Land Use Commissions is to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within the areas around the airports, to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses.

Nevada County Demographics

As of January 1, 2023, the population of Nevada County was estimated at 100,720. The largest municipality is Truckee with a population of 16,676, followed by Grass Valley at 13,488 and Nevada City at 3,342. The population of the unincorporated portion of the County was 67,214. The Race and Ethnicity data for Nevada County on Census.gov reported the racial makeup of the county as 83.7% White, followed by 10.2% Hispanic, 1.4% Asian, 1.0% Native American, 0.4% Black or African American, 0.1% Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and 3.4% Some Other Race. The data at Census.gov indicates that 11% of the population was below the poverty level.

OVERALL WORK PROGRAM INTRODUCTION

NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program (OWP). This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures, such as Rural Planning Assistance (RPA), Local Transportation Funds (LTF), or Federal Transit Administration (FTA). A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between NCTC, the Cities of Grass Valley and Nevada City, the Town of Truckee, and the County of Nevada provides for the coordination of regional transportation planning with local governments in Nevada County. The Commission staff prepares a draft OWP and in accordance with the MOU, solicits and integrates comments from each of the jurisdictions. The proposed work program is then submitted to the Commission for approval and forwarded to Caltrans. Caltrans, as the grantor of Rural Planning Assistance funds and Federal Transit Assistance funds, approves the OWP. The budget reflects the on-going regional transportation planning process in Nevada County. Major concerns of each of the jurisdictions and Caltrans are reflected in the elements and levels of funding. The OWP is updated each year to report on the progress of identified projects, propose new or continuing projects for the ensuing year, and to provide an estimate of the required funding of the OWP elements.

Public Participation

Public involvement is a major component of the transportation planning and programming processes. NCTC makes a concerted effort to solicit public input from all Nevada County residents, including underrepresented groups, in many aspects of transportation planning within Nevada County. Specific examples are listed below:

- NCTC maintains a website (www.nctc.ca.gov), and a Facebook page to keep the public informed of transportation planning and programming efforts underway in Nevada County. Agendas are posted on the bulletin boards of local jurisdictions and emailed to mobile home parks, residential homeowners associations, senior centers, environmental advocates, associations representing the private sector, and individuals that have asked to be included on the distribution list.
- Articles on the preparation of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), as well as the public comment periods, are posted on the NCTC website.
- Copies of the Draft RTP are made available for review at the main public libraries in western and eastern Nevada County, as well as on the NCTC website.
- Press releases are sent to the media establishments in western and eastern Nevada County announcing the Draft RTP is available for review and comment and noting some key findings.
- Public hearings are held and noticed in the main newspapers in western and eastern Nevada County prior to adoption of the RTP and RTIP.
- Each year public notifications are sent out to encourage participation in transportation planning processes, such as the annual unmet transit needs public hearing held by the Transit Services Commission (TSC) and numerous public workshops relating to the transportation projects and planning activities of NCTC.
- In accordance with AB52, NCTC conducts outreach and Tribal Consultation on any projects for which NCTC is lead agency and files a Notice of Preparation, Notice of Mitigated Negative Declaration or Notice of Negative Declaration. While there are currently no federally recognized tribes located within Nevada County, NCTC consults with the Native American Heritage Commission to identify Native American tribal organizations with historic or cultural interests regarding lands in Nevada County. These groups include but are not limited to the Nisenan of the Nevada City Rancheria and United Auburn Indian Community (UAIC).
- NCTC consults with USDA Forest Service Tahoe National Forest and Bureau of Land Management.
- Citizens are encouraged to attend and speak at NCTC meetings on any matter included for discussion on the agenda at that meeting.

Regional Issues, Needs, and Goals

The main transportation issues in western Nevada County are related to providing adequate infrastructure and services to meet the needs of the County, while maintaining and enhancing the rural character and environmental qualities of the area. In western Nevada County, interregional traffic adds to the existing challenge and need to maintain and improve the transportation system.

In eastern Nevada County, the issues also stem from the challenges to meet the needs related to the high volumes of traffic generated by travelers taking advantage of the world-class recreational opportunities available in the Truckee-North Tahoe area. In addition to discretionary recreation demand travel, high housing costs have increased daily commuter trips into and out of the Truckee/North Tahoe region. To address these issues requires a multimodal and multijurisdictional approach to transportation planning in the region.

Acquiring adequate and timely funding for transportation improvements is the central need within all of the Nevada County issues. Implementation of highway and regional roadway improvements will be key to providing efficient operations, while improving safety and air quality. The 2020 Census reported that approximately 28.5% of the county population was over 65 years of age, between 2010 and 2020 that population increased from 19.6% to 28.5%, and it is projected that by 2030 this population is expected to increase to over 40%. As the population of residents over the age of 65 increases, it will result in increased demand for public transit services in Nevada County. Additional local, state, and federal transit operating and capital revenues, will be necessary in order to meet the additional demand placed on the public transit systems.

Transportation issues facing Nevada County which have been identified as regionally significant include the following:

- Insufficient state, federal, and local transportation revenues
- Air quality/greenhouse gas emission reductions
- Coordination of land use, air quality, and transportation planning
- Providing and maintaining a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information, and environmental quality
- Efficient implementation of new technologies, including zero-emission bus fleets and charging technology
- High cost of housing and short-term rentals increasing commute trips and distances
- Improvements to the regional transportation system to ensure safe and efficient emergency evacuation

Recognition of these issues leads to the overall goal of the Regional Transportation Plan, which is to provide and maintain a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, and services, and environmental quality. In the Policy Element this overarching goal is divided into the following four goals:

- 1) Provide for the safe and efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information;
- 2) Reduce adverse impacts on the natural, social, cultural, and historical environment and the quality of life;
- 3) Develop an economically feasible multimodal transportation system;
- 4) Create and maintain a comprehensive, multi-modal transportation system to serve the needs of the County.

- SR 174/20 Intersection Analysis, 2019/2020

WORK ELEMENT 1 - COMMUNICATION AND COORDINATION

Public involvement is a major component of NCTC's planning process. The activities and products from Project 1.1, General Services and Communication, are intended to provide the public with complete information and timely notices, thereby giving full public access to key decisions.

The work performed under Project 1.2, Fiscal Administration, has been incorporated into the NCTC Mission as follows:

- ➤ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ➤ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Through communication, collaboration, and public outreach activities, Work Element 1 incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors (see page I-5) into the NCTC planning program.

Information and data developed through these activities are included in the Regional Transportation Plan and in transit planning documents.

WORK ELEMENT 2 - REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

NCTC has the responsibility to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) directed to the achievement of a coordinated and balanced regional transportation system. The plan is to be action-oriented and pragmatic, considering both the short-and-long term future, and is to present clear, concise policy guidance to local and state officials. Projects 2.1 (Transportation Planning), 2.1.1 (Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan Update), 2.2 (Transportation Improvement Programs), 2.3 (Transit and Paratransit Programs), and 2.4 (Coordination of Regional Planning), are tied to the NCTC Mission by the following activities:

- NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- ➤ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program that is consistent with the RTP.
- ➤ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, the NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ➤ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- ➤ NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- > NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.

The following activities and products included in Work Element 2 are appropriate uses of Rural Planning Assistance Funds:

- ✓ Participate in Federal and State Clean Air Act transportation related air quality planning activities. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Develop and/or modify tools that allow for better assessment of transportation impacts on community livability and emergency preparedness (e.g. integration of GIS and census data into the regional traffic model and development of performance measurement tools and strategies). (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)
- ✓ Identify and document transportation facilities, projects, and services required to meet the regional and interregional mobility and access needs. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3)
- ✓ Define solutions and implementation issues in terms of the multimodal transportation system, land use and economic impacts, financial constraints, air quality and environmental concerns (including wetlands, endangered species, and cultural resources). (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Assess the operational and physical continuity of transportation system components within and between metropolitan and rural areas, and interconnections to and through regions. (Projects 2.1, 2.3, and 2.4)

- ✓ Conduct transit needs public hearings and prepare transit development plans and transit marketing plans as appropriate. (Project 2.3)
- ✓ Investigate methods to reduce vehicle travel and methods to expand and enhance travel services. (Projects 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Incorporate transit and intermodal facilities, bicycle transportation facilities, and pedestrian walkways in projects where appropriate. (Projects 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3)
- ✓ Participate with regional, local and state agencies, the general public, and the private sector in planning efforts to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that maximize and implement the regional transportation infrastructure. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct collaborative public participation efforts to further extend transportation planning to communities previously not engaged in discussion. (Project 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Create, strengthen, and use partnerships to facilitate and conduct regional planning activities between Caltrans, RTPAs, Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), transit districts, cities, counties, the private sector, and other stakeholders. (All WE 2 Projects)
- ✓ Use partners to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that enhance the movement of people, goods, services, and information. (Projects 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Ensure that projects developed at the regional level are compatible with statewide and interregional transportation needs. (Projects 2.2 and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct planning and project activities (including corridor studies, and other transportation planning studies) to identify, develop, and monitor current and future STIP projects. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Implement ways to meet transportation needs by using existing transportation facilities more efficiently. Encourage owners and operators of transportation facilities/systems to work together to develop operational objectives and plans maximizing utilization of existing facilities. (Projects 2.1, 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Document environmental and cultural resources and develop and improve coordination between agencies using Geographic Information Systems (GIS), Intelligent Transportation Management Systems (ITMS), and other computer-based tools. (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)

Work Element 2, Regional Transportation Planning, incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors into the NCTC planning program (see page I-6).

Monitoring safety and operational data of transportation facilities and services in Projects 2.1 and 2.3 will aid NCTC efforts to incorporate "safety" and "security" within the planning process. Through expanded Technical Advisory Committee meetings, transportation planning will be coordinated with emergency preparedness plans in the region. Systems management and operational data will be used to identify opportunities to increase transit ridership and develop operational improvements for regional transportation facilities. Management and operations data will also be key components in guiding capital investment plans for regional transportation system facilities and services. Planning activities will include coordination with nonemergency human service transportation providers. NCTC will also provide information to regional transit operators to ensure appropriate safety, security, and operational training opportunities are provided.

- Develop a clearly defined implementation strategy with specific, creative, yet practical and financially feasible projects matched to specific funding opportunities

Active Transportation Program (ATP): Created in 2013 by the passage of SB 99 and AB 101, the Active Transportation Program consolidates existing federal and state transportation programs into a single program with a focus to make California a national leader in active transportation. The purpose of the Active Transportation Program is to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation by achieving the following goals:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking,
- Increase safety and mobility for non-motorized users,
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, pursuant to SB 375 (of 2008) and SB 341 (of 2009),
- Enhance public health and ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program, and
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users.

<u>Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC):</u> The fundamental purpose of ALUCs is to promote land use compatibility around airports. As expressed in state statutes, this purpose is "... to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and the adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within areas around public airports to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses." The statutes give ALUCs two principal powers by which to accomplish this objective:

- 1. ALUCs must prepare and adopt an airport land use plan; and
- 2. ALUCs must review the plans, regulations, and other actions of local agencies and airport operators for consistency with that plan.

<u>Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP):</u> A document referred to by ALUCs and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of an airport. The ALUCP defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight within the Airport Influence Area (AIA).

<u>Allocation:</u> A distribution of funds by formula or agreement. With regard to Transportation Development Act funds, allocation is the discretionary action by the RTPA which designates funds for a specific claimant for a specific purpose.

Apportionment: Distribution of funds by a formula. Apportionment under the Transportation Development Act is the determination by the RTPA of each area's share of anticipated LTF for the ensuing fiscal year.

<u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)</u>: A statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible.

<u>Capital Improvement Program (CIP) or Capital Improvement Plan</u>: A short-range plan, which identifies capital projects and equipment purchases, provides a planning schedule and identifies options, for financing the plan.

<u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ):</u> A federal funding program that is available in western Nevada County for transportation projects that demonstrate emission reductions to help attain federal air quality standards. Western Nevada County was classified in 2004 as "non-attainment" for 8-hour ozone standards. Project categories eligible for CMAO funding include:

- Alternative fuels and vehicles
- Congestion reduction and traffic flow improvements
- Transit improvements
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Public education and outreach
- Diesel engine retrofits
- Car pooling and van pooling

Projects are submitted by local jurisdictions for consideration and are ranked based on air quality benefits and project readiness. NCTC then reviews the ranking and chooses projects to be funded.

<u>Corridor System Management Plan (CSMP):</u> Foundational documents supporting a partnership-based, integrated management of all travel modes (cars, trucks, transit, bicycles, and pedestrians) and infrastructure (highways, roads, rail tracks, information systems and bike routes) so that mobility along a corridor is provided in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): An agency within the U.S. Department of Transportation that supports state and local governments in the design, construction, and maintenance of the Nation's highway system (Federal Aid Highway Program) and various federally and tribal owned lands (Federal Lands).

<u>Federal Transit Administration (FTA):</u> A federal agency that provides financial and technical assistance to local public transit systems, including buses, subways, light rail, commuter rail, trolleys and ferries.

Findings of Apportionment: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants. The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the ensuing fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

<u>Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act:</u> A federal law enacted in 2015 to provide long-term funding for surface transportation infrastructure planning and investment. The FAST Act authorizes \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 for highway, highway and motor vehicle safety, public transportation, motor carrier safety, hazardous materials safety, rail, and research, technology, and statistics programs.

<u>FTA Section 5310</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5310 provides formula funding to states for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs.

<u>FTA Section 5311:</u> This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5311 provides grants for Rural Areas providing capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations.

<u>Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP)</u>: The ITIP is a five-year program of projects funded through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) that obtains funding primarily through the per-gallon State tax on gasoline. The ITIP is prepared by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and is submitted to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for approval.

<u>Level of Service (LOS)</u>: A qualitative measure used to relate the quality of traffic service. LOS is used to analyze highways by categorizing traffic flow and assigning quality levels of traffic based on performance measures like speed, density, etc. North American highway LOS standards use letters A through F, with A being the best and F being the worst, similar to academic grading.

<u>Local Transportation Fund (LTF)</u>: The LTF is derived from a 1/4-cent general sales tax collected statewide. The State Board of Equalization, based on the sales tax collected in each county, returns the sales tax revenues to each county's LTF. The LTF was created in 1971when legislation was passed to provide funding to counties for transit and non-transit related purposes.

<u>Memorandum of Understanding (MOU):</u> An agreement between two (or more) parties. It expresses a convergence of will between the parties, indicating an intended common line of action. Many government agencies use MOUs to define a relationship between agencies.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO):</u> MPOs are the regional planning entities in urbanized areas, usually an area with a population of 50,000 or more. There are 18 MPOs in California, accounting for approximately 98% of the state's population.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Commission (NCALUC): The Nevada County Transportation Commission was designated by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors and the city selection committee as the ALUC for the Nevada County Airport in May 2010. The NCTC Executive Director serves as the NCALUC Executive Director with support from the NCTC staff.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (NCALUCP): The basic function of this plan is to promote compatibility between the airport and surrounding land uses. The plan serves as a tool for use by the NCALUC in fulfilling its duty to review airport and adjacent land use development proposals. Additionally, the plan sets compatibility criteria applicable to local agencies and their preparation or amendment of land use plans and ordinances and to land owners in their design of new developments.

North State Super Region (NSSR): Regional transportation planning agencies from 16 counties in Northern California came together on October 20, 2010, to sign a memorandum of agreement. This agreement created an alliance between the agencies to work together and support each other on issues related to transportation and to have a unified voice representing the North State.

Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District (NSAQMD): The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District was formed in 1986 by the merging of the Air Pollution Control Districts of Nevada, Plumas and Sierra Counties. The District is required by state law to achieve and maintain the federal and state Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are air quality standards set at levels that will protect the public health. The District is composed of three primary entities, each with a specific purpose: District staff, Governing Board of Directors, and Hearing Board.

Overall Work Program (OWP): NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program. This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures.

<u>Planning, Programming, and Monitoring (PPM):</u> PPM is funding allocated by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Designated uses of PPM include:

- Regional transportation planning includes development and preparation of the regional transportation plan;
- Project planning includes the development of project study reports or major investment studies conducted by regional agencies or by local agencies, in cooperation with regional agencies;
- Program development includes the preparation of regional transportation improvement programs (RTIPs) and studies supporting them; and
- Monitoring the implementation of STIP projects includes project delivery, timely use of funds, and compliance with state law and CTC guidelines.

<u>Plans, Specifications, and Estimates (PS&E):</u> In this stage of project development, the scope of the selected alternative is refined; design surveys and photogrammetric mapping is obtained; and reports including traffic data, hydrology and hydraulics, geotechnical design, pavement design, and materials and sound wall design reports are completed. Final right-of-way requirements are determined, and procurement is initiated. At the completion of the PS&E stage, a complete set of project plans have been developed that will allow a competent contractor to bid and build the project. These plans include a refined estimate of the construction costs and any required specifications on how the work is to proceed.

Project Approval and Environmental Documentation (PA/ED): The PA/ED step of project development reinforces the philosophy of balancing transportation needs with community goals and values. Outputs of the PA/ED step are the project report and environmental document. The project report is an engineering document that evaluates the various alternatives for selection of a preferred alternative. The environmental document is a disclosure document that assesses the potential impacts of the project on the environment.

<u>Project Initiation Document (PID):</u> a report that documents the purpose, need, scope, cost, and schedule for a transportation project. The PID identifies and describes the viable alternatives to a transportation problem.

<u>Project Study Report (PSR):</u> A report of preliminary engineering efforts, including a detailed alternatives analysis, cost, schedule, and scope information for a transportation project. A PSR also includes estimated schedule and costs for environmental mitigation and permit compliance.

Public Transportation Modernization Improvement & Service Enhancement Account (PTMISEA): PTMISEA was created by Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006. Of the \$19.925 billion available to Transportation, \$3.6 billion dollars was allocated to PTMISEA to be available to transit operators over a ten-year period. PTMISEA funds may be used for transit rehabilitation, safety or modernization improvements, capital service enhancements or expansions, new capital projects, bus rapid transit improvements, or rolling stock (buses and rail cars) procurement, rehabilitation or replacement. Funds in this account are appropriated annually by the Legislature to the State Controller's Office (SCO) for allocation in accordance with Public Utilities Code formula distributions: 50% allocated to Local Operators based on fare-box revenue and 50% to Regional Entities based on population.

Regional Improvement Program (RIP): The RIP is one of two funding programs in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The RIP receives 75% of the STIP funds and the second program, the Interregional Improvement Program receives 25% of STIP funds. RIP funds are allocated every two years by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to projects submitted by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) in their Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIPs).

Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP): The RSTP was established by the State of California to utilize federal Surface Transportation Program funds for a wide variety of transportation projects. The State exchanges these federal funds for less restrictive state funds to maximize the ability of local agencies to use the funds for transportation purposes including planning, construction of improvements, maintenance and operation of public streets, and pedestrian and bicycle projects.

<u>Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP):</u> NCTC submits regional transportation projects to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for funding in a list called the RTIP. The RTIP is a five-year program that is updated every two years. Projects in the RTIP are funded from the Regional Improvement Program (RIP).

Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF): The Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program was established in 2001 through a partnership of Nevada County, City of Nevada City, City of Grass Valley, and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). The RTMF Program was developed to collect impact fees from new development to help fund transportation improvement projects needed to accommodate growth in the region of western Nevada County.

Regional Transportation Plan (RTP): The Regional Transportation Plan has been developed to document transportation policy, actions, and funding recommendations that will meet the short- and long-term access and mobility needs of Nevada County residents over the next 20 years. This document is designed to guide the systematic development of a comprehensive multi-modal transportation system for Nevada County.

Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA): County or multi-county entities charged by state law in meeting certain transportation planning requirements. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee.

Request for Proposal (RFP): A document that solicits proposals, often made through a bidding process, by an agency or company interested in procurement of a commodity, service, or valuable asset, to potential suppliers to submit business proposals.

Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF): There are 26 rural county Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) or Local Transportation Commissions represented on the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an informal organization with no budget or staff that generally meets every other month. A member of the CTC, usually acts as liaison to the RCTF, and CTC and Caltrans staff typically attend these meetings to explain and discuss changing statewide transportation issues that may be of concern to the rural counties.

<u>Rural Planning Assistance (RPA):</u> Annually the 26 rural RTPAs receive state transportation planning funding, known as RPA, on a reimbursement basis, after costs are incurred and paid for using local funds.

<u>Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC):</u> Consists of representatives of potential transit users including the general public, seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local consolidated transportation service agencies; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Hispanic communities. The SSTAC meets at least once annually and has the following responsibilities:

- To maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the elderly and disabled.
- Review and recommend action to the NCTC relative to the identification of unmet transit needs and advise the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.
- Provide a forum for members to share information and concerns about existing elderly and handicapped transportation resources.

<u>State Highway Operations and Protection Program (SHOPP):</u> The SHOPP is a four-year listing of projects prepared by Caltrans.

<u>State Transit Assistance (STA):</u> These funds are provided by the State for the development and support of public transportation needs. They are allocated by the State Controller's Office to each county based on population and transit performance.

<u>State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP):</u> The STIP is a multi-year capital improvement program of transportation projects on and off the State Highway System, funded with revenues from the Transportation Investment Fund and other funding sources. STIP programming generally occurs every two years. The STIP has two funding programs, the Regional Improvement Program and the Interregional Improvement Program.

<u>Technical Advisory Committee (TAC):</u> The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is made up of representatives of local public works and planning departments, Caltrans District 3, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, public transit operators, and the NCTC consultant engineer on retainer. Members are assigned by staff of local jurisdictions and other participating organizations. Any decisions made or actions proposed by the TAC shall be subject to the review and approval of the NCTC.

TAC responsibilities include:

- Provide technical input, assistance, and recommendations to the Commission to ensure there is comprehensive coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process for Nevada County.
- Review and comment on comprehensive regional transportation plans for the area, which include the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), and the Overall Work Program (OWP).
- Coordinate efforts and discussions to create and maintain circulation elements of the General Plan and specific plans of the member governments.

<u>Transit Development Plan (TDP):</u> Transit Development Plans study the County's transit services. They help identify transit service needs, prioritize improvements and determine the resources required for implementing modified or new service. The plans also provide a foundation for requests for State and federal funding,

<u>Transit Services Commission (TSC):</u> This commission oversees and advises as necessary the daily operations of the western Nevada County transit system. The TSC has the following responsibilities:

- Establish fares:
- Adopt the level of transit and paratransit services, including route structure and service areas;
- Monitor public response;
- Approve proposed purchase of additional vehicles;
- Review and approve the annual budget for transit and paratransit operations.

<u>Transportation Development Act (TDA):</u> The Transportation Development Act was enacted in 1971 and provides two major sources of funding for public transportation: the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and the State Transit Assistance fund (STA). The TDA funds a wide variety of transportation programs, including planning and programming activities, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, community transit services, and public transportation projects. One of NCTC's major responsibilities is the administration of TDA funding in Nevada County.

<u>Travel Demand Model (also Traffic Model):</u> A computer model used to estimate travel behavior and travel demand for a specific future time frame, based on a number of assumptions. In general, travel analysis is performed to assist decision makers in making informed transportation planning decisions. The strength of modern travel demand forecasting is the ability to ask critical "what if" questions about proposed plans and policies.

<u>Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association (TNT/TMA):</u> The Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association is dedicated to fostering public-private partnerships and resources for the advocacy and promotion of innovative solutions to the unique transportation challenges of the Truckee-North Lake Tahoe Resort Triangle. The TNT/TMA is a planning stakeholder and partner with NCTC.

<u>Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Commission (TTALUC):</u> The Truckee Tahoe Airport is an "intercounty" airport situated in both Nevada County and Placer County; therefore, a special ALUC with representatives from both counties was formed. Six members are selected, one each, by Placer and Nevada Counties' Board of Supervisors, City Selection Committees, and Airport Managers of each county. A seventh member is chosen by the other six members to represent the general public. NCTC authorized its staff on May 19, 2010, to provide staff support to the TTALUC.

<u>Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (TTALUCP):</u> A document referred to by the TTALUC and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of the Truckee Tahoe Airport. The plan defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight. The TTALUC performs consistency determinations for proposed projects in the area covered by the Compatibility Plan as needed.

<u>Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT):</u> VMT is a metric of the total miles traveled by vehicles in a defined area over a defined period of time and is often used to estimate the environmental impacts of driving, such as Greenhouse Gases and air pollutant emissions. Factors that influence VMT include travel mode, number of trips, and distance traveled. California jurisdictions are transitioning from a Level of Service (LOS) metric to a Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) metric within the California Environmental Quality Act's (CEQA) transportation analysis.

RECOMMENDATION: Provide comments on Nevada County Transportation Commission's (NCTC) Draft FY 2024/25 Overall Work Program (OWP).

BACKGROUND: Annually each Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) develops an OWP for formal adoption by its governing board. The OWP outlines the scope of work and budget for various transportation planning activities. The OWP is a requirement of NCTC's Master Fund Transfer Agreement with the State of California and includes the following three components: Introduction, Work Elements (W.E.), and Budget. The purpose of this draft OWP for FY 2024/25 is:

- 1. To show how the Federal Planning Factors will be integrated into the OWP Work Elements.
- 2. To outline continuing and new activities.
- 3. To present a summary of the expected revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year.

A final OWP will be presented for approval at the May 15, 2024 NCTC meeting.

FEDERAL PLANNING FACTORS FOR FY 2024/25

As shown in the chart on page I-6 in the Draft OWP, the Federal Planning Factors that are included in Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (Section 134(h), FAST Act, 2015) have been integrated into NCTC's FY 2024/25 OWP:

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the region, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency.
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 4. Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight.

- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns.
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight.
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation.
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

OWP WORK ELEMENTS

NCTC's OWP integrates the Commission's organizational activities of Planning, Communication, and Coordination into two broad Work Elements: Communication and Coordination, and Regional Planning. Each Work Element is further subdivided into projects that accomplish specific tasks or objectives.

Status of projects in the FY 2023/24 OWP:

- Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Update: The draft 2045 Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan is scheduled to be presented at the May 2024 NCTC Meeting. (WE 2.1.1)
- Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan: The consultant is scheduled to complete final technical memoranda and the draft report in May of 2024 and the final report will be completed in June 2024. (WE 2.3.3)
- Nevada County Local Road Safety Plan: The County has been delayed in getting started with this project, consequently it will be carried into the FY 2024/25 OWP. (WE 2.4.1)
- Zion St. Mobility/School Access Study: The consultant procurement process will begin in May 2024 and the consultant will complete the analysis during FY 2024/25. (WE 2.4.3)
- Rural Counties Task Force Rural Induced Demand Study: The consultant is scheduled to complete the draft report in May of 2024 and the final report will be completed in July 2024. In response to significant interest in the study and multiple requests for presentations from regional agencies, NCTC staff and the consultant will conduct outreach activities during FY 2024/25. (WE 2.4.4)
- Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada: The consultant is scheduled to complete an administrative draft report in May 2024, a draft report in July 2024, and the final report will be completed in September 2024. (WE 2.4.6)

The following ongoing activities have been integrated into the Draft FY 2024/25 OWP:

1. State Transportation Improvement Program Projects:

A. <u>SR 49 Corridor Improvement Project from La Barr Meadows Road to McKnight Way:</u> NCTC will continue to participate with Caltrans District 3 in the preparation of Plans, Specifications, and Estimates and Right-of-Way for a future construction project. (WE 2.2)

2. Planning/Administration Projects:

- A. <u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Funding</u>: Monitor project activities as shown on the multi-year project listing. (WE 2.1)
- B. Air Quality Conformity Process: Monitor changes in EPA requirements. (WE 2.1)
- C. <u>Airport Land Use Commission Planning and Reviews</u>: NCTC staff will continue to serve as staff for the Nevada County and Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Commissions and will conduct reviews of projects near the airports for consistency with the adopted Airport Land Use Compatibility Plans. (WE 2.4.2)
- D. Rural Counties Task Force & CARL Administration: Starting in July 2024 the NCTC Deputy Executive Director will serve as the Chairman of the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The State of California contains 26 rural counties, which generally have populations of less than 250,000 and do not have a single urbanized area greater than 50,000. Rural counties provide food, fiber, timber, and mineral products for California industry and residents, as well as recreation for urban residents and tourists. In order to provide a direct opportunity for the small counties to remain informed, have a voice, and become involved with changing statewide transportation policies and programs, a task force was formed in 1988 as a joint effort between the California Transportation Commission (CTC) and the rural counties.

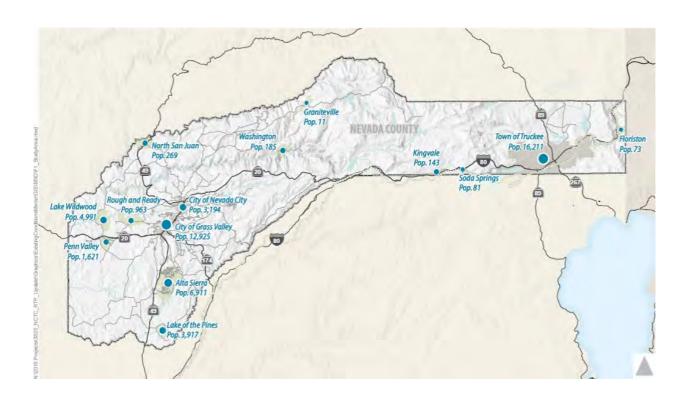
There are 26 rural county Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) or Local Transportation Commissions represented on the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an informal organization with no budget or staff that generally meets every other month. A member of the CTC usually acts as liaison to the RCTF, and CTC and Caltrans staff typically attend these meetings to explain and discuss changing statewide transportation issues that may be of concern to the rural counties.

The California Academy for Regional Leaders (CARL) is a program developed by the California Association of Councils of Governments (CALCOG). The CARL program supports participants in their efforts to strengthen their organizations and increase their personal effectiveness by helping them develop leadership skills, expand their knowledge of the systems that impact their agencies, and build state-wide professional networks. One of the duties of the RCTF Chairman is to coordinate scholarships to the CARL program, funded with State Regional Planning Assistance funds. (WE 2.4.5)

To assist Caltrans in the review of the NCTC FY 2024/25 OWP, staff has included a list of Rural Planning Assistance (RPA) eligible activities in each work element that uses RPA funds. As the name indicates, RPA funds are to be used for planning. RPA funds cannot be used for project development, project study reports, project implementation, or transit administration.

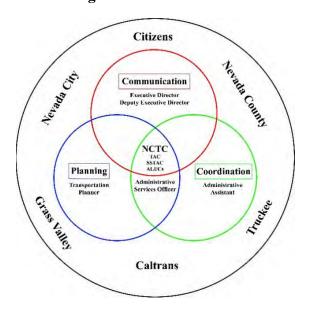
MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Nevada County Transportation Commission is to plan, communicate, and coordinate with the citizens and decision makers of Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, Town of Truckee, and with Caltrans to identify transportation needs, propose solutions, and assist in implementing projects to create a balanced regional transportation system, while protecting the rural qualities and historic character of Nevada County.

Activities to Achieve the Mission Include, But are not Limited to, the Following:

- ✓ NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- ✓ NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media outlets, the NCTC website, and through social media platforms.
- ✓ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) that is consistent with the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ✓ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- ✓ NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- ✓ NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.
- ✓ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ✓ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program funds, Carbon Reduction Program, and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC)

NCTC is a Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) created pursuant to Title 7.88 of the State of California Government Code, Section 67920. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee. The NCTC board has seven members. Four members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and three are appointed by the incorporated municipalities in the County. The Board of Supervisors appoints two of its members and two County at-large representatives. The municipalities appoint three city/town council members; one each from Nevada City, Grass Valley, and the Town of Truckee.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The TAC is made up of representatives of public transit operators, local public works and planning departments, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, and Caltrans. The Committee provides technical input on transportation issues and ensures there is coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC)

The SSTAC is made up of potential transit users who are representatives of the general public; seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local social service and consolidated transportation providers; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Latino communities. The goal of the SSTAC is to maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the underserved and under-represented members of the community, such as the elderly and disabled. The SSTAC recommends action to the Commission relative to the unmet transit needs findings, and advises the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.

Airport Land Use Commissions (ALUCs)

The Nevada County Transportation Commission has been designated as the Airport Land Use Commission for the Nevada County Airport and provides staff for the Truckee Tahoe ALUC. The purpose of Airport Land Use Commissions is to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within the areas around the airports, to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses.

Nevada County Demographics

As of January 1, 2023, the population of Nevada County was estimated at 100,720. The largest municipality is Truckee with a population of 16,676, followed by Grass Valley at 13,488 and Nevada City at 3,342. The population of the unincorporated portion of the County was 67,214. The Race and Ethnicity data for Nevada County on Census.gov reported the racial makeup of the county as 83.7% White, followed by 10.2% Hispanic, 1.4% Asian, 1.0% Native American, 0.4% Black or African American, 0.1% Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and 3.4% Some Other Race. The data at Census.gov indicates that 11% of the population was below the poverty level.

OVERALL WORK PROGRAM INTRODUCTION

NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program (OWP). This work program includes specific "Work Elements" that describe the planning projects and associated activities that are to be conducted, and identifies the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures, such as Rural Planning Assistance (RPA), Local Transportation Funds (LTF), Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP), Planning, Programming, and Monitoring (PPM), or Federal Transit Administration (FTA). A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between NCTC, the Cities of Grass Valley and Nevada City, the Town of Truckee, and the County of Nevada provides the framework for NCTC's coordination of regional transportation planning with local governments in Nevada County. The Commission staff prepares a draft OWP and in accordance with the MOU, solicits and integrates comments from each of the jurisdictions. The proposed work program is then submitted to the Commission for approval and forwarded to Caltrans. Caltrans, as the grantor of Rural Planning Assistance funds and Federal Transit Assistance funds, approves the OWP. The budget reflects the on-going regional transportation planning process in Nevada County. Major concerns of each of the jurisdictions and Caltrans are reflected in the elements and levels of funding. The OWP is updated each year to report on the progress of identified projects, propose new or continuing projects for the ensuing year, and to provide an estimate of the required funding of the OWP work elements.

Public Participation

Public involvement is a major component of the transportation planning and programming processes. NCTC makes a concerted effort to solicit public input from all Nevada County residents, including under- represented groups, in many aspects of transportation planning within Nevada County. Specific examples are listed below:

- NCTC maintains a website (www.nctc.ca.gov), a Facebook page, and a Twitter account to keep the public informed of transportation planning and programming efforts underway in Nevada County. Agendas are posted on the bulletin boards of local jurisdictions and emailed to mobile home parks, residential homeowners associations, senior centers, environmental advocates, associations representing the private sector, and individuals that have asked to be included on the distribution list. Citizens are encouraged to attend and speak at NCTC meetings on any matter included for discussion on the agenda at that meeting.
- Articles on the preparation of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), as well as the public comment periods, are posted on the NCTC website.
- Copies of the Draft RTP are made available for review at the main public libraries in western and eastern Nevada County, as well as on the NCTC website.
- Press releases are sent to the media establishments in western and eastern Nevada County announcing the Draft RTP is available for review and comment and noting some key findings.
- Public hearings are held and noticed in the main newspapers in western and eastern Nevada County prior to adoption of the RTP and RTIP.
- Each year public notifications are sent out to encourage participation in transportation planning processes, such as the annual unmet transit needs public hearing and numerous public workshops relating to the transportation projects and planning activities of NCTC.
- In accordance with AB52, NCTC conducts outreach and Tribal Consultation on any projects for which NCTC is lead agency and files a Notice of Preparation, Notice of Mitigated Negative Declaration or Notice of Negative Declaration. While there are currently no federally recognized tribes located within Nevada County, NCTC consults with the Native American Heritage Commission to identify Native American tribal organizations with historic or cultural interests regarding lands in Nevada County. These groups include but are not limited to the Nisenan of the Nevada City Rancheria and United Auburn Indian Community (UAIC).
- NCTC consults with USDA Forest Service Tahoe National Forest and Bureau of Land Management.

Regional Issues, Needs, and Goals

The main transportation issues in western Nevada County are related to providing adequate multimodal transportation infrastructure and services to meet the needs of the County, while maintaining and enhancing the rural character and environmental qualities of the area. In western Nevada County, interregional traffic adds to the existing challenge and need to maintain and improve the transportation system.

In eastern Nevada County, the issues also stem from the challenges to meet the needs related to the high volumes of traffic generated by travelers taking advantage of the world-class recreational opportunities available in the Truckee-North Tahoe area. In addition to discretionary recreation demand travel, high housing costs have increased daily commuter trips into and out of the Truckee/North Tahoe region. To address these issues requires a multimodal and multijurisdictional approach to transportation planning in the region.

Acquiring adequate and timely funding for transportation improvements is the central need within all of the Nevada County issues. Implementation of highway and regional roadway improvements will be key to providing efficient operations, while improving safety and air quality. The 2020 Census reported that approximately 28.5% of the county population was over 65 years of age, between 2010 and 2020 that population increased from 19.6% to 28.5%, and it is projected that by 2030 this population is expected to increase to over 40%. As the population of residents over the age of 65 increases, it will result in increased demand for public transit services in Nevada County. Additional local, state, and federal transit operating and capital revenues, will be necessary in order to meet the additional demand placed on the public transit systems.

Transportation issues facing Nevada County which have been identified as regionally significant include the following:

- Insufficient state, federal, and local transportation revenues
- Air quality/greenhouse gas emission reductions
- Coordination of land use, air quality, and transportation planning
- Providing and maintaining a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information, and environmental quality
- Efficient implementation of new technologies, including zero-emission bus fleets and charging technology
- High cost of housing and short-term rentals increasing commute trips and distances
- Improvements to the regional transportation system to ensure safe and efficient emergency evacuation

Recognition of these issues leads to the overall goal of the Regional Transportation Plan, which is to provide and maintain a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, and services, and environmental quality. In the Policy Element this overarching goal is divided into the following four goals:

- 1) Provide for the safe and efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information;
- 2) Reduce adverse impacts on the natural, social, cultural, and historical environment and the quality of life;
- 3) Develop an economically feasible multimodal transportation system;
- 4) Create and maintain a comprehensive, multi-modal transportation system to serve the needs of the County.

WORK ELEMENT 1 - COMMUNICATION AND COORDINATION

Public involvement is a major component of NCTC's planning process. The activities and products from Project 1.1, General Services and Communication, are intended to provide the public with complete information and timely notices, thereby giving full public access to key decisions.

Work Element 1 incorporates the following activities that are an integral part of accomplishing NCTC's Mission:

- ➤ NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media outlets, NCTC webpage, and social media platforms.
- ➤ NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.

NCTC has the statutory responsibility to administer Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds, and to ensure that all expenditures of TDA funds are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). NCTC also administers funds received from the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) and the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) program. The work performed under Project 1.2, Fiscal Administration, has been incorporated into the NCTC Mission as follows:

- ➤ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ➤ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Through communication, collaboration, and public outreach activities, Work Element 1 incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors (see page I-5) into the NCTC planning program.

Information and data developed through these activities are included in the Regional Transportation Plan and in transit planning documents.

WORK ELEMENT 2 - REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

NCTC has the responsibility to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) directed to the achievement of a coordinated and balanced regional transportation system. The plan is to be action-oriented and pragmatic, considering both the short-and-long term future, and is to present clear, concise policy guidance to local and state officials. Projects 2.1 (Transportation Planning), 2.1.1 (Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan Update), 2.2 (Transportation Improvement Programs), 2.3 (Transit and Paratransit Programs), and 2.4 (Coordination of Regional Planning), are tied to the NCTC Mission by the following activities:

- NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- ➤ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program that is consistent with the RTP.
- ➤ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, the NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ➤ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- > NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- > NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.

The following activities and products included in Work Element 2 are appropriate uses of Rural Planning Assistance Funds:

- ✓ Participate in Federal and State Clean Air Act transportation related air quality planning activities. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Develop and/or modify tools that allow for better assessment of transportation impacts on community livability and emergency preparedness (e.g. integration of GIS and census data into the regional traffic model and development of performance measurement tools and strategies). (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)
- ✓ Identify and document transportation facilities, projects, and services required to meet the regional and interregional mobility and access needs. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3)
- ✓ Define solutions and implementation issues in terms of the multimodal transportation system, land use and economic impacts, financial constraints, air quality and environmental concerns (including wetlands, endangered species, and cultural resources). (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Assess the operational and physical continuity of transportation system components within and between metropolitan and rural areas, and interconnections to and through regions. (Projects 2.1, 2.3, and 2.4)

- ✓ Conduct transit needs public hearings and prepare transit development plans and transit marketing plans as appropriate. (Project 2.3)
- ✓ Investigate methods to reduce vehicle travel and methods to expand and enhance travel services. (Projects 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Incorporate transit and intermodal facilities, bicycle transportation facilities, and pedestrian walkways in projects where appropriate. (Projects 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3)
- ✓ Participate with regional, local and state agencies, the general public, and the private sector in planning efforts to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that maximize and implement the regional transportation infrastructure. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct collaborative public participation efforts to further extend transportation planning to communities previously not engaged in discussion. (Project 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Create, strengthen, and use partnerships to facilitate and conduct regional planning activities between Caltrans, RTPAs, Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), transit districts, cities, counties, the private sector, and other stakeholders. (All WE 2 Projects)
- ✓ Use partners to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that enhance the movement of people, goods, services, and information. (Projects 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Ensure that projects developed at the regional level are compatible with statewide and interregional transportation needs. (Projects 2.2 and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct planning and project activities (including corridor studies, and other transportation planning studies) to identify, develop, and monitor current and future STIP projects. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Implement ways to meet transportation needs by using existing transportation facilities more efficiently. Encourage owners and operators of transportation facilities/systems to work together to develop operational objectives and plans maximizing utilization of existing facilities. (Projects 2.1, 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Document environmental and cultural resources and develop and improve coordination between agencies using Geographic Information Systems (GIS), Intelligent Transportation Management Systems (ITMS), and other computer-based tools. (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)

Work Element 2, Regional Transportation Planning, incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors into the NCTC planning program (see page I-6).

Monitoring safety and operational data of transportation facilities and services in Projects 2.1 and 2.3 will aid NCTC efforts to incorporate "safety" and "security" within the planning process. Through expanded Technical Advisory Committee meetings, transportation planning will be coordinated with emergency preparedness plans in the region. Systems management and operational data will be used to identify opportunities to increase transit ridership and develop operational improvements for regional transportation facilities. Management and operations data will also be key components in guiding capital investment plans for regional transportation system facilities and services. Planning activities will include coordination with nonemergency human service transportation providers. NCTC will also provide information to regional transit operators to ensure appropriate safety, security, and operational training opportunities are provided.

In January 2024, NCTC in coordination with Nevada County Transit submitted an application to the FY 2024/25 Caltrans Strategic Partnership – Transit Planning Grant program to fund a Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA). The planning study will comprehensively review the existing transit services offered in western Nevada County and identify areas of opportunity to transition to alternative operating models to provide greater system efficiency and ridership benefits. Caltrans anticipates the award announcement to be released in the Summer of 2024. If NCTC is awarded grant funding the planning project will be amended into NCTC's FY 2024/25 Overall Work Program.

Purpose: Update the Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) in compliance with California Government Code Section 65041.1. Every Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) is required by law to prepare a long-range transportation plan to ensure that the region's vision and goals are clearly identified. The long-range plan, known as the RTP, is an important policy document that is based on the unique needs and characteristics of a region, helps shape the region's transportation system, economy, and environment, and communicates the regional transportation vision to the state and federal government. As fundamental building blocks of the State's transportation system, the RTP also supports state goals for transportation, environmental quality, economic growth, and social equity.

Project 2.4.5 – Rural Counties Task Force & CARL Administration

<u>Purpose:</u> To coordinate the participation of the twenty-six Rural Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPA) in the statewide issues pertinent to transportation planning, programming, and funding. This work element is in the first year of a two-year NCTC planning effort. This work element provides the resources necessary for the NCTC Deputy Director to fulfill the responsibilities of Chair of the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an advisory committee to the California Transportation Commission (CTC). The RCTF provides a forum for the RTPAs in California to coordinate information, discuss issues, and present their unique perspective and input into the statewide decision-making process. In addition, the RCTF provides a venue to pool financial and knowledge-based resources. The Chair position provides access to policy makers from state government putting the rural counties, including NCTC, in a unique position to protect and enhance our projects and funding.

Project 2.4.6 – Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada

<u>Purpose</u>: On behalf of the County of Nevada, the Nevada County Transportation Commission will manage a fleet electrification planning study to identify how the County of Nevada can make the transition to electrification of public fleets to comply with upcoming California Air Resource Board (CARB) regulations related to the Innovative Clean Transit and lightweight, medium-duty, and heavy-duty public fleet electrification regulations.

The study will guide Nevada County in its endeavor to meet the regulations by evaluating and identifying a detailed plan to successfully convert the county vehicle fleet to electric vehicles within the timeline specified by CARB. The infrastructure needs for power delivery and charging, maintenance needs, and capital replacement considerations will be incorporated into the overall plan. Where electrification of certain vehicle fleet mix (e.g. heavy duty trucks) may not be possible due to market readiness, other zero-carbon alternatives will be explored and evaluated for fleet replacement and infrastructure improvements needs.

Glossary of Terms and Acronyms

Active Transportation Plan: Identifies a network of pedestrian and bicycle facilities and projects to support pedestrian and bicycle safety for people of all ages and abilities. Specifically, the Active Transportation Plan aims to:

- Identify barriers and innovative solutions to encourage walking and bicycling as viable travel modes
- Effectively build on recently completed and current active transportation planning efforts
- Develop walking/bicycling networks supportive of existing and future land uses and projects
- Develop a clearly defined implementation strategy with specific, creative, yet practical and financially feasible projects matched to specific funding opportunities

Active Transportation Program (ATP): Created in 2013 by the passage of SB 99 and AB 101, the Active Transportation Program consolidates existing federal and state transportation programs into a single program with a focus to make California a national leader in active transportation. The purpose of the Active Transportation Program is to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation by achieving the following goals:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking,
- Increase safety and mobility for non-motorized users,
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, pursuant to SB 375 (of 2008) and SB 341 (of 2009),
- Enhance public health and ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program, and
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users.

<u>Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC):</u> The fundamental purpose of ALUCs is to promote land use compatibility around airports. As expressed in state statutes, this purpose is "... to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and the adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within areas around public airports to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses." The statutes give ALUCs two principal powers by which to accomplish this objective:

- 1. ALUCs must prepare and adopt an airport land use plan; and
- 2. ALUCs must review the plans, regulations, and other actions of local agencies and airport operators for consistency with that plan.

<u>Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP):</u> A document referred to by ALUCs and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of an airport. The ALUCP defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight within the Airport Influence Area (AIA).

<u>Allocation:</u> A distribution of funds by formula or agreement. With regard to Transportation Development Act funds, allocation is the discretionary action by the RTPA which designates funds for a specific claimant for a specific purpose.

Apportionment: Distribution of funds by a formula. Apportionment under the Transportation Development Act is the determination by the RTPA of each area's share of anticipated LTF for the ensuing fiscal year.

<u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA)</u>: A statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible.

<u>Capital Improvement Program (CIP) or Capital Improvement Plan</u>: A short-range plan, which identifies capital projects and equipment purchases, provides a planning schedule and identifies options, for financing the plan.

<u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ):</u> A federal funding program that is available in western Nevada County for transportation projects that demonstrate emission reductions to help attain federal air quality standards. Western Nevada County was classified in 2004 as "non-attainment" for 8-hour ozone standards. Project categories eligible for CMAO funding include:

- Alternative fuels and vehicles
- Congestion reduction and traffic flow improvements
- Transit improvements
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Public education and outreach
- Diesel engine retrofits
- Car pooling and van pooling

Projects are submitted by local jurisdictions for consideration and are ranked based on air quality benefits and project readiness. NCTC then reviews the ranking and chooses projects to be funded.

<u>Corridor System Management Plan (CSMP):</u> Foundational documents supporting a partnership-based, integrated management of all travel modes (cars, trucks, transit, bicycles, and pedestrians) and infrastructure (highways, roads, rail tracks, information systems and bike routes) so that mobility along a corridor is provided in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

<u>Federal Highway Administration (FHWA):</u> An agency within the U.S. Department of Transportation that supports state and local governments in the design, construction, and maintenance of the Nation's highway system (Federal Aid Highway Program) and various federally and tribal owned lands (Federal Lands).

<u>Federal Transit Administration (FTA):</u> A federal agency that provides financial and technical assistance to local public transit systems, including buses, subways, light rail, commuter rail, trolleys and ferries.

Findings of Apportionment: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants. The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the ensuing fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

<u>Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act:</u> A federal law enacted in 2015 to provide long-term funding for surface transportation infrastructure planning and investment. The FAST Act authorizes \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 for highway, highway and motor vehicle safety, public transportation, motor carrier safety, hazardous materials safety, rail, and research, technology, and statistics programs.

<u>FTA Section 5310</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5310 provides formula funding to states for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs.

<u>FTA Section 5311:</u> This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5311 provides grants for Rural Areas providing capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations.

<u>Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP)</u>: The ITIP is a five-year program of projects funded through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) that obtains funding primarily through the per-gallon State tax on gasoline. The ITIP is prepared by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and is submitted to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for approval.

<u>Level of Service (LOS)</u>: A qualitative measure used to relate the quality of traffic service. LOS is used to analyze highways by categorizing traffic flow and assigning quality levels of traffic based on performance measures like speed, density, etc. North American highway LOS standards use letters A through F, with A being the best and F being the worst, similar to academic grading.

<u>Local Transportation Fund (LTF)</u>: The LTF is derived from a 1/4-cent general sales tax collected statewide. The State Board of Equalization, based on the sales tax collected in each county, returns the sales tax revenues to each county's LTF. The LTF was created in 1971when legislation was passed to provide funding to counties for transit and non-transit related purposes.

<u>Memorandum of Understanding (MOU):</u> An agreement between two (or more) parties. It expresses a convergence of will between the parties, indicating an intended common line of action. Many government agencies use MOUs to define a relationship between agencies.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO):</u> MPOs are the regional planning entities in urbanized areas, usually an area with a population of 50,000 or more. There are 18 MPOs in California, accounting for approximately 98% of the state's population.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Commission (NCALUC): The Nevada County Transportation Commission was designated by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors and the city selection committee as the ALUC for the Nevada County Airport in May 2010. The NCTC Executive Director serves as the NCALUC Executive Director with support from the NCTC staff.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (NCALUCP): The basic function of this plan is to promote compatibility between the airport and surrounding land uses. The plan serves as a tool for use by the NCALUC in fulfilling its duty to review airport and adjacent land use development proposals. Additionally, the plan sets compatibility criteria applicable to local agencies and their preparation or amendment of land use plans and ordinances and to land owners in their design of new developments.

North State Super Region (NSSR): Regional transportation planning agencies from 16 counties in Northern California came together on October 20, 2010, to sign a memorandum of agreement. This agreement created an alliance between the agencies to work together and support each other on issues related to transportation and to have a unified voice representing the North State.

Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District (NSAQMD): The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District was formed in 1986 by the merging of the Air Pollution Control Districts of Nevada, Plumas and Sierra Counties. The District is required by state law to achieve and maintain the federal and state Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are air quality standards set at levels that will protect public health. The District is composed of three primary entities, each with a specific purpose: District staff, Governing Board of Directors, and Hearing Board.

<u>Overall Work Program (OWP):</u> NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program. This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures.

<u>Planning, Programming, and Monitoring (PPM):</u> PPM is funding allocated by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Designated uses of PPM include:

- Regional transportation planning includes development and preparation of the regional transportation plan;
- Project planning includes the development of project study reports or major investment studies conducted by regional agencies or by local agencies, in cooperation with regional agencies;
- Program development includes the preparation of regional transportation improvement programs (RTIPs) and studies supporting them; and
- Monitoring the implementation of STIP projects includes project delivery, timely use of funds, and compliance with state law and CTC guidelines.

<u>Plans, Specifications, and Estimates (PS&E):</u> In this stage of project development, the scope of the selected alternative is refined; design surveys and photogrammetric mapping is obtained; and reports including traffic data, hydrology and hydraulics, geotechnical design, pavement design, and materials and sound wall design reports are completed. Final right-of-way requirements are determined, and procurement is initiated. At the completion of the PS&E stage, a complete set of project plans have been developed that will allow a competent contractor to bid and build the project. These plans include a refined estimate of the construction costs and any required specifications on how the work is to proceed.

Project Approval and Environmental Documentation (PA/ED): The PA/ED step of project development reinforces the philosophy of balancing transportation needs with community goals and values. Outputs of the PA/ED step are the project report and environmental document. The project report is an engineering document that evaluates the various alternatives for selection of a preferred alternative. The environmental document is a disclosure document that assesses the potential impacts of the project on the environment.

<u>Project Initiation Document (PID):</u> a report that documents the purpose, need, scope, cost, and schedule for a transportation project. The PID identifies and describes the viable alternatives to a transportation problem.

<u>Project Study Report (PSR):</u> A report of preliminary engineering efforts, including a detailed alternatives analysis, cost, schedule, and scope information for a transportation project. A PSR also includes estimated schedule and costs for environmental mitigation and permit compliance.

Public Transportation Modernization Improvement & Service Enhancement Account (PTMISEA): PTMISEA was created by Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006. Of the \$19.925 billion available to Transportation, \$3.6 billion dollars was allocated to PTMISEA to be available to transit operators over a ten-year period. PTMISEA funds may be used for transit rehabilitation, safety or modernization improvements, capital service enhancements or expansions, new capital projects, bus rapid transit improvements, or rolling stock (buses and rail cars) procurement, rehabilitation or replacement. Funds in this account are appropriated annually by the Legislature to the State Controller's Office (SCO) for allocation in accordance with Public Utilities Code formula distributions: 50% allocated to Local Operators based on fare-box revenue and 50% to Regional Entities based on population.

Regional Improvement Program (RIP): The RIP is one of two funding programs in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The RIP receives 75% of the STIP funds and the second program, the Interregional Improvement Program receives 25% of STIP funds. RIP funds are allocated every two years by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to projects submitted by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) in their Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIPs).

Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP): The RSTP was established by the State of California to utilize federal Surface Transportation Program funds for a wide variety of transportation projects. The State exchanges these federal funds for less restrictive state funds to maximize the ability of local agencies to use the funds for transportation purposes including planning, construction of improvements, maintenance and operation of public streets, and pedestrian and bicycle projects.

Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP): NCTC submits regional transportation projects to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for funding in a list called the RTIP. The RTIP is a five-year program that is updated every two years. Projects in the RTIP are funded from the Regional Improvement Program (RIP).

Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF): The Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program was established in 2001 through a partnership of Nevada County, City of Nevada City, City of Grass Valley, and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). The RTMF Program was developed to collect impact fees from new development to help fund transportation improvement projects needed to accommodate growth in the region of western Nevada County.

Regional Transportation Plan (RTP): The Regional Transportation Plan has been developed to document transportation policy, actions, and funding recommendations that will meet the short- and long-term access and mobility needs of Nevada County residents over the next 20 years. This document is designed to guide the systematic development of a comprehensive multi-modal transportation system for Nevada County.

Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA): County or multi-county entities charged by state law in meeting certain transportation planning requirements. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee.

Request for Proposal (RFP): A document that solicits proposals, often made through a bidding process, by an agency or company interested in procurement of a commodity, service, or valuable asset, to potential suppliers to submit business proposals.

Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF): There are 26 rural county Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) or Local Transportation Commissions represented on the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an informal organization with no budget or staff that generally meets every other month. A member of the CTC, usually acts as liaison to the RCTF, and CTC and Caltrans staff typically attend these meetings to explain and discuss changing statewide transportation issues that may be of concern to the rural counties.

<u>Rural Planning Assistance (RPA):</u> Annually the 26 rural RTPAs receive state transportation planning funding, known as RPA, on a reimbursement basis, after costs are incurred and paid for using local funds.

<u>Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC):</u> Consists of representatives of potential transit users including the general public, seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local consolidated transportation service agencies; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Hispanic communities. The SSTAC meets at least once annually and has the following responsibilities:

- To maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the elderly and disabled.
- Review and recommend action to the NCTC relative to the identification of unmet transit needs and advise the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.
- Provide a forum for members to share information and concerns about existing elderly and handicapped transportation resources.

<u>State Highway Operations and Protection Program (SHOPP):</u> The SHOPP is a four-year listing of projects prepared by Caltrans.

<u>State Transit Assistance (STA):</u> These funds are provided by the State for the development and support of public transportation needs. They are allocated by the State Controller's Office to each county based on population and transit performance.

<u>State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP):</u> The STIP is a multi-year capital improvement program of transportation projects on and off the State Highway System, funded with revenues from the Transportation Investment Fund and other funding sources. STIP programming generally occurs every two years. The STIP has two funding programs, the Regional Improvement Program and the Interregional Improvement Program.

<u>Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)</u>: The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is made up of representatives of local public works and planning departments, Caltrans District 3, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, public transit operators, and the NCTC consultant engineer on retainer. Members are assigned by staff of local jurisdictions and other participating organizations. Any decisions made or actions proposed by the TAC shall be subject to the review and approval of the NCTC.

TAC responsibilities include:

- Provide technical input, assistance, and recommendations to the Commission to ensure there is comprehensive coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process for Nevada County.
- Review and comment on comprehensive regional transportation plans for the area, which include the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), and the Overall Work Program (OWP).
- Coordinate efforts and discussions to create and maintain circulation elements of the General Plan and specific plans of the member governments.

<u>Transit Development Plan (TDP):</u> Transit Development Plans study the County's transit services. They help identify transit service needs, prioritize improvements and determine the resources required for implementing modified or new service. The plans also provide a foundation for requests for State and federal funding,

<u>ransit Services Commission (TSC):</u> This commission oversees and advises as necessary the daily operations of the western Nevada County transit system. The TSC has the following responsibilities:

- Establish fares:
- Adopt the level of transit and paratransit services, including route structure and service areas;
- Monitor public response;
- Approve proposed purchase of additional vehicles;
- Review and approve the annual budget for transit and paratransit operations.

<u>Transportation Development Act (TDA):</u> The Transportation Development Act was enacted in 1971 and provides two major sources of funding for public transportation: the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and the State Transit Assistance fund (STA). The TDA funds a wide variety of transportation programs, including planning and programming activities, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, community transit services, and public transportation projects. One of NCTC's major responsibilities is the administration of TDA funding in Nevada County.

<u>Travel Demand Model (also Traffic Model):</u> A computer model used to estimate travel behavior and travel demand for a specific future time frame, based on a number of assumptions. In general, travel analysis is performed to assist decision makers in making informed transportation planning decisions. The strength of modern travel demand forecasting is the ability to ask critical "what if" questions about proposed plans and policies.

<u>Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association (TNT/TMA):</u> The Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association is dedicated to fostering public-private partnerships and resources for the advocacy and promotion of innovative solutions to the unique transportation challenges of the Truckee-North Lake Tahoe Resort Triangle. The TNT/TMA is a planning stakeholder and partner with NCTC.

<u>Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Commission (TTALUC):</u> The Truckee Tahoe Airport is an "intercounty" airport situated in both Nevada County and Placer County; therefore, a special ALUC with representatives from both counties was formed. Six members are selected, one each, by Placer and Nevada Counties' Board of Supervisors, City Selection Committees, and Airport Managers of each county. A seventh member is chosen by the other six members to represent the general public. NCTC authorized its staff on May 19, 2010, to provide staff support to the TTALUC.

<u>Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (TTALUCP):</u> A document referred to by the TTALUC and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of the Truckee Tahoe Airport. The plan defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight. The TTALUC performs consistency determinations for proposed projects in the area covered by the Compatibility Plan as needed.

<u>Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT):</u> VMT is a metric of the total miles traveled by vehicles in a defined area over a defined period of time and is often used to estimate the environmental impacts of driving, such as Greenhouse Gases and air pollutant emissions. Factors that influence VMT include travel mode, number of trips, and distance traveled. California jurisdictions are transitioning from a Level of Service (LOS) metric to a Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) metric within the California Environmental Quality Act's (CEQA) transportation analysis.

RECOMMENDATIONS & ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Meetings and Events

In 2023, the Commission continued to focus on advancing key state transportation goals related to equity, climate, safety, economic growth, and asset management through its policy, planning, and funding decisions. The Commission held seven regular business meetings, one special meeting, five interagency Equity Advisory Committee meetings, two joint meetings with the California Air Resources Board and the California Department of Housing and Community Development, two rural Town Hall meetings, one tri-state meeting with the Transportation Commissions of Oregon and

Washington, four Road Charge Technical Advisory Committee meetings, one hearing on an application for a proposed toll facility, one training on open meeting requirements for public commissions, and over a dozen program workshops. Meetings were primarily held in-person, in accordance with public health guidance related to the COVID pandemic, with the option for virtual participation to ensure public accessibility. The Commission conducts its business in a manner that ensures transparency and accountability in transportation funding decisions.

Programs and Project Allocations

This past year, the Commission approved over \$2.5 billion for new projects in the Senate Bill 1 competitive programs, the Local Transportation Climate Adaptation Program, and the Active Transportation Program with total project costs of \$9.5 billion. Prior to awarding new projects, the Commission updates guidelines for each program through a collaborative process via public workshops open to all stakeholders and the public. Updates this cycle focused on equity, climate, public engagement, and performance measurement. For the Active Transportation Program, newly programmed projects brought the total amount of program funds benefitting disadvantaged communities to over 97 percent. For the Local

Transportation Climate Adaptation Program, every project directly benefits climate-vulnerable or under-resourced communities.

The Commission also continued to allocate funds to previously approved projects totaling \$11.8 billion, which will create nearly 130,000 jobs across the state. These projects, now underway, are bringing roadways up to a state of good repair, as required by Senate Bill 1 (Beall, Chapter 5, 2017), the Road Repair and Accountability Act, while also advancing state climate goals, reducing congestion, enhancing goods movement, and making streets more accessible and safer for bicyclists and pedestrians.

Equity and Public Engagement

Convened in 2022 to advise the Commission, the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), and the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA) on how to achieve meaningful outcomes in transportation equity, environmental justice, and equitable economic opportunities, especially as related to transportation planning and programming, the Interagency Equity Advisory Committee held its first formal meetings in 2023. At those meetings the Committee adopted a charter and governance structure and elected leadership positions.

Throughout the year, Committee members supported numerous activities including scoring the community

engagement section of project applications in the Senate Bill 1 funding programs and reviewing and providing feedback on the draft program guidelines. Incorporating the experiences and expertise of the Committee members enhances the Commission's ability to fulfill its commitment to enhance equitable outcomes in its programs and policies.

The Governor also signed budget legislation recommended by the Commission that authorized compensation for Committee members for their participation in Committee activities. This milestone represents progress towards creating more equitable structures that value members' expertise.

Transportation, Climate, and Housing

In 2023 the Commission adopted the first cycle of Senate Bill 1 competitive programs to incorporate the Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure. The updated project selection process prioritizing projects that support the state's climate, public health, safety, equity and economic vitality goals resulted in more than \$100 million invested in zero-emission freight infrastructure, more multimodal and active transportation improvements than previous cycles, and mobility solutions that allow more travelers to opt out of congestion.

The Commission also completed the Clean Freight Corridor Efficiency Assessment pursuant to Senate Bill 671 (Gonzalez, Chapter 769, Statutes of 2021). The Assessment identifies freight corridors that are priority candidates for the deployment of zero-emission medium- and heavy-duty vehicles; projects to support the deployment; and barriers and potential solutions. The Commission partnered with other state agencies and a work group of over 150 stakeholders to develop the Assessment.

Transportation Funding

The Commission remains focused on ensuring adequate and sustainable funding to address the needs of California's transportation system.

On top of existing maintenance needs, climate impacts continue to drive increasingly greater costs for the state's transportation system. Storm damage from a series of atmospheric rivers led to the largest-ever major damage reservation in the State Highway Operation and Protection Program, with \$1.2 billion reserved for emergency repairs – over two times the amount reserved in an average year. Although the Legislature provided one-time funds to address infrastructure resilience needs through the Local Transportation Climate Adaptation Program, 75 percent of the funds have already been awarded and the remaining funds will not be sufficient to address the outstanding statewide need.

Combined with growing unmet needs, the anticipated decline in fuel tax revenues will limit the state's ability to fund improvements that support a safe, equitable, sustainable, multimodal transportation system. Two efforts are underway to plan for these challenges:

State and Local Transportation Needs Assessment Senate Bill 1121 (Gonzalez, Chapter 508, Statutes of 2022) requires the Commission to prepare a 10-year needs assessment that includes expected revenues for transportation, the costs required to address identified needs – including bicycle and pedestrian facilities; local streets and roads; highways, bridges, and culverts; capital and operational needs of transit, commuter rail, and intercity rail systems; and costs related to system resiliency – and recommendations to address any projected shortfall. The Interim Needs Assessment currently projects fuel tax revenues will decrease by 13 percent by fiscal year 2028-2029.

The Commission has developed a draft Interim Needs Assessment which will be finalized in early 2024 and will submit a final Needs Assessment by January 1, 2025.

Road Charge Pilot Design Recommendations
Senate Bill 339 (Wiener, Chapter 308, Statutes of
2021) required the Commission's Road Charge
Technical Advisory Committee to develop design
recommendations for a road charge pilot to be
administered by CalSTA to test revenue collection.
The Technical Advisory Committee submitted its
recommendations to CalSTA in June, including the
per mile rates for the pilot and recommendations
related to mileage reporting and data privacy.

Legislative Recommendations

The Commission recommends the Legislature consider the following recommendations developed through the **Senate Bill 671 Clean Freight Corridor Efficiency Assessment**:

- Streamline zero-emission station development by enacting a Categorical Exemption from the California Environmental Quality Act and setting a statutory default permit approval deadline for freight charging and fueling stations.
- Support fleet and truck owners through the zero-emission vehicle transition by creating a new, limited-term zero-emission truck incentive program and a vehicle buy-back program.
- Identify a Central Delivery Team to help navigate the complex stakeholder ecosystem and oversee the statewide deployment of the initial viable network needed for the widespread transition to zero-emission freight.

The California Transportation Commission was established in 1978 as an independent state agency. The Commission is responsible for funding highway, local road, transit, intercity passenger rail, active transportation, and aviation projects throughout California. NCTC AWARDED RURAL PLANNING ASSISTANCE GRANT TO CONDUCT PLANNING FOR PEDESTRIAN AND BICYCLE IMPROVEMENTS IN THE ZION STREET AND SACRAMENTO STREET CORRIDORS

In coordination with City of Nevada City, Nevada County Transportation Commission staff were awarded Rural Planning Assistance Grant funds in the amount of \$120,000 to analyze cost-effective improvements in the Zion Street Corridor related to improving safety and pedestrian and bicycle connectivity to school facilities. The study limits will be between the Ridge Road/Gold Flat Road/Zion Street intersection and Sacramento Street Bridge. The planning study is scheduled to begin in July of 2024.
