DATE:	January 26, 2022

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 22-01 approving findings and declaring its intent to continue remote teleconference meetings pursuant to Government Code section 54953(e) due to the Governor's COVID-19 State of Emergency Proclamation and state regulations related to physical distancing.

BACKGROUND: The Board has been conducting its public meetings under the Governor's Executive Orders issued in connection to the COVID-19 pandemic and its related health and safety risks which allowed legislative bodies to hold meetings exclusively by teleconference. Effective October 1, 2021, Assembly Bill (AB) 361 allows local legislative bodies to continue to hold modified remote meetings during a proclaimed state of emergency, if state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures related to physical distancing which warrant holding meetings remotely. NCTC's November meeting was the first meeting since adoption of AB 361 and the Board was not required to adopt a resolution at that meeting, however, all subsequent meetings require findings and the adoption of a resolution. Accordingly, a resolution is now before the Board.

AB 361 codifies certain provisions of the Governor's Executive Orders to allow for the following teleconference rules:

- Waives the requirement that there be a physical meeting location open to the public to attend Board meetings and comment during the meeting;
- Waives the requirement that the agenda identify and notice each teleconference location of each member of the Board that is participating by teleconference;
- Waives the requirement that each teleconference location be accessible to the public;
- Waives the requirement that members of the public be able to address the Board at each teleconference location;
- Waives the requirement that local agencies post agendas at all teleconference locations;

• Waives the requirement that at least a quorum of the Board participate from within the boundaries of the territory of the Board's jurisdiction;

AB 361 imposes additional rules for certain teleconference meetings as follows:

- Agencies cannot require that written comments be submitted in advance of a meeting, and agencies may only close the comment period at the same time it is closed during the meeting.
- The public must be given an opportunity to comment directly during the meeting and public comment periods. There must be a live time, call in or internet based public comment option.
- In the event of a disruption in broadcasting the meeting, the legislative body shall take no further action until meeting access is restored to the public.

In order for the Board to conduct meetings under the AB 361 teleconference meeting rules, the Board meetings must meet one of the following provisions:

(A) The local agency is holding a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency, and state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing; or

(B) The local agency is holding a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency for the purpose of determining, by majority vote, whether as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees; or

(C) The local agency is holding a meeting during a proclaimed state of emergency and has determined, by majority vote, that, as a result of the emergency, meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

The AB 361 modified teleconference meeting rules can only be used in the event there is a Governor issued state of emergency. The Governor's COVID-19 state of emergency satisfies this requirement.

The second requirement of item (A) above is satisfied currently as state officials imposed and recommended measures to promote social distancing. California Division of Occupational Safety and Health ("Cal/OSHA") regulations related to COVID-19 recommend physical distancing and regulates "close contact" which occurs when individuals are within six feet of another in certain circumstances.

RESOLUTION 22-01 OF THE NEVADA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

DECLARING ITS INTENT TO CONTINUE REMOTE TELECONFERENCE ONLY MEETINGS DUE TO THE GOVERNOR'S PROCLAMATION OF STATE OF EMERGENCY AND STATE REGULATIONS RELATED TO PHYSICAL DISTANCING DUE TO THE THREAT OF COVID-19

WHEREAS, the Nevada County Transportation Commission ("NCTC") is committed to preserving public access and participation in meetings of NCTC; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of NCTC are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963, the "Brown Act"), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and observe NCTC conduct its business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), provides for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the State, specifically, the Governor of the State of California proclaimed a state of emergency on March 4, 2020, related to the threat of COVID-19, which threat remains; and

WHEREAS, California Department of Public Health and the Federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention caution that the Omicron variant of COVID- 19, currently the dominant strain of COVID-19 in the country, is more transmissible than prior variants of the virus, may cause more severe illness, and that even fully vaccinated individuals can spread the virus to others resulting in rapid and alarming rates of COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations; and

WHEREAS, the California Division of Occupational Safety and Health ("Cal/OSHA") regulations at Title 8 Section 3205 recommends physical distancing in the workplace as precautions against the spread of COVID-19 and imposes certain restrictions and requirements due to a "close contact" which occurs when individuals are within six feet of another in certain circumstances; and

WHEREAS, to allow for physical distancing and remote meeting attendance in accordance with recommended measures from Cal/OSHA, NCTC does hereby find that NCTC shall conduct its meetings without compliance with paragraph (3) of subdivision (b) of Government Code section 54953, as authorized by subdivision (e) of section 54953, and that NCTC shall comply with the requirements to provide the public with access to the meetings electronically as prescribed in paragraph (2) of subdivision (e) of section 54953.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Nevada County Transportation Commission hereby submits:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.
- 2. NCTC hereby recognizes the Governor's proclaimed state of emergency remains in effect and continues to impact the ability of NCTC and the public to meet safely in person. NCTC further recognizes the recommendation of State and local officials promoting social distancing.
- 3. NCTC shall conduct public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act for remote only teleconference meetings.

This is a staff recommendation to approve Amendment 1 to the current Fiscal Year 2021/22 Overall Work Program. This Amendment updates the estimated carryover revenue amounts based on the reconciled final year-end expenditure for the previous Fiscal Year 2020/21, and addresses minor increases in indirect costs. This Amendment creates two additional Work Elements to include the planning activities and budgets for the update of the Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan and the Rural Counties Task Force Rural Induced Demand Study, reflecting the \$125,000 Rural Planning Assistance grant that was awarded to the RCTF to conduct a study on induced demand in relation to rural highway projects. That study is being managed by NCTC staff on behalf of the Rural Counties Task Force.

9. <u>PUBLIC HEARING: FY 2021/22 Regional Transportation Improvement Program</u> Resolution 21-26

This is the staff recommendation for adoption of NCTC's Fiscal Year 2021/22 Regional Transportation Improvement Program of Projects for inclusion in the 2022 State Transportation Improvement Program, known as the STIP. Part of this recommendation action includes conducting a public hearing on the proposed RTIP. Revenues for projects included in the State Transportation Improvement Program are divided between two funding programs; 75% of the funding is available by formula to the regions and is known as Regional Improvement Program Funding. The other 25% is controlled by Caltrans and is known as Interregional Improvement Program Funding. Every two years, NCTC submits regional transportation projects to the California Transportation Commission for funding in the Regional Transportation Improvement Program. Projects from each county are then approved by the CTC.

Those projects are combined into the State Transportation Improvement Program, a five-year program of projects that gets updated every two years. A schedule for the proposed funding is established and the projects are considered eligible for funding. NCTC has a total of \$3,183,000 available for programming in the 2022 STIP through Fiscal Year 2026/27. During each STIP cycle, each Regional Transportation Planning Agency may utilize up to 5% of its Regional Improvement Program funds for Planning, Programming and Monitoring activities.

In Fiscal Years 2025/26 and 2026/27, NCTC has a total of \$177,000 available in the 2022 STIP for Planning, Programming and Monitoring. Staff is recommending \$88,500 be programmed in FY 2025/26 and another \$88,500 in FY 2026/27. Staff is also recommending programming \$3,000,000 of NCTC's Regional Improvement Program funding for the Right of Way phase for the State Route 49 Corridor Improvement Project Phase Two in Fiscal Year 2022/23. This is in partnership with Caltrans and will match \$3,000,000 of Interregional Improvement Program funding. The State Route 49 Corridor Improvement Project begins at the limits of the previous La Barr Meadows Signalization

Project, and ends just south of the McKnight Way interchange, connecting to the four-lane Golden Center Freeway.

The project will focus on improving safety, evacuation capacity, operations, goods movement, and multimodal mobility. The project is designed to be funded in three phases, as state and federal transportation funding allows. Phase Two is construction of the southbound truck climbing lane, and 10 foot shoulders with rumble strips. It eliminates the merge points south of McKnight Way, improving the Southbound highway segment and increasing evacuation capacity. This phase will also include safety features such as wet night visibility striping, rumble strips, and pavement edge treatments.

A public comment from A. Bodily was read into the record, asking about property acquisitions and sound walls, and agreeing that improvements were needed on this segment. Mr. Woodman stated the sound walls are determined based on the sound studies that were conducted for the project, and that he would forward the public comment to Caltrans for follow up.

11. Executive Director's Report

- Caltrans 2021 Interregional Transportation Strategic Plan Update
- Caltrans 2021 Interregional Transportation Improvement Program Funding Recommendations

Executive Director Woodman commented that Caltrans approved the 2021 Interregional Transportation Strategic Plan Update on October 1, 2021. Prior to approval, NCTC staff coordinated with the Rural Counties Task Force and North State Super Region to provide comments on the draft plan. Concerns were raised regarding the proposed scoring criteria that guides the investment decisions for the plan. In response to those comments, Caltrans headquarters addressed the concerns regarding the ITIP scoring criteria, which in turn was helpful in securing \$3,000,000 of partnership funding in the Interregional Transportation Improvement Program recommendations.

NCTC and stakeholders have been advocating with Caltrans for funding from the Interregional Transportation Improvement Program, and due to their efforts, and support from our local and state agencies for this project, the State Route 49 Corridor Improvement Project was the only highway project proposed for funding. The other projects were rail and active transportation focused projects. The stakeholders did a great job. We highlighted the importance of the project, the multimodal benefits, as well as evacuation and safety and goods movement, and worked with Caltrans to identify why this project is so important to the community and this corridor.

Commissioner Hoek commented that we are fortunate to have Mike Woodman chairing the North State Super Region, and it is great that we are getting results from our efforts to secure this funding.

16. <u>Project Status Reports</u>:

Caltrans Projects: Sam Vandell, Caltrans District 3 Project Manager for Nevada County.

Sam Vandell reviewed the November Caltrans Project Status Report. The Omega Curve Correction project on Highway 20 is anticipated to begin construction by the end of January. There will be a number of public meetings and information provided regarding the project impacts. The Gold Nugget project on Highway 20 is anticipated to begin construction fall 2023 with completion in winter 2024.

Mr. Vandell thanked Executive Director Woodman and his team for the efforts on the Nevada 49 Corridor Improvement Project. A major milestone was achieved on this project, and design is anticipated to be completed by fall 2025 with construction anticipated for winter 2026 and completion for winter 2028. They still need to identify and secure funding for the construction and portions of the Right of Way on this project. The Round Valley and Quail Creek project has been completed and finalized. In Placer County, for the Safety Barrier project south of the county line, the preferred alternative of two roundabouts will be installed with the median barrier. Construction will begin summer 2022 with completion in summer 2024. The project schedule might be updated due to Right of Way acquisition time lengths.

On Interstate 80, the Yuba Pass Bridge Replacement project is anticipating completion of the environmental document in winter 2022. The Rumble Strips project on I-80 in Truckee from West Donner Park overcrossing to Trout Creek undercrossing is expected to begin this coming Spring 2022 with completion in winter 2025.

In response to a question about the federal Infrastructure Bill, Mr. Vandell said it is heavily funded for transit projects, and highway projects are not as high a priority, but he hopes there will be some benefits for Nevada County. Mr. Woodman added it looks like there will be some funding for repair and rebuilding of our roads and bridges, with a focus on climate mitigation, resiliency, equity, and safety for all users, and a focus on reducing greenhouse gas emissions through investment in public transit. There will also be funding for rail, the largest investment in passenger rail since the creation of Amtrak. The Placer County Transportation Planning Agency submitted for a Caltrans planning grant to look at extending the Amtrak passenger rail to Truckee, Tahoe and Reno, so there could potentially be funding for that. There is funding for the national network of EV chargers. The North State Super Region has been commenting to the California Energy Commission about this to make sure that charging infrastructure is installed across the North State Super Region, not just the populous areas of the state. To make our infrastructure resilient against impacts of climate change and extreme weather events, we want to make a push in the next reauthorization of transportation funding, to make improvements to our evacuation routes so people can safely evacuate in the event of wildfires that are driven by climate change. Staff will be working closely with Caltrans headquarters and other regional agencies to see how Nevada County and the rest of the regions can fit into this Infrastructure Bill.

Mr. Woodman said staff will continue to have discussions with Caltrans headquarters as well as the California State Transportation Agency to identify vegetation management funding for corridors like Highways 49 and 20 in high wildfire danger areas.

READY NEVADA COUNY EXTREME CLIMATE EVENT MOBILITY & ADAPTATION PLAN

As part of the regional transportation planning process, the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), in coordination with the Nevada County Office of Emergency Services, local jurisdictions, and Caltrans District 3, contracted with the consulting firms GHD Inc. and Rincon Consultants Inc. to help prepare the READY Nevada County - Extreme Climate Event Mobility & Adaptation Plan. The purpose of this planning effort is to prepare a transportation related extreme climate event vulnerability assessment and climate adaptation strategies.

The study will identify the climate-related weaknesses of the transportation system in Nevada County and provide actionable strategies for integration into transportation plans, transportation improvement programs, and emergency response plans for the region. The development and implementation of these strategies will help mitigate and reduce the duration and severity of climate-related impacts and improve safety. Another key objective includes enhanced communication channels and cross-education of best practices from local and regional first responders (e.g. local fire, police, and sheriff departments, CALFIRE, CHP, and others); and educating citizens and public officials.

To date the consultant team has completed the review of background climate data and projections (precipitation, temperature, wildfire risk, dam failure, etc.) and identification of potential vulnerabilities. The consultant has conducted an inventory and evaluation of vulnerable populations, communities, transportation infrastructure, and other key resources. The consultant has also conducted climate event debriefing interviews with public officials, first responders, and other key stakeholders from nearby communities impacted by recent extreme climate events to identify vulnerabilities, lessons learned, and gather possible strategies to address future events.

An online public workshop was held on May 5, 2021 to introduce the project to the public, present an overview of existing conditions data, and gather initial input. A second online public workshop was held November 3, 2021 to discuss the results of the analysis of potential impacts to the transportation

system from extreme climate events (extreme temperature, precipitation, snowpack, landslide, wildfire) and to review preliminary adaptation concepts and strategies for discussion.

The draft plan is anticipated to be completed in April. Following completion of the draft plan it will be made available for review by partner agencies and an online public workshop will be scheduled to provide an additional opportunity for input. The consultant will present an overview of the study findings and recommendations at the May 18, 2022 NCTC meeting.

Subject: Truckee Transportation Program Update

In August 2021, Kelly Beede, Administrative Analyst for the Town Truckee's Tahoe Area Regional Transit (TART) system, concluded her career with the Town and headed off into her well-deserved retirement. As part this transition process, the Town hired Alfred Knotts to serve as Transit Program Manager focused on the management and growth of the existing transit program as well as a more comprehensive and and holistic multi-modal transportation program. Since arriving in September 2021, Alfred has taken the opportunity to quickly familiarize myself with the existing system in terms of Key Performance Indicators as well as the financial and contractual relationships that support our system and the critical role it plays in our community and resort-based economy. In addition to the oversight of the short- and long-range elements of the Truckee TART system, several strategic transportation initiatives have been undertaken which are described in more detail below.

Truckee TART System Update

As with national, regional, and local peer transit systems, Truckee TART operations continue to be challenged by labor shortages and the ongoing COVID pandemic. While we have been able to provide our core services related to the Truckee Local Route, complimentary ADA service, and general public Dial-a-Ride, a tough decision was made in late October to suspend our regional night service that provided service from the Truckee Depot to resort base areas of Northstar and Palisades Tahoe along State Route 267 and State Route 89, respectively. This decision was made in close consultation with our resort partners as well as regional transit partners at Placer County and as result of carrying approximately 0.50 passengers per hour.

Other consideration that went into the suspension of this service as lack of available drivers which was requiring the General Manager and Operations Supervisor to serve as drivers on a daily basis. This decision reduced cost while balancing environmental and social benefit and improving operator morale and in advance of the peak winter season.

While the operating climate has been challenging Truckee TART DOES continue to see increases in ridership over last year (with the exception of the month of October):

Truckee TART Ridership Comparison

At the time of preparing this report, both Placer County and the Town continue to struggle to recruit, hire, and retain staff necessary to operate at the levels of service anticipated for the winter season. For this reason, Truckee TART winter night time regional service was not reinitiated as planned and our North Shore regional partners are also struggling to achieve their necessary levels of staffing.

Microtransit Feasibility and Pilot Program

Given these constraints, staff sees potential opportunities to improve efficiencies, expand coverage, and increase ridership. As such, Town staff has embarked on an effort to evaluate the feasibility of developing and implementing a Microtransit program with the goal of implementing a near term summer 2022 pilot program. The Town currently has a Request for Proposal out for solicitation and has identified the Glenshire and Tahoe Donner communities as potential pilot program service areas. The evolution of Microtransit in the "Resort Triangle" area of Truckee, Tahoe City, and Kings Beach/Incline Village is currently underway. Microtransit has recently been implemented by both public and private partners in the form of the "TART Connect" (https://tahoetruckeetransit.com/tart-connect/) in Placer County and "Mountaineer" that operates seasonally in Olympic Valley (https://www.squawalpinetransit.org/mountaineer-services). These programs have proven to be successful in "getting people out of their cars" including those that typically would have used their private vehicle rather than using traditional fixed route mass transit. By facilitating mode shift, reductions in VMT and associated Greenhouse Gases can be realized as well as the need for bigger capital investments such as roadway expansion and increases in parking inventory. This accomplishes many Council goals with the potential of improving service and reliability for the end user.

Railyard Transit Plaza (formerly known as the "Transit Center Relocation Project")

As the Commission was informed in March 2021, the Transit Center Relocation Feasibility Study was completed in October 2020 resulting in the identification of the "North Balloon Parcel" as the preferred site/alternative.



Since the last update to the Commission, staff has been meeting regularly with the owner of the parcel, Truckee Development Associates, to finalize the acquisition of the parcels. It is anticipated that this acquisition process will be complete by April 2022. Concurrent with the acquisition process, the Town is also working in close consultation with Caltrans Division of Mass Transit and Rail as well Federal Transit Administration (FTA) Region 9 to obtain environmental clearance as required under National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) to position the Town and project for future FTA funding. As part of this consultation, FTA has scoped the level of environmental analysis and subsequent clearance as a Categorical Exclusion under Title 23 of the Code of Federal Regulations Part §771.118. The Town would then proceed with final design with construction phased construction scheduled to commence during the 2023 construction season.

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E-Bike Share Program

To achieve sustainability as well as mobility goals associated with reduced Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) and associated Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions, the Town is in the process of identifying a qualified vendor to implement and manage a Town sponsored E-bike Share Program. The RFP solicitation process concluded on December 28th, 2021 and resulted in the Town receiving eight (8) proposals. Proposals included various operating and business models ranging from docked vs. dockless stations, E-bikes supported by a combination of e-scooters, and various cost models. The Town convened an Evaluation Committee consisting of representatives from the Town, Placer County, Nevada County, and Visit Truckee Tahoe which recommended a narrowed down list of qualified vendors. Staff hopes to bring a recommendation to Town Council in February 2022 with the goal of implementing this program during the summer of 2022. Preliminary sites identified as part of the Phase 1 implementation are as follows:



Preliminary Bike Share Site Assessment

It should be noted to the Commission that within the RFP a heavy emphasis was placed on the vendors demonstrated ability to operate and maintain a system in a similar geographic location as well as resort and second homeowner community. Emphasis was also placed on demonstrated proven technology that can be expanded to other regional areas outside the Town limits as to be seamless to the user with a focus on compatible infrastructure and consistent fee structures and payment methods.

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Truckee Trails Sales Tax Renewal

In 2014, Town of Truckee (Town) residents voted to approve Measure R, a ¼% sales tax dedicated to the construction and maintenance of trails. Specifically, the ballot language provided for the following expenditure authority:

"Completing the Truckee River Legacy Trail, building and maintaining paved and dirt trails, and protecting the environment and natural open space along trail corridors. Specific uses that would be allowed include pavement maintenance, erosion control, sweeping, litter removal, snow removal and other winter maintenance, and repair or replacement of bridges, signs, bike racks, sanitation facilities, and other amenities."

This existing taxing authority provided for a ten (10) year life on the measure which means the measure is set to expire on June 3, 2024. Given the important role trails play in the Town's quality of life, economic vitality, sustainability, overall transportation system, and goals of reducing Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) and GHG emissions, staff has initiated renewal of this measure.

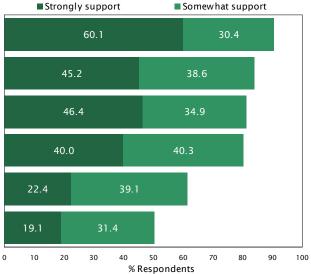
In October 2021, Town staff obtained Council approval to proceeded with conducting a public opinion survey related to the renewal of the existing Measure R. This survey was completed in November 2021 and results indicated the community supported the reauthorization or Measure R and at a rate of 1/2% vs. the current ¼%. At the January 11, 2022 Town Council meeting, the Council unanimously passed and adopted Resolution 2022-03 which authorized the placement of this ballot measure on the June 2022 County ballot. Should this measure pass, the Town will continue and even accelerate priority trails projects, including bicycle lanes, to expand the Town's Active Transportation network and elevate year-round levels of service for maintenance.

It is important to note to the Commission that as part of aforementioned survey effort, staff and Council saw added value in leveraging this effort to obtain additional information related to public sentiment toward the broader transportation system and associated solutions and services. Therefore, a limited number of questions were asked related to transportation and more specifically, active transportation and transit. Below are some results obtained from the survey related to transit and transportation:

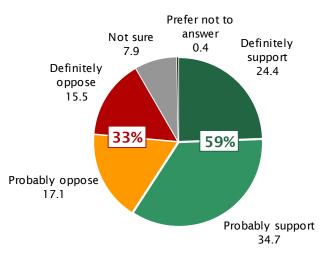
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Support for mobility services:
