5. <u>Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) Program Annual</u> <u>Report for FY 2021/22</u> Report Approved

The Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee program was originally adopted in January of 2001 by City of Grass Valley, City of Nevada City, and Nevada County. The purpose of the program is to ensure that new development funds its fair share towards financing identified regional transportation improvements to mitigate their associated impact in relation to increased traffic. The fees are collected by the jurisdictions, and NCTC administers the program.

The Annual Report assists the cities and county to comply with Government Code 66006 that requires agencies that adopt fees to provide an annual report presented at a public meeting. The annual report documents the capital improvements for which the fees are collected, identifies the approximate date anticipated for construction, presents the fee schedule, documents any interfund transfers, loans or refunds from the Regional Transportation Mitigation Program fund, the amount of fees collected and interest and expenditures for each improvement, and the total percentage of the cost of the public improvement that was funded with the fees. This information is presented in the exhibits that accompany the annual report.

The Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee is a developer fee for transportation improvements collected by the local jurisdictions when a building permit is pulled for a project. Those fees are then transferred to NCTC who holds the fund and administers the program. For a residential development, the trip rate is calculated based off the Institute for Transportation Engineers Trip Generation Manual. The county and the jurisdictions utilize the fee to generate revenues for regional transportation improvements that are outside of the local jurisdictions' capital improvement programs. The fee is developed and updated every five years. As part of the project advisory committee, NCTC staff work closely with the Nevada County Contractors Association, and a main focus is to make sure that the fee is fair and reasonable, and that there is a strong nexus established between the development, the impacts, and the needed improvements.

An update of the RTMF program is currently underway, and will be presented to the Commission by the consultants, who will provide presentations and the opportunity for further discussion.

<u>TDA Allocation Request from the Town of Truckee for STA Funds for Transit Capital Costs</u> <u>During FY 2022/23</u> Resolution 22-37

The Town of Truckee requested State Transit Assistance capital funds for their Railyard Transit Center project. The project proposes to relocate buses from the current congested depot site to a more favorable location, and the \$279,000 from the State Transit Assistance fund will go towards purchase of the property.

The Town of Truckee went through a public process to look at several different sites, and was able to secure a site within the railyard redevelopment project that accommodated the future needs of the transfer facility. This allocation will complete the funding for the right of way and allow them to move forward with development of the new Transit Center site. The Town is looking to make a big push on increased public transportation, not just fixed route buses, but also multimodal transportation like biking.

Town of Truckee Transportation Program Manager Alfred Knotts explained that the parcel for this project was made available to the Town as part of the Railyard Master Plan several years ago. The downtown depot will continue to function as an interregional location, and will include Amtrak, Greyhound buses, and multimodal connections. The new facility will be located adjacent to future development and more high-density residential uses, and will accommodate 8 to 10 buses, have more curb space for private shuttles, and for transportation network companies like Uber and Lyft. It will function like a multimodal mobility hub, with programs like bike sharing and connections to bicycle and pedestrian facilities such as Legacy Trail and Trout Creek Trail. With a combination of funding from the General Fund, State of Good Repair, and Caltrans local public partnership funds, this allocation will be very helpful in making the overall funding for the project possible.

7. <u>Executive Director's Report</u>

The California Transportation Commission released their staff funding recommendations for Cycle Six of the Active Transportation Program, and both of NCTC's submitted projects, the State Route 49 Multimodal Corridor Improvement project, and the State Route 174/49/20 Roundabout project, were recommended for funding. Both of those projects total a combined funding recommendation of just over \$19 million of Active Transportation Program funding. The State Route 49 Multimodal Corridor Improvement project received a recommendation for \$13.8 million from the Small Rural and Urban Funding component, and the State Route 174/49/20 Roundabout project was recommended for \$5.4 million from the Statewide Funding component.

The State Route 174/49/20 Roundabout project will begin in 2023/24, with construction scheduled for 2026/27. NCTC is working closely with the City of Grass Valley on this project, which will improve safety operations and pedestrian mobility in entering the downtown corridor.

The State Route 49 Multimodal Corridor Improvement project came about as part of citizen input at an NCTC commission meeting where concerns were raised about this corridor. The project will eliminate the high-speed slip ramp where drivers exit Highway 49 onto West Broad Street at a relatively high rate of speed heading towards Chief Kelly Drive, a location that has seen a lot of near misses. There will be a sidewalk extending up Cement Hill Road on both sides, providing connections to Hirschman Trail. The Orchard Street/Maidu Avenue intersection will utilize a roundabout for safe crossing and help reduce speeds through the corridor. The North Bloomfield intersection will be improved with modern crosswalks and crossing features, and there will be a decomposed granite trail heading from North Bloomfield Road towards Coyote Street and continuing on towards State Route 20/49. This project will improve pedestrian mobility and safety throughout the corridor. Decomposed granite will be used on the trail to keep the costs down, but if there was a desire to pave the trail, that project would be eligible for Congestion Mitigation Air Quality funding.

The project does not include improvements to the Hwy 49/20/Uren Street intersection at this time due to the amount of earth work it would take to lower the steep grade coming down to that intersection, but it may be considered for future funding possibilities.

The project includes roundabouts as opposed to signals for safety reasons. With signals there tend to be more high-speed accidents with more severe injuries, while roundabouts reduce speeds which slow the traffic through the corridor. The high-speed slip ramp where drivers exit Highway 49 onto West Broad Street will have a roundabout that will help reduce speeds of the traffic there. For the timeline of the project, environmental documentation will start in 2023/24, design and right of way will progress in 2025/26, and construction will begin in 2026/27.

The State Route 174/49/20 Roundabout project will provide better pedestrian connections to and from the Park-and-Ride in that location, which may enhance utilization of the parking area there.

On another topic, Mr. Woodman was invited to participate on the Institute of Transportation Engineers Senate Bill 743 Task Force, which will be focused on clarifying issues surrounding the analysis of highway capacity increasing projects. As part of this effort, the Task Force will prepare several technical white papers to help inform State guidance on these issues.

11. Project Status Report

A. Caltrans Project: Sam Vandell, Caltrans District 3 Project Manager for Nevada County.

Sam Vandell, Caltrans District 3 Project Manager for Nevada County, reviewed the November Caltrans Project Status Report.

Sam Vandell and Masha Bokova gave a presentation on safety data for the Highway 20 corridor from the Yuba County line to the Golden Center Freeway. The safety analysis was done for 10 years and incorporated a stretch of 12 miles. The collision data indicated that a primary collision factor on the corridor is speeding. Based on this information, there does not appear to be any collision patterns that could be corrected through a safety project. The collisions and fatalities are well below the state average, and typically projects or studies are initiated when collisions are above the state average. Most of the accidents happened during daylight hours and in dry conditions, with a higher percentage during the holiday months of November and December. It was suggested that a map showing the accident locations could be useful in determining if there is a section that can be identified and further evaluated.

Wet collisions are those that occur on wet pavement where hydroplaning might have been a factor. If the number of those collisions is high, they would initiate a project that would install a high friction surface. Based on this safety data, the number was low, with a majority of collisions occurring on dry pavement during daylight and clear weather. The pavement is currently a rubberized open grade asphalt, which allows the water to drain below the surface to the next level of asphalt, which helps divert water off the surface. The first big rain of the season can make for hazardous conditions, as oils, parts of tires, low micro particles, and other vehicle materials get deposited on the road. It is important during this period to drive safe for the conditions, and to avoid speeding and other distractions such as cell phone texting.

There was concern about the particular segment between Rough and Ready Highway and the Golden Center Freeway, where there is a steep grade and drivers tend to travel very fast. Caltrans will work on reviewing that segment more thoroughly, develop a map of the collisions in that section and do further investigation to see if there is more that can be done to provide a safer corridor. Executive Director Woodman suggested a long-term solution could be doing a Safety Needs Assessment for both of the segments of Highway 20, west between Penn Valley and Grass Valley as well as northeast of Nevada City. Looking at the accident data from the updating of the Regional Transportation Plan, there is a large cluster of accidents occurring between the stretch from Nevada City to Scott's Flat Road, and a Safety Needs Assessment could be helpful in finding solutions that could be applied in both corridors. Mr. Vandell will talk to the Planning and Safety Departments to see about doing safety reviews and audits in those segments to give more insight into potential traffic patterns and issues. CHP enforcement helps drive down high speeds, and despite the challenges of funding constraints and staffing issues, they have had a presence in these corridors, providing enforcement on a fairly regular basis.

There have been some complaints involving the Highway 20 widening project, particularly about the recreational trail being blocked off during the construction at White Cloud. Hopefully Caltrans can work with the Forest Service and the local bike club to find a way to have a quick detour on a couple of those areas, because that trail is used year-round.

There have also been some complaints involving the construction on Highway 20, where dust is being kicked up from construction and street sweepers on the turn that drops down into Bear Valley. Drivers stopped at the one-way control point have had to turn on their headlights to see through the dust, as the contractors were not using water mitigation or moisture. It would be good to address this issue with the contractors before things dry out again next spring.

Caltrans was reminded to look into adding the merge lane arrows at the Wolf/Combie Road intersection on Highway 49 going in both directions to help mitigate any problems with drivers trying to merge onto the highway and causing a backup of traffic there.

B. Truckee Tahoe Area Regional Transit Report – Alfred Knotts, Transportation Program Manager for Town of Truckee

Alfred Knotts, Transportation Program Manager for Town of Truckee, reviewed the Truckee Transit Report.

The fixed route and Dial-A-Ride systems are starting to see a rebounding of the transit service to pre-COVID levels, about a 30% increase over last year.

Truckee Tart implemented a pilot program of a micro transit service, which is an app-based system for on-demand transit where rides can be scheduled from door to door, in the summer period from June 25 to September 5. It was a free supplemental service that increased their ridership with new clients, making up about 70% of their overall ridership. The service was funded using local and general funds, not Transportation Development Act funds. They were able to get the additional funding to initiate a winter pilot program that will run from December 15 to April 2. The service area will be extended to include the middle school and some low income and affordable housing projects.

The Railyard Transit Plaza and Transit Center will be done in phases, with site design and development this summer, and construction in the 2024/25 season.

The sales tax renewal initiative was passed, increasing the tax for their trail system from a quarter cent to a half cent sales tax, which will generate \$3 to \$3.5 million per year based on historic collections. The voters also approved, by nearly 80%, a no sunset date. That will help leverage federal and state dollars, and increase levels of service on maintenance and other amenities such as trail construction. Keeping the trails open during the winter period has been a high priority, which they have been able to do with the passage of these funds.

Nevada County Transit Manager Robin Van Valkenburgh asked if Truckee Transit might lean more towards eliminating the Dial-A-Ride service and maintaining the micro transit service as a feeder to the fixed route into the Highway 267 and 89 corridors. Mr. Knotts said they have LSC Transportation Consultants looking at alternatives of how the micro transit service could be incorporated into the existing system, and how the use of the technology could be used. He said in their area of service the average trip length is about five miles. They will be looking to see what options might be the most efficient and cost effective.

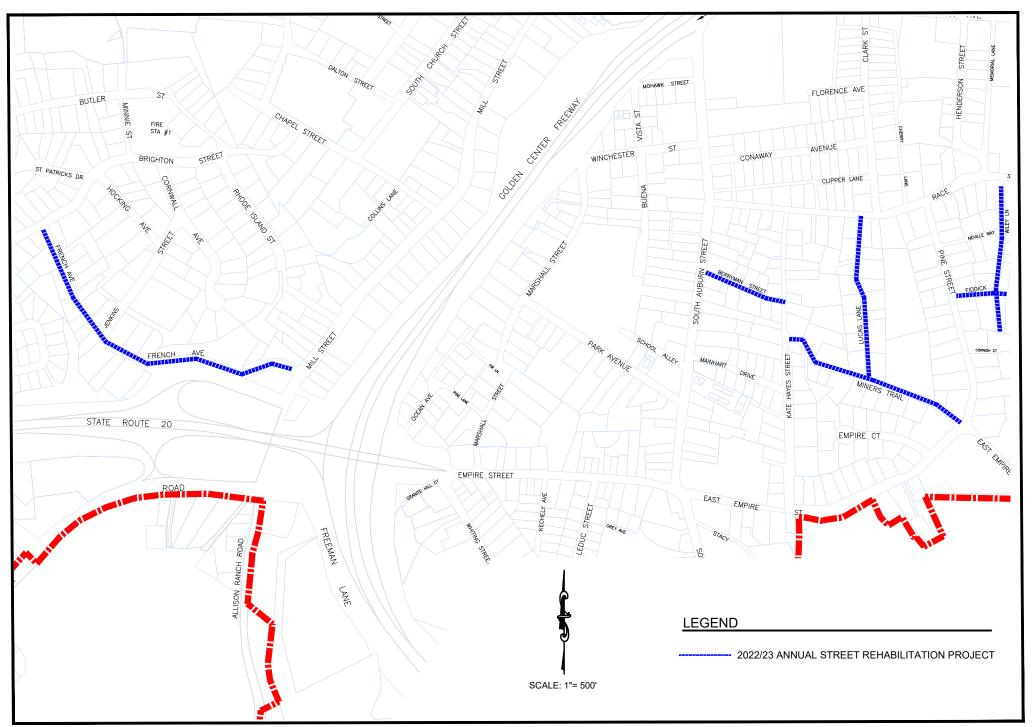

Dear Mr. Jones:

This agreement, when countersigned, authorizes the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) to perform contract management and oversight of the RSTP exchange funds distributed to Grass Valley, hereinafter referred to as "RSTP Exchange Recipient".

The RSTP Exchange Recipient agrees to the following:

- 1. To use RSTP exchange funds for projects as authorized under Article XIX of the California State Constitution.
- Establish a special account for the purpose of depositing therein all payments received from NCTC pursuant to this Agreement: (a) for cities, within their Special Gas Tax Street Improvement Fund, (b) for counties, within their County Road Fund, and (c) for all other sponsors, a separate account.
- 3. To return RSTP exchange funds to NCTC if the funds received are not used in accordance with the terms of this agreement.
- 4. Cost Principles
 - a. To comply with Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200, Cost Principles for State and Local Government and the Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.
 - b. That (A) Contract Cost Principles and Procedures, 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31, Et Seq., shall be used to determine the allowability of individual project cost items and (B) those parties shall comply with Federal Administrative Procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements To State and Local Governments. Every subrecipient receiving funds as a contractor or subcontractor under this agreement shall comply with

Federal administrative procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.

- c. Repay any RSTP exchange fund expenditures for costs that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200. Any reimburse fund moneys are due within 30 days of demand, or within such other period as may be agreed in writing between the parties.
- 5. Third Party Contracting
 - a. Shall not award a construction contract over \$10,000 or other contracts over \$25,000 [excluding professional service contracts of the type which are required to be procured in accordance with Government Code Sections 4525 (d), (e) and (f)] on the basis of a noncompetitive negotiation for work to be performed.
 - b. Any subcontract or agreement entered into as a result of disbursing funds received pursuant to this agreement shall contain all of the fiscal provisions of this agreement; and shall mandate that travel and per diem reimbursements and third-party contract reimbursements to subcontractors will be allowable as project costs only after those costs are incurred and paid for by the subcontractors.
 - c. In addition to the above, the pre-award requirements of third-party contractor/consultants should be consistent with Local Program Procedures as published by the California Department of Transportation.
- 6. Accounting System
 - a. Shall establish and maintain an accounting system and records that properly accumulate and segregate fund expenditures by line item. The accounting system, including contractors and all subcontractors, shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices.
- 7. Right to Audit
 - a. For the purpose of determining compliance with this agreement and other matters connected with the performance of contracts with third parties, the RSTP Exchange Recipient, contractors, and subcontractors shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts. All of the above referenced parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times for three years from the date of final payment of funds. The California Department of Transportation, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of State of California or the United States Department for audits, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and shall be furnish copies thereof if requested.

- 8. Travel and Subsistence
 - a. Payments for travel and subsistence expenses claimed for reimbursement or applied as local match credit shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid exempt non-represented State employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules. If the rates invoiced are in excess of those authorized DPA rates, then recipient of funds is responsible for the cost difference and any overpayments shall be reimbursed on demand.
- 9. Project Completion
 - a. Agrees to provide to NCTC a report summarizing total project costs and milestones for each project using RSTP Exchange Funds within sixty (60) days of project completion.

Project Description and Location (See Attachment A):

The West River Streetscape Project will construct streetscape improvements along West River Street in downtown Truckee between Mill Street and Bridge Street. The purpose of the project is to implement improvements to create an attractive, safe, walkable, and accessible corridor that provides better connectivity for all users in downtown Truckee. The project includes implementation of curb, gutter, sidewalk, a pedestrian median island, landscaping, utility undergrounding, and parking improvements. The project construction will commence in the spring/summer of 2023.

The Envision DPR Corridor Improvement Phase 1 Project will construct sidewalks where they do not currently exist and will enhance the pedestrian crosswalks along Donner Pass Road from Richards Boulevard to State Route 89 South.

Public Involvement in Project Development: First envisioned as a part of the 2003 Downtown Streetscape Master Plan, the Town initiated the design contract for this project in 2018. Town staff held two public meetings (in 2018 and 2019) and met with every property owner along the corridor multiple times. Additional outreach occurred as a part of the creation of an assessment district along the

corridor, which will provide partial funding for ongoing maintenance (including snow removal) of the improvements. Staff also presented updates and information at regularly scheduled Town Council Meetings in 2018, 2019, 2020, 2021, 2022, and 2023, to execute contracts, provide input on design, or form the assessment district.

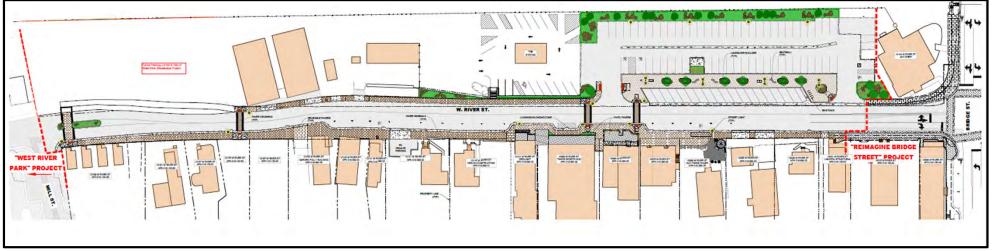
Consistency with Adopted Plans and Policies: The Project is consistent with the Town of Truckee Downtown Specific Plan, the 2025 General Plan, and the Trails and Bikeways Master Plan. Applicable General Plan policies include:

P1.6 Ensure that the design and functionality of the Town roadway network in keeping with the goals and policies of this General Plan concerning community character. Examples of such policies include those listed under Goal CC-3, as well as policies for the Gateway Area, Brockway Road and West River Street in the Community Character Element.

P6.2 Use road and intersection improvement projects as an opportunity to improve the aesthetic quality of the intersection or roadway in question. Such improvements could include sidewalk installations, landscaping, medians, improved street lighting or pavement treatments.

P10.3 Identify and implement new pedestrian facilities beyond those identified in the Trails and Bikeways Master Plan and Downtown Streetscape Plan. These facilities may include, but not be limited to, pedestrian facilities along Donner Pass Road between Cold Stream Road and South Shore Drive, along Highway 89 South, and along West River Street

Dear Ms. Bucar:

This agreement, when countersigned, authorizes the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) to perform contract management and oversight of the RSTP exchange funds distributed to The Town of Truckee, hereinafter referred to as "RSTP Exchange Recipient".

The RSTP Exchange Recipient agrees to the following:

- 1. To use RSTP exchange funds for projects as authorized under Article XIX of the California State Constitution.
- Establish a special account for the purpose of depositing therein all payments received from NCTC pursuant to this Agreement: (a) for cities, within their Special Gas Tax Street Improvement Fund, (b) for counties, within their County Road Fund, and (c) for all other sponsors, a separate account.
- 3. To return RSTP exchange funds to NCTC if the funds received are not used in accordance with the terms of this agreement.
- 4. Cost Principles
 - a. To comply with Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200, Cost Principles for State and Local Government and the Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.
 - b. That (A) Contract Cost Principles and Procedures, 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31, Et Seq., shall be used to determine the

allowability of individual project cost items, and (B) those parties shall comply with Federal Administrative Procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments. Every subrecipient receiving funds as a contractor or subcontractor under this agreement shall comply with Federal administrative procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments for Grants and Cooperative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.

- c. Repay any RSTP exchange fund expenditures for costs that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200. Any reimburse fund moneys are due within 30 days of demand, or within such other period as may be agreed in writing between the parties.
- 5. Third Party Contracting
 - a. Shall not award a construction contract over \$10,000 or other contracts over \$25,000 [excluding professional service contracts of the type which are required to be procured in accordance with Government Code Sections 4525 (d), (e) and (f)] on the basis of a noncompetitive negotiation for work to be performed.
 - b. Any subcontract or agreement entered into as a result of disbursing funds received pursuant to this agreement shall contain all of the fiscal provisions of this agreement; and shall mandate that travel and per diem reimbursements and third-party contract reimbursements to subcontractors will be allowable as project costs only after those costs are incurred and paid for by the subcontractors.
 - c. In addition to the above, the pre-award requirements of third-party contractor/ consultants should be consistent with Local Program Procedures as published by the California Department of Transportation.
- 6. Accounting System
 - a. Shall establish and maintain an accounting system and records that properly accumulate and segregate fund expenditures by line item. The accounting system, including contractors and all subcontractors, shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices.
- 7. Right to Audit
 - a. For the purpose of determining compliance with this agreement and other matters connected with the performance of contracts with third parties, the RSTP Exchange Recipient, contractors, and subcontractors shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts. All of the above referenced parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times for three years from the date of final payment of funds. The California Department of Transportation,

the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of State of California or the United States Department of Transportation, shall each have access to any books, records, and documents that are pertinent for audits, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and shall be furnished copies thereof if requested.

- 8. Travel and Subsistence
 - a. Payments for travel and subsistence expenses claimed for reimbursement or applied as local match credit shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid exempt non-represented State employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules. If the rates invoiced are in excess of those authorized DPA rates, then recipient of funds is responsible for the cost difference and any overpayments shall be reimbursed on demand.
- 9. Project Completion
 - a. Agrees to provide to NCTC a report summarizing total project costs and milestones for each project using RSTP Exchange Funds within sixty (60) days of project completion.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Approve the Low Carbon Transit Operations Program (LCTOP) funding amounts for FY 2022/23, and authorize the Executive Director to sign letters approving the use of funds available under Public Utilities Code (PUC) Sections 99313 and 99314 by Nevada County and the Town of Truckee.

BACKGROUND: The LCTOP grant program is one of several programs that are part of the Transit, Affordable Housing, and Sustainable Communities Program established by the California Legislature in 2014 by Senate Bill 862. The LCTOP was created to provide operating and capital assistance for transit agencies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and improve mobility, with a priority on serving disadvantaged communities. Senate Bill 862 appropriates five percent of the annual auction proceeds from the California Air Resources Board's Cap-and-Trade Program in the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund for LCTOP.

Eligible recipients and project sponsors for the LCTOP funding program are Regional Transportation Planning Agencies and transit operators. The State Controller's office estimate of available funding for fiscal year 2022/2023 (see attachment) totaled \$260,198. The funding flows through two formulas; one based on countywide population (Public Utilities Commission (PUC) section 99313) and one based on transit operators fare revenue collection (see attachment). The following summarizes the proposed project and funding allocation for FY 2022/2023:

The FY 2022/2023 proposed projects are described below:

Nevada County Connects Low-Income Fare Subsidy Program

Nevada County Transit is proposing the Nevada County Connects Low-Income Fare Subsidy Program. The funding will allow Nevada County Connects to continue providing a low-income fare subsidy program to eligible community members. The County's short term transit plan recommends implementing both a fare subsidy program and a fare discount to meet the transportation needs of residents and increase ridership. The Low-Income Fare subsidy program is designed to support and enhance mobility options for low-income persons, as defined by the California Department of Housing and Community Development, within the Nevada County Connects service area. The subsidy would be offered to persons who are between 138 – 200 percent of the federal poverty level, and are not currently eligible for transit benefits through another state or federal program.

The program will improve access to small urban/rural fixed route public transit by offering a mobility option that connects to employment and education centers, community events and attracts people who usually drive their cars, thereby reducing VMT and greenhouse gas emissions. The project also offers increased mobility opportunities for the transit dependent population to travel more often and participate in community activities they might otherwise not be involved in.

Town of Truckee's TART Regional Night Service

The Town of Truckee is requesting funding to continue the operation of the Truckee TART Regional Night Service. This service enhances the regional transportation system by providing a connection between the Resorts, North Lake Tahoe (eastern Placer County) and Truckee for employees and the general public. The Project will provide year-round transportation from 6 p.m. to 11:30 p.m. during peak seasons in winter and summer (184 days) and from 6 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. during the shoulder seasons (181 days) operating on hourly headways. Employees who ride the transit system to work during the daytime now have a mode of transportation home in the evening. Without this Project the full regional connection would only occur from 7 a.m.-6 p.m. leaving a gap in evening transportation service that has consistently been identified as an unmet transit need.

The Project improves regional mobility, not only to employment, but also provides access to social and medical services, educational resources, and to basic necessities such as grocery centers. The service helps to reduce greenhouse gas emissions, improves mobility, serves the transit dependent population, and enhances the quality of life for area residents.

RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 23-03 Revised Findings of Apportionment for FY 2022/23, and Resolution 23-04, Preliminary Findings of Apportionment for FY 2023/24.

BACKGROUND: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants.

The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the ensuing fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

California Code of Regulations Section 6655.5 provides that "the transportation planning agency may, at any time before the close of the fiscal year, issue a revised determination of apportionment based on a revised or updated estimate furnished by the county auditor pursuant to Section 6620."

The attached letter from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller to NCTC, dated February 1, 2023, provided the estimate of revenue expected to be received in the remaining months of FY 2022/23 (see Resolution 23-03), and reported an estimate of the amount of revenue available for allocation in FY 2023/24 (see Resolution 23-04). This information has been sent to NCTC claimants, to assist them in their budgeting process.

The State Controller's Office (SCO) is issuing a revision to the allocations stated in the summary schedule of State Transit Assistance (STA) funds estimated for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which was originally released on January 31, 2023. This revision uses Public Utilities Code (PUC) section 99314.10 allocations based on the SCO transmittal letter, Reissuance of the FY 2020-21 STA Allocation Estimate, dated August 1, 2022, for each Transportation Planning Agency (TPA), county transportation commission, and the San Diego Metropolitan Transit System for the purposes of Public Utilities Code (PUC) sections 99313 and 99314. Also enclosed is a schedule detailing the amount of the PUC section 99314 allocation for each TPA by operator.

PUC section 99313 allocations are based on the latest available annual population estimates from the Department of Finance. The revenue basis will be updated in the August 2023 Fiscal Year 2023-24 State Transit Assistance estimates with the most current Financial Transactions Report data available. Pursuant to PUC section 99314.3, each TPA is required to allocate funds to the STA-eligible operators in the area of its jurisdiction.

According to the FY 2023-24 proposed California Budget, the estimated amount of STA funds budgeted is \$935,136,000. SCO anticipates the first quarter's allocation will be paid by November 30, 2023. Please refer to the schedule for the amounts that relate to your agency.

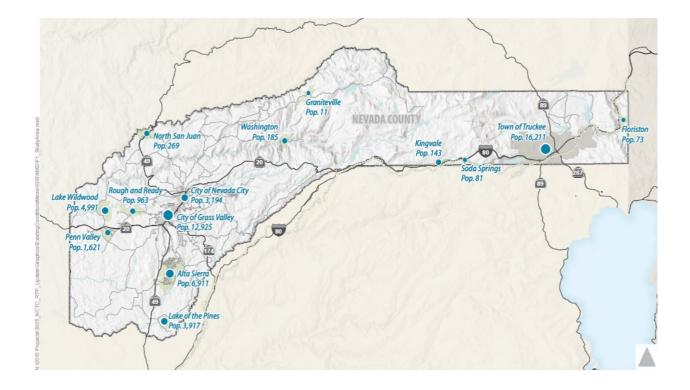

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Provide comments on Nevada County Transportation Commission's (NCTC) Draft FY 2023/24 Overall Work Program (OWP).

BACKGROUND: Annually each Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) develops an OWP for formal adoption by its governing board. The OWP outlines the scope of work and budget for various transportation planning activities. The OWP is a requirement of NCTC's Master Fund Transfer Agreement with the State of California and includes the following three components: Introduction, Work Elements (W.E.), and Budget. The purpose of this draft OWP for FY 2023/24 is:

- 1. To show how the Federal Planning Factors will be integrated into the OWP Work Elements.
- 2. To outline continuing and new activities.
- 3. To present a summary of the expected revenues and expenditures for the fiscal year.

A final OWP will be presented for approval at the May 17, 2023 NCTC meeting.

FEDERAL PLANNING FACTORS FOR FY 2023/24

As shown in the chart on page I-5 in the Draft OWP, the Federal Planning Factors that are included in Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act (Section 134(h), FAST Act, 2015) have been integrated into NCTC's FY 2023/24 OWP:

- 1. Support the economic vitality of the region, especially by enabling global competitiveness, productivity, and efficiency.
- 2. Increase the safety of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 4. Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight.

- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns.
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight.
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation.
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

OWP WORK ELEMENTS

NCTC's OWP integrates the Commission's organizational activities of Planning, Communication, and Coordination into two broad Work Elements: Communication and Coordination, and Regional Planning. Each Work Element is further subdivided into projects that accomplish specific tasks or objectives.

Status of projects in the FY 2022/23 OWP:

- Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Update: NCTC staff secured a consulting firm to assist with the RTP update and the work is ongoing.
- Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Update: Work is progressing and staff anticipates that the Fee Update will be completed by June 2023.
- Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan: NCTC staff anticipates releasing a Request for Proposals in Spring of 2023.
- Rural Counties Task Force Rural Induced Demand Study: NCTC staff secured a consulting firm to assist with the study and work is ongoing.
- Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada: A Request for Proposals was released and a consultant contract will be presented to the Commission for approval at the March 1, 2023 meeting.

The following ongoing activities have been integrated into the Draft FY 2023/24 OWP:

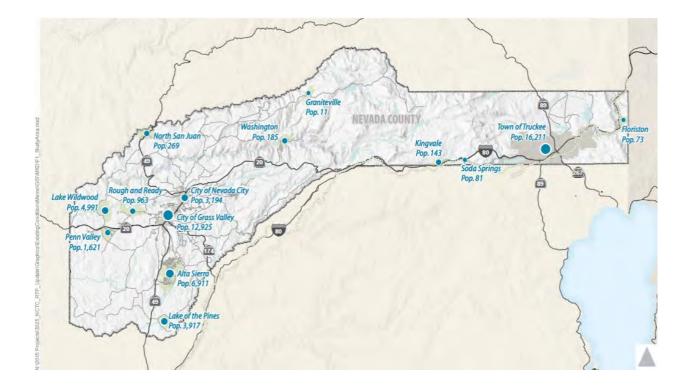
- 1. <u>State Transportation Improvement Program Projects</u>:
 - A. <u>SR 49 Corridor Improvement Project from La Barr Meadows Road to McKnight Way</u>: NCTC will continue to participate with Caltrans District 3 in the preparation of Plans, Specifications, and Estimates and Right-of-Way for a future construction project. (WE 2.2)
- 2. <u>Planning/Administration Projects</u>:
 - A. <u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) Funding</u>: Monitor project activities as shown on the multi-year project listing. (WE 2.1)
 - B. Air Quality Conformity Process: Monitor changes in EPA requirements. (WE 2.1)

- C. <u>Regional Transportation Plan Update:</u> The RTP update will continue through the first half of FY 2023/2024 and staff anticipates that the plan will be presented to the Commission in the Fall of 2023 for approval. (WE 2.1.1)
- D. <u>Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan Update</u>: NCTC expects to have a consultant agreement executed by the July 19, 2023 meeting. Work will progress through the FY 2023/2024 and an updated timeline will be incorporated into a future OWP amendment. (WE 2.3.3)
- E. <u>Rural Counties Task Force Rural Induced Demand Study:</u> Work will continue through the first half of FY 2023/2024 and staff anticipates that the final deliverable to occur in the Winter of 2023. (WE 2.4.4)
- F. <u>Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada:</u> Work will continue through FY 2023/2024 and staff anticipates that the plan be complete by June 30, 2024. (WE 2.4.6)

To assist Caltrans in the review of the NCTC FY 2023/24 OWP, staff has included a list of Rural Planning Assistance (RPA) eligible activities in each work element that uses RPA funds. As the name indicates, RPA funds are to be used for planning. RPA funds cannot be used for project development, project study reports, project implementation, or transit administration.

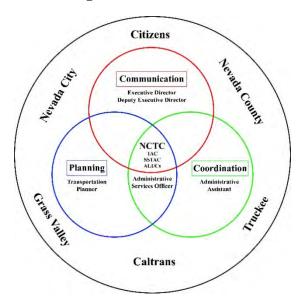
MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Nevada County Transportation Commission is to plan, communicate, and coordinate with the citizens and decision makers of Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, Town of Truckee, and with Caltrans to identify transportation needs, propose solutions, and assist in implementing projects to create a balanced regional transportation system, while protecting the rural qualities and historic character of Nevada County.

Activities to Achieve the Mission Include, But are not Limited to, the Following:

- ✓ NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- ✓ NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media, the NCTC website and electronic newsletter.
- ✓ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) that is consistent with the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ✓ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- ✓ NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- ✓ NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.
- ✓ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ✓ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC)

NCTC is a Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) created pursuant to Title 7.88 of the State of California Government Code, Section 67920. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee. The NCTC board has seven members. Four members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and three are appointed by the incorporated municipalities in the County. The Board of Supervisors appoints two of its members and two County at-large representatives. The municipalities appoint three city/town council members; one each from Nevada City, Grass Valley, and the Town of Truckee.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The TAC is made up of representatives of public transit operators, local public works and planning departments, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, and Caltrans. The Committee provides technical input on transportation issues and ensures there is coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC)

The SSTAC is made up of potential transit users who are representatives of the general public; seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local social service and consolidated transportation providers; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Hispanic communities. The goal of the SSTAC is to maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the underserved and under represented members of the community, such as the elderly and disabled. The SSTAC recommends action to the Commission relative to the unmet transit needs findings, and advises the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.

Airport Land Use Commissions (ALUCs)

The Nevada County Transportation Commission has been designated as the Airport Land Use Commission for the Nevada County Airport and provides staff for the Truckee Tahoe ALUC. The purpose of Airport Land Use Commissions is to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within the areas around the airports, to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses.

Nevada County Demographics

As of January 1, 2022, the population of Nevada County was estimated at 101,242. The largest municipality is Truckee with a population of 17,100, followed by Grass Valley at 13,617 and Nevada City at 3,334. The population of the unincorporated portion of the County was 67,191. The Race and Ethnicity data for Nevada County on Census.gov reported the racial makeup of the county as 83.5% White, followed by 10.2% Hispanic, 1.4% Asian, 1.0% Native American, 0.4% Black or African American, 0.1% Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and 3.4% Some Other Race. The data at Census.gov indicates that 13.6% of the population was below the poverty level.

OVERALL WORK PROGRAM INTRODUCTION

NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program (OWP). This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures, such as Rural Planning Assistance (RPA), Local Transportation Funds (LTF), or Federal Transit Administration (FTA). A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between NCTC, the Cities of Grass Valley and Nevada City, the Town of Truckee, and the County of Nevada provides for the coordination of regional transportation planning with local governments in Nevada County. The Commission staff prepares a draft OWP and in accordance with the MOU, solicits and integrates comments from each of the jurisdictions. The proposed work program is then submitted to the Commission for approval and forwarded to Caltrans. Caltrans, as the grantor of Rural Planning Assistance funds and Federal Transit Assistance funds, approves the OWP. The budget reflects the on-going regional transportation planning process in Nevada County. Major co ncerns of each of the jurisdictions and Caltrans are reflected in the elements and levels of funding. The OWP is updated each year to report on the progress of identified projects, propose new or continuing projects for the ensuing year, and to provide an estimate of the required funding of the OWP elements.

Public Participation

Public involvement is a major component of the transportation planning and programming processes. NCTC makes a concerted effort to solicit public input from all Nevada County residents, including underrepresented groups, in many aspects of transportation planning within Nevada County. Specific examples are listed below:

- NCTC maintains a website (<u>www.nctc.ca.gov</u>), and a Facebook page to keep the public informed of transportation planning and programming efforts underway in Nevada County. Agendas are posted on the bulletin boards of local jurisdictions and emailed to mobile home parks, residential homeowners associations, senior centers, environmental advocates, associations representing the private sector, and individuals that have asked to be included on the distribution list.
- Articles on the preparation of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), as well as the public comment periods, are posted on the NCTC website.
- Copies of the Draft RTP are made available for review at the main public libraries in western and eastern Nevada County, as well as on the NCTC website.
- Press releases are sent to the media establishments in western and eastern Nevada County announcing the Draft RTP is available for review and comment and noting some key findings.
- Public hearings are held and noticed in the main newspapers in western and eastern Nevada County prior to adoption of the RTP and RTIP.
- Each year public notifications are sent out to encourage participation in transportation planning processes, such as the annual unmet transit needs public hearing held by the Transit Services Commission (TSC) and numerous public workshops relating to the transportation projects and planning activities of NCTC.
- In accordance with SB52, NCTC conducts outreach and Tribal Consultation on any projects for which NCTC is lead agency and files a Notice of Preparation, Notice of Mitigated Negative Declaration or Notice of Negative Declaration. While there are currently no federally recognized tribes located within Nevada County, NCTC consults with the Native American Heritage Commission to identify Native American tribal organizations with historic or cultural interests regarding lands in Nevada County. These groups include but are not limited to the Nisenan of the Nevada City Rancheria and United Auburn Indian Community (UAIC).
- NCTC consults with USDA Forest Service Tahoe National Forest and Bureau of Land Management.
- Citizens are encouraged to attend and speak at NCTC meetings on any matter included for discussion on the agenda at that meeting. During the COVID-19 restrictions on public gatherings, NCTC meetings and public workshops were held via teleconference (Zoom) and the public was invited to participate.

Regional Issues, Needs, and Goals

The main transportation issues in western Nevada County are related to providing adequate infrastructure and services to meet the needs of the County, while maintaining and enhancing the rural character and environmental qualities of the area. In western Nevada County, interregional traffic adds to the existing challenge and need to maintain and improve the transportation system.

In eastern Nevada County, the issues also stem from the challenges to meet the needs related to the high volumes of traffic generated by travelers taking advantage of the world-class recreational opportunities available in the Truckee-North Tahoe area. To address these issues requires a multi-modal approach to transportation planning in the region.

Acquiring adequate and timely funding for transportation improvements is the central need within all of the Nevada County issues. Implementation of highway and regional roadway improvements will be key to providing efficient operations, while improving safety and air quality. The 2020 Census reported that approximately 28.5% of the county population was over 65 years of age, between 2010 and 2020 that population increased from 19.6% to 28.5%, and it is projected that by 2030 this population is expected to increase to over 40%. As the population of residents over the age of 65 increases, it will result in increased demand for public transit services in Nevada County. Additional state and federal transit operating and capital revenues will be necessary in order to meet the additional demand placed on the public transit systems.

Transportation issues facing Nevada County which have been identified as regionally significant include the following:

- Insufficient state, federal, and local transportation revenues
- Air quality/greenhouse gas emission reductions
- Coordination of land use, air quality, and transportation planning
- Providing and maintaining a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information, and environmental quality
- Efficient implementation of new technologies

Recognition of these issues leads to the overall goal of the Regional Transportation Plan, which is to provide and maintain a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, and services, and environmental quality. In the Policy Element this overarching goal is divided into the following four goals:

- 1) Provide for the safe and efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information;
- 2) Reduce adverse impacts on the natural, social, cultural, and historical environment and the quality of life;
- 3) Develop an economically feasible transportation system;
- 4) Create and maintain a comprehensive, multi-modal transportation system to serve the needs of the County.

Public involvement is a major component of NCTC's planning process. The activities and products from Project 1.1, General Services and Communication, are intended to provide the public with complete information and timely notices, thereby giving full public access to key decisions.

NCTC has the statutory responsibility to administer Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds, and to ensure that all expenditures of TDA funds are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). NCTC also administers funds received from the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) and the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) program. The work performed under Project 1.2, Fiscal Administration, has been incorporated into the NCTC Mission as follows:

- > NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Through communication, collaboration, and public outreach activities, Work Element 1 incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors (see page I-5) into the NCTC planning program.

Information and data developed through these activities are included in the Regional Transportation Plan and in transit planning documents.

WORK ELEMENT 2 - REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

NCTC has the responsibility to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) directed to the achievement of a coordinated and balanced regional transportation system. The plan is to be action-oriented and pragmatic, considering both the short-and-long term future, and is to present clear, concise policy guidance to local and state officials. Projects 2.1 (Regional Transportation Plan), 2.2 (Transportation Improvement Programs), 2.3 (Transit and Paratransit Programs), and 2.4 (Coordination of Regional Planning), are tied to the NCTC Mission by the following activities:

- NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- > NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program that is consistent with the RTP.
- NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, the NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.

The following activities and products included in Work Element 2 are appropriate uses of Rural Planning Assistance Funds:

- ✓ Participate in Federal and State Clean Air Act transportation related air quality planning activities. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)

- Assess the operational and physical continuity of transportation system components within and between metropolitan and rural areas, and interconnections to and through regions. (Projects 2.1, 2.3, and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct transit needs public hearings and prepare transit development plans and transit marketing plans as appropriate. (Project 2.3)

- ✓ Investigate methods to reduce vehicle travel and methods to expand and enhance travel services. (Projects 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Incorporate transit and intermodal facilities, bicycle transportation facilities, and pedestrian walkways in projects where appropriate. (Projects 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3)
- ✓ Participate with regional, local and state agencies, the general public, and the private sector in planning efforts to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that maximize and implement the regional transportation infrastructure. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct collaborative public participation efforts to further extend transportation planning to communities previously not engaged in discussion. (Project 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Create, strengthen, and use partnerships to facilitate and conduct regional planning activities between Caltrans, RTPAs, Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), transit districts, cities, counties, the private sector, and other stakeholders. (All WE 2 Projects)
- ✓ Use partners to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that enhance the movement of people, goods, services, and information. (Projects 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Ensure that projects developed at the regional level are compatible with statewide and interregional transportation needs. (Projects 2.2 and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct planning and project activities (including corridor studies, and other transportation planning studies) to identify, develop, and monitor current and future STIP projects. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Implement ways to meet transportation needs by using existing transportation facilities more efficiently. Encourage owners and operators of transportation facilities/systems to work together to develop operational objectives and plans maximizing utilization of existing facilities. (Projects 2.1, 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Document environmental and cultural resources and develop and improve coordination between agencies using Geographic Information Systems (GIS), Intelligent Transportation Management Systems (ITMS), and other computer-based tools. (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)

Work Element 2, Regional Transportation Planning, incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors into the NCTC planning program (see page I-5).

Monitoring safety and operational data of transportation facilities and services in Projects 2.1 and 2.3 will aid NCTC efforts to incorporate "safety" and "security" within the planning process. Through expanded Technical Advisory Committee meetings, transportation planning will be coordinated with emergency preparedness plans in the region. Systems management and operational data will be used to identify opportunities to increase transit ridership and develop operational improvements for regional transportation facilities. Management and operations data will also be key components in guiding capital investment plans for regional transportation system facilities and services. Planning activities will include coordination with nonemergency human service transportation providers. NCTC will also provide information to regional transit operators to ensure appropriate safety, security, and operational training opportunities are provided.

Project 2.4.6 – Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada

<u>Purpose</u>: On behalf of the County of Nevada, the Nevada County Transportation Commission will manage a fleet electrification planning study to identify how the County of Nevada can make the transition to electrification of public fleets to comply with upcoming California Air Resource Board (CARB) regulations related to the Innovative Clean Transit and lightweight, medium-duty, and heavy-duty public fleet electrification regulations.

The study will guide Nevada County in its endeavor to meet the regulations by evaluating and identifying a detailed plan to successfully convert the county vehicle fleet to electric vehicles within the timeline specified by CARB. The infrastructure needs for power delivery and charging, maintenance needs, and capital replacement considerations will be incorporated into the overall plan. Where electrification of certain vehicle fleet mix (e.g. heavy duty trucks) may not be possible due to market readiness, other zero-carbon alternatives will be explored and evaluated for fleet replacement and infrastructure improvements needs.

Glossary of Terms and Acronyms

Active Transportation Plan: Identifies a network of pedestrian and bicycle facilities and projects to support pedestrian and bicycle safety for people of all ages and abilities. Specifically, the Active Transportation Plan aims to:

- Identify barriers and innovative solutions to encourage walking and bicycling as viable travel modes
- Effectively build on recently completed and current active transportation planning efforts
- Develop walking/bicycling networks supportive of existing and future land uses and projects
- Develop a clearly-defined implementation strategy with specific, creative, yet practical and financially feasible projects matched to specific funding opportunities

<u>Active Transportation Program (ATP)</u>: Created in 2013 by the passage of SB 99 and AB 101, the Active Transportation Program consolidates existing federal and state transportation programs into a single program with a focus to make California a national leader in active transportation. The purpose of the Active Transportation Program is to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation by achieving the following goals:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking,
- Increase safety and mobility for non-motorized users,
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, pursuant to SB 375 (of 2008) and SB 341 (of 2009),
- Enhance public health and ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program, and
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users.

<u>Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC)</u>: The fundamental purpose of ALUCs is to promote land use compatibility around airports. As expressed in state statutes, this purpose is "... to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and the adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within areas around public airports to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses." The statutes give ALUCs two principal powers by which to accomplish this objective:

- 1. ALUCs must prepare and adopt an airport land use plan; and
- 2. ALUCs must review the plans, regulations, and other actions of local agencies and airport operators for consistency with that plan.

<u>Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP)</u>: A document referred to by ALUCs and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of an airport. The ALUCP defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight within the Airport Influence Area (AIA).

<u>Allocation</u>: A distribution of funds by formula or agreement. With regard to Transportation Development Act funds, allocation is the discretionary action by the RTPA which designates funds for a specific claimant for a specific purpose.

Apportionment: Distribution of funds by a formula. Apportionment under the Transportation Development Act is the determination by the RTPA of each area's share of anticipated LTF for the ensuing fiscal year.

<u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA</u>): A statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible.

<u>Capital Improvement Program (CIP) or Capital Improvement Plan</u>: A short-range plan, which identifies capital projects and equipment purchases, provides a planning schedule and identifies options for financing the plan.

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ): A federal funding program that is available in western Nevada County for transportation projects that demonstrate emission reductions to help attain federal air quality standards. Western Nevada County was classified in 2004 as "non-attainment" for 8-hour ozone standards. Project categories eligible for CMAQ funding include:

- Alternative fuels and vehicles
- Congestion reduction and traffic flow improvements
- Transit improvements
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Public education and outreach
- Diesel engine retrofits
- Car pooling and van pooling

Projects are submitted by local jurisdictions for consideration and are ranked based on air quality benefits and project readiness. NCTC then reviews the ranking and chooses projects to be funded.

<u>Corridor System Management Plan (CSMP)</u>: Foundational documents supporting a partnership-based, integrated management of all travel modes (cars, trucks, transit, bicycles, and pedestrians) and infrastructure (highways, roads, rail tracks, information systems and bike routes) so that mobility along a corridor is provided in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

Federal Highway Administration (FHWA): An agency within the U.S. Department of Transportation that supports state and local governments in the design, construction, and maintenance of the Nation's highway system (Federal Aid Highway Program) and various federally and tribal owned lands (Federal Lands).

Federal Transit Administration (FTA): A federal agency that provides financial and technical assistance to local public transit systems, including buses, subways, light rail, commuter rail, trolleys and ferries.

Findings of Apportionment: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants. The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the ensuing fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/ bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act: A federal law enacted in 2015 to provide long-term funding for surface transportation infrastructure planning and investment. The FAST Act authorizes \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 for highway, highway and motor vehicle safety, public transportation, motor carrier safety, hazardous materials safety, rail, and research, technology, and statistics programs.

<u>FTA Section 5310</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5310 provides formula funding to states for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs.

<u>FTA Section 5311</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5311 provides grants for Rural Areas providing capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations.

Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP): The ITIP is a five-year program of projects funded through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) that obtains funding primarily through the per-gallon State tax on gasoline. The ITIP is prepared by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and is submitted to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for approval.

Level of Service (LOS): A qualitative measure used to relate the quality of traffic service. LOS is used to analyze highways by categorizing traffic flow and assigning quality levels of traffic based on performance measures like speed, density, etc. North American highway LOS standards use letters A through F, with A being the best and F being the worst, similar to academic grading.

Local Transportation Fund (LTF): The LTF is derived from a 1/4-cent general sales tax collected statewide. The State Board of Equalization, based on the sales tax collected in each county, returns the sales tax revenues

to each county's LTF. The LTF was created in 1971when legislation was passed to provide funding to counties for transit and non-transit related purposes.

<u>Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)</u>: An agreement between two (or more) parties. It expresses a convergence of will between the parties, indicating an intended common line of action. Many government agencies use MOUs to define a relationship between agencies.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)</u>: MPOs are the regional planning entities in urbanized areas, usually an area with a population of 50,000 or more. There are 18 MPOs in California, accounting for approximately 98% of the state's population.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Commission (NCALUC): The Nevada County Transportation Commission was designated by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors and the city selection committee as the ALUC for the Nevada County Airport in May 2010. The NCTC Executive Director serves as the NCALUC Executive Director with support from the NCTC staff.

Nevada County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (NCALUCP): The basic function of this plan is to promote compatibility between the airport and surrounding land uses. The plan serves as a tool for use by the NCALUC in fulfilling its duty to review airport and adjacent land use development proposals. Additionally, the plan sets compatibility criteria applicable to local agencies and their preparation or amendment of land use plans and ordinances and to land owners in their design of new developments.

<u>North State Super Region (NSSR)</u>: Regional transportation planning agencies from 16 counties in Northern California came together on October 20, 2010 to sign a memorandum of agreement. This agreement created an alliance between the agencies to work together and support each other on issues related to transportation and to have a unified voice representing the North State.

Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District (NSAQMD): The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District was formed in 1986 by the merging of the Air Pollution Control Districts of Nevada, Plumas and Sierra Counties. The District is required by state law to achieve and maintain the federal and state Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are air quality standards set at levels that will protect the public health. The District is composed of three primary entities, each with a specific purpose: District staff, Governing Board of Directors, and Hearing Board.

Overall Work Program (OWP): NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program. This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures.

<u>Planning</u>, **<u>Programming</u>**, **and Monitoring** (**PPM**): PPM is funding allocated by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Designated uses of PPM include:

- Regional transportation planning includes development and preparation of the regional transportation plan;
- Project planning includes the development of project study reports or major investment studies conducted by regional agencies or by local agencies, in cooperation with regional agencies;
- Program development includes the preparation of regional transportation improvement programs (RTIPs) and studies supporting them; and
- Monitoring the implementation of STIP projects includes project delivery, timely use of funds, and compliance with state law and CTC guidelines.

Plans, Specifications, and Estimates (PS&E): In this stage of project development, the scope of the selected alternative is refined; design surveys and photogrammetric mapping is obtained; and reports including traffic data, hydrology and hydraulics, geotechnical design, pavement design, and materials and sound wall design reports are completed. Final right-of-way requirements are determined and procurement is initiated. At the completion of the PS&E stage, a complete set of project plans have been developed that will allow a competent contractor to bid and build the project. These plans include a refined estimate of the construction costs and any required specifications on how the work is to proceed.

Project Approval and Environmental Documentation (PA/ED): The PA/ED step of project development reinforces the philosophy of balancing transportation needs with community goals and values. Outputs of the

PA / ED step are the project report and environmental document. The project report is an engineering document that evaluates the various alternatives for selection of a preferred alternative. The environmental document is a disclosure document that assesses the potential impacts of the project on the environment.

<u>Project Initiation Document (PID)</u>: a report that documents the purpose, need, scope, cost, and schedule for a transportation project. The PID identifies and describes the viable alternatives to a transportation problem.

<u>**Project Study Report (PSR):</u>** A report of preliminary engineering efforts, including a detailed alternatives analysis, cost, schedule, and scope information for a transportation project. A PSR also includes estimated schedule and costs for environmental mitigation and permit compliance.</u>

Public Transportation Modernization Improvement & Service Enhancement Account (PTMISEA):

PTMISEA was created by Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006. Of the \$19.925 billion available to Transportation, \$3.6 billion dollars was allocated to PTMISEA to be available to transit operators over a ten-year period. PTMISEA funds may be used for transit rehabilitation, safety or modernization improvements, capital service enhancements or expansions, new capital projects, bus rapid transit improvements, or rolling stock (buses and rail cars) procurement, rehabilitation or replacement. Funds in this account are appropriated annually by the Legislature to the State Controller's Office (SCO) for allocation in accordance with Public Utilities Code formula distributions: 50% allocated to Local Operators based on fare-box revenue and 50% to Regional Entities based on population.

Regional Improvement Program (RIP): The RIP is one of two funding programs in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The RIP receives 75% of the STIP funds and the second program, the Interregional Improvement Program receives 25% of STIP funds. RIP funds are allocated every two years by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to projects submitted by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) in their Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIPs).

Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP): The RSTP was established by the State of California to utilize federal Surface Transportation Program funds for a wide variety of transportation projects. The State exchanges these federal funds for less restrictive state funds to maximize the ability of local agencies to use the funds for transportation purposes including planning, construction of improvements, maintenance and operation of public streets, and pedestrian and bicycle projects.

<u>Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP)</u>: NCTC submits regional transportation projects to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for funding in a list called the RTIP. The RTIP is a five-year program that is updated every two years. Projects in the RTIP are funded from the Regional Improvement Program (RIP).

Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF): The Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program was established in 2001 through a partnership of Nevada County, City of Nevada City, City of Grass Valley, and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). The RTMF Program was developed to collect impact fees from new development to help fund transportation improvement projects needed to accommodate growth in the region of western Nevada County.

Regional Transportation Plan (RTP): The Regional Transportation Plan has been developed to document transportation policy, actions, and funding recommendations that will meet the short- and long-term access and mobility needs of Nevada County residents over the next 20 years. This document is designed to guide the systematic development of a comprehensive multi-modal transportation system for Nevada County.

<u>Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA)</u>: County or multi-county entities charged by state law in meeting certain transportation planning requirements. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee.

<u>Request for Proposal (RFP)</u>: A document that solicits proposals, often made through a bidding process, by an agency or company interested in procurement of a commodity, service, or valuable asset, to potential suppliers to submit business proposals.

<u>Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF)</u>: There are 26 rural county Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) or Local Transportation Commissions represented on the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an informal organization with no budget or staff that generally meets every other month. A member of

the CTC usually acts as liaison to the RCTF, and CTC and Caltrans staff typically attend these meetings to explain and discuss changing statewide transportation issues that may be of concern to the rural counties.

<u>Rural Planning Assistance (RPA)</u>: Annually the 26 rural RTPAs receive state transportation planning funding, known as RPA, on a reimbursement basis, after costs are incurred and paid for using local funds.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC): Consists of representatives of potential transit users including the general public, seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local consolidated transportation service agencies; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Hispanic communities. The SSTAC meets at least once annually and has the following responsibilities:

- To maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the elderly and disabled.
- Review and recommend action to the NCTC relative to the identification of unmet transit needs and advise the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.
- Provide a forum for members to share information and concerns about existing elderly and handicapped transportation resources.

<u>State Highway Operations and Protection Program (SHOPP)</u>: The SHOPP is a four-year listing of projects prepared by Caltrans.

<u>State Transit Assistance (STA)</u>: These funds are provided by the State for the development and support of public transportation needs. They are allocated by the State Controller's Office to each county based on population and transit performance.

State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP): The STIP is a multi-year capital improvement program of transportation projects on and off the State Highway System, funded with revenues from the Transportation Investment Fund and other funding sources. STIP programming generally occurs every two years. The STIP has two funding programs, the Regional Improvement Program and the Interregional Improvement Program.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC): The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is made up of representatives of local public works and planning departments, Caltrans District 3, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, public transit operators, and the NCTC consultant engineer on retainer. Members are assigned by staff of local jurisdictions and other participating organizations. Any decisions made or actions proposed by the TAC shall be subject to the review and approval of the NCTC.

TAC responsibilities include:

- Provide technical input, assistance, and recommendations to the Commission to ensure there is comprehensive coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process for Nevada County.
- Review and comment on comprehensive regional transportation plans for the area, which include the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), and the Overall Work Program (OWP).
- Coordinate efforts and discussions to create and maintain circulation elements of the General Plan and specific plans of the member governments.

Transit Development Plan (TDP): Transit Development Plans study the County's transit services. They help identify transit service needs, prioritize improvements and determine the resources required for implementing modified or new service. The plans also provide a foundation for requests for State and federal funding,

Transit Services Commission (TSC): This commission oversees and advises as necessary the daily operations of the western Nevada County transit system. The TSC has the following responsibilities:

- Establish fares;
- Adopt the level of transit and paratransit services, including route structure and service areas;
- Monitor public response;
- Approve proposed purchase of additional vehicles;

• Review and approve the annual budget for transit and paratransit operations.

Transportation Development Act (TDA): The Transportation Development Act was enacted in 1971 and provides two major sources of funding for public transportation: the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and the State Transit Assistance fund (STA). The TDA funds a wide variety of transportation programs, including planning and programming activities, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, community transit services, and public transportation projects. One of NCTC's major responsibilities is the administration of TDA funding in Nevada County.

Travel Demand Model (also Traffic Model): A computer model used to estimate travel behavior and travel demand for a specific future time frame, based on a number of assumptions. In general, travel analysis is performed to assist decision makers in making informed transportation planning decisions. The strength of modern travel demand forecasting is the ability to ask critical "what if" questions about proposed plans and policies.

Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association (TNT/TMA): The Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association is dedicated to fostering public-private partnerships and resources for the advocacy and promotion of innovative solutions to the unique transportation challenges of the Truckee-North Lake Tahoe Resort Triangle. The TNT/TMA is a planning stakeholder and partner with NCTC.

Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Commission (TTALUC): The Truckee Tahoe Airport is an "intercounty" airport situated in both Nevada County and Placer County; therefore, a special ALUC with representatives from both counties was formed. Six members are selected, one each, by Placer and Nevada Counties' Board of Supervisors, City Selection Committees, and Airport Managers of each county. A seventh member is chosen by the other six members to represent the general public. NCTC authorized its staff on May 19, 2010 to provide staff support to the TTALUC.

Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (TTALUCP): A document referred to by the TTALUC and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of the Truckee Tahoe Airport. The plan defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight. The TTALUC performs consistency determinations for proposed projects in the area covered by the Compatibility Plan as needed.

<u>Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT)</u>: VMT is a metric of the total miles traveled by vehicles in a defined area over a defined period of time and is often used to estimate the environmental impacts of driving, such as Greenhouse Gases and air pollutant emissions. Factors that influence VMT include travel mode, number of trips, and distance traveled. California jurisdictions are transitioning from a Level of Service (LOS) metric to a Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) metric within the California Environmental Quality Act's (CEQA) transportation analysis.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 23-06 authorizing the Chair to execute an agreement with Frontier Energy, Inc. to develop a Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan.

BACKGROUND:

The Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan (Plan) will guide Nevada County in its endeavor to meet the regulations by evaluating and identifying a detailed plan to successfully convert the county vehicle fleet to zero emission vehicles within the timeline specified by CARB. The infrastructure needs for power delivery and charging, hydrogen storage and distribution, maintenance needs, and capital replacement considerations will also be incorporated into the Plan. Where electrification of certain vehicle fleet mix (e.g. heavy duty trucks) may not be possible due to market readiness, other zero-carbon alternatives will be explored and evaluated for fleet replacement and infrastructure improvements needs.

While the County of Nevada (County) has deployed and ordered a limited number of alternative fueled vehicles for its county fleet to date, a Plan is needed to provide a roadmap for supporting required fleet modifications to meet State and Federal requirements over the next 20 years and provide efficient implementation of necessary alternative fuel solutions at certain county facilities for the fleet, staff, and the public. A plan will also help the County meet sustainability goals, potentially reduce costs, and reduce the County's carbon footprint.

On behalf of the County of Nevada, the Nevada County Transportation Commission will manage the Plan to identify the necessary steps that the County of Nevada can take to comply with upcoming California Air Resource Board (CARB) regulations related to the Innovative Clean Transit and lightweight, medium-duty, and heavy-duty public fleet electrification regulations.

On December 16, 2022, NCTC staff issued a Request for Proposal (RFP) for this project, and on January 18, 2023, NCTC staff issued a Revised RFP to adjust the total contract amount and revised the project timeline. The consulting firm Frontier Energy, Inc. was selected to develop the Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan.

Funding for this project is included in Work Element 2.4.6 in the FY 2022/23 Overall Work Program, with a budget amount of \$230,000.00 for consultant work spread over two years.

The enclosed agreement, in accordance with Section V, Item A, of NCTC's Administrative Operating Procedures, is being presented to the NCTC for consideration and approval.

This Agreement by and between the Nevada County Transportation Commission (hereinafter referred to as "NCTC"), and Frontier Energy, Inc., (hereinafter referred to as "Consultant"), in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants, and conditions hereinafter set forth, the parties do hereby agree as follows:

1. **Purpose and Scope:** The purpose of this Agreement is to provide a contract for professional services to prepare the Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan.

Consultant will provide services as set forth in Exhibit "A" NCTC's "Request for Proposal to Prepare a Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan." and Exhibit "B" Consultant's proposal entitled, "Proposal to Prepare a Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan." In the event of a conflict between Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B," Exhibit "A" shall control.

- 2. **Engagement of Consultant:** NCTC hereby agrees to engage Consultant, and Consultant hereby agrees to perform the services required to complete the project. The services of Consultant are described in Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B" which are herein incorporated as part of the Agreement.
- 3. **Scope of Services:** Consultant shall do, perform, and carry out the services as set forth in Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B" in accordance with this Agreement. No changes to Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B" or to this Agreement shall be made without the written agreement of all parties hereto. In the event of a conflict between Exhibit "A" and Exhibit "B," Exhibit "A" shall control.

Consultant must provide ten (10) bound copies and an electronic version in PDF format on USB flash drive of the draft report to NCTC staff for review and comment prior to finalization. Once changes or considerations are fully addressed, Consultant must deliver fifteen (15) bound copies, one reproducible unbound original, and an electronic version in PDF format on USB flash drive of the final report to NCTC.

- 4. **Data to be Furnished to Consultant:** All information, data, reports, records and maps as are existing, available, and necessary for the carrying out of the project shall be furnished to Consultant without charge by NCTC, and NCTC shall cooperate with Consultant in every way possible during all phases of the project. All data, including survey documents, prepared or developed or assembled under this Agreement shall be the property of NCTC.
- 5. **Personnel:** Consultant represents that it has, or will obtain at its own expense, all personnel and/or subcontractors required in performing the services under this Agreement. Such personnel shall not be employees of NCTC.

- 6. **Standard of Quality:** All work performed by Consultant under this Agreement shall be in accordance with all applicable legal requirements and shall meet the standard of quality ordinarily to be expected of competent professionals in Consultant's field of expertise.
- 7. **Project Representative:** Consultant and NCTC shall each designate a project representative who shall be responsible for coordinating the efforts of the respective party with regard to the performance of the work as set forth under this Agreement. The project representative for NCTC shall be Kena Sannar. The project representative for Consultant shall be Chris White. Consultant's project representative may only be changed upon prior written approval by NCTC.

8. Subcontracting:

- a. Nothing contained in this Agreement or otherwise shall create any contractual relation between NCTC and any subconsultant(s), and no subcontract shall relieve Consultant of its responsibilities and obligations hereunder. Consultant shall supervise all of its personnel and be responsible for the work of all subcontractors selected for this project. Consultant's obligation to pay its subconsultant(s) is an independent obligation from NCTC's obligation to make payments to the Consultant.
- b. Consultant shall perform the work contemplated with resources available within its own organization and no portion of the work pertinent to this Agreement shall be subcontracted without written authorization by NCTC's Project Representative, except that which is expressly identified in the approved Cost Proposal.
- c. Consultant shall pay its subconsultants within ten (10) calendar days from receipt of each payment made to Consultant by NCTC.
- d. Any subcontract in excess of \$25,000 entered into as a result of this contract shall contain all the provisions stipulated in this contract to be applicable to subconsultants.
- e. Any substitution of subconsultant(s) must be approved in writing by NCTC's Contract Administrator prior to the start of work by the subconsultant(s).

9. **Time of Performance:**

- a. This Agreement shall go into effect on March 20, 2023, contingent upon approval by NCTC, and Consultant shall commence work after notification to proceed by NCTC's Contract Administrator or Project Administrator. The contract shall end on June 30, 2024, unless extended by written contract amendment, pursuant to NCTC's Administrative Operating Procedures.
- b. Consultant is advised that any recommendation for contract award is not binding on NCTC until the contract is fully executed and approved by NCTC.
- c. Consultant shall complete work as expeditiously as is consistent with generally accepted standards of professional skill and care and the orderly progress of work.

- 10. **Compensation:** NCTC shall pay Consultant as compensation in full for all services performed by Consultant pursuant to this Agreement, a total sum not to exceed \$230,000. Consultant will not perform work, nor be required to perform work, outside those services specified in this Agreement which would result in billings in excess of \$230,000 without the prior written agreement of both parties.
 - <u>Allowable Costs and Payments</u>: Consultant will be reimbursed for hours worked at the hourly rates specified in Consultant's Cost Proposal and documented in Exhibit 10-H1 Cost Proposal. The specified hourly rates shall include direct labor costs, employee benefits, overhead, and fees. These rates are not adjustable for the performance period set forth in this Agreement.
 - (1) In addition, Consultant will be reimbursed for incurred (actual) direct costs other than labor costs that are in the Cost Proposal and identified in the Cost Proposal and in the executed Task Order/Scope of Work.
 - (2) Reimbursement for transportation and subsistence costs shall not exceed the rates as specified in the approved Cost Proposal.
 - (3) When milestone cost estimates are included in the approved Cost Proposal, Consultant shall obtain prior written approval for a revised milestone cost estimate from NCTC's Project Representative before exceeding such estimate.
 - (4) Progress payments for each Task Order/Scope of Work will be made monthly in arrears based on services provided and actual costs incurred.
 - (5) Consultant shall not commence performance of work or services until this Agreement has been approved by NCTC, and notification to proceed has been issued by NCTC's Project Representative. No payment will be made prior to approval or for any work performed prior to approval of this Agreement.
 - (6) Consultant will be reimbursed, as promptly as fiscal procedures will permit, upon receipt by NCTC's Project Representative of itemized invoices. Invoices itemizing all costs are required for all work performed under each Task Order/Scope of Work. Invoices shall be submitted no later than 45 calendar days after the performance of work for which Consultant is billing. Invoices shall include a written report of the work performed. Invoices shall follow the format stipulated for the approved Cost Proposal and shall reference the contract number WE2440032023 and the finalized project title. Credits due to NCTC that include any equipment purchased under the provisions of Section 45 of this Agreement, must be reimbursed by Consultant prior to the expiration or termination of this Agreement. Invoices shall be mailed to NCTC's Project Representative at the address provided in Exhibit A.
 - (7) The period of performance for Task Orders/Scope of Work shall be in accordance with dates specified in the Task Orders/Scope of Work. No Task Order/Scope of Work will be written which extends beyond the expiration date of this Agreement.

- (8) The total amount payable by NCTC shall not exceed the amount agreed to in Section 10 above, unless authorized by written amendment.
- (9) If the Consultant fails to satisfactorily complete a deliverable according to the schedule set forth in the Scope of Work, no payment will be made until the deliverable has been satisfactorily completed.
- (10) Task Orders may not be used to amend this Agreement and may not exceed the Scope of Work under this Agreement.
- (11) All subcontracts in excess of \$25,000 shall contain the above provisions.
- b. <u>Cost Principles and Administrative Requirements:</u>
 - (1) Consultant agrees that the contract cost principles and procedures, 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31.000 et seq., and "Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards," 2 CFR, Part 200, shall be used to determine the cost allowability of individual items.
 - (2) Consultant also agrees to comply with Federal procedures in accordance with 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, and 2 CFR Part 225.
 - (3) Any costs for which payment has been made to Consultant that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31.000 et seq., 23 CFR, 2 CFR Part 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards, 2 CFR Part 225, or any other applicable State or Federal Regulations, are subject to repayment by Consultant to NCTC.
 - (4) Transportation and subsistence expenses shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid non-state employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration rules, unless written verification is supplied that government hotel rates are not commercially available to Consultant and/or its subcontractors at the time and location required as specified in the California Department of Transportation's Travel Guide Exception Process at the following link: <u>https://dot.ca.gov/programs/accounting/travel-guide</u>.
 - (5) Consultant and subcontractors shall establish and maintain an accounting system conforming to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) which segregates and accumulates the costs of work elements by line item and produces quarterly reports which clearly identify reimbursable costs and other expenditures. Consultant shall also provide NCTC with Exhibit 10-K: Consultant Certification of Contract Costs and Financial Management System.
 - (6) Contractors and subcontractors shall comply with: 23 CFR; Caltrans' Local Assistance Procedures Manual (LAPM) (<u>https://dot.ca.gov/programs/local-</u>

assistance/guidelines-and-procedures/local-assistance-procedures-manuallapm); Caltrans' Local Assistance Programs Guidelines (LAPG) (https://dot.ca.gov/programs/local-assistance/guidelines-and-procedures/ local-assistance-program-guidelines-lapg); California Public Contract Code, Sections 10300 to 10334, and 10335 to 10381; and all other applicable State and Federal statutes, regulations, and guidelines or additional restrictions, limitations, conditions, or any statute enacted by the state Legislature or adopted by the California Transportation Commission that may affect the provisions, terms, or funding of this project in any manner.

- (7) All subcontracts in excess of \$25,000 shall contain the above provisions.
- 11. Method of Payment: Consultant shall bill NCTC for time and materials for services performed under this Agreement on a monthly basis. Payment by NCTC to Consultant shall be made within 30 days after receipt of Consultant's invoice and acceptance of the work to date. NCTC shall withhold ten percent (10%) of each invoice until the successful completion of the scope of work and the delivery and acceptance by NCTC of all final products. Consultant or subcontractor shall return all monies withheld in retention from all subcontractors within 30 days after receiving payment for work satisfactorily completed and accepted including incremental acceptances of portions of the contract work by NCTC. Any delay or postponement of payment may take place only for good cause and with NCTC's prior written approval. Any violation of these provisions shall subject the violating Consultant to the penalties, sanctions, and other remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the California Business and Professions Code. This requirement shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies otherwise available to Consultant or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or nonpayment by Consultant, deficient subcontractor performance and/or noncompliance by a subcontractor. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontractors. Consultant is expected to receive payment by electronic deposit.
- 12. **Termination of Agreement:** NCTC reserves the right to terminate this contract upon ten (10) days written notice to Consultant, with or without cause, with the reasons for termination stated in the notice.
 - a. NCTC may terminate this Agreement with Consultant should Consultant fail to perform the covenants herein contained at the time and in the manner herein provided. In the event of such termination, NCTC may proceed with the work in any manner deemed proper by NCTC. If NCTC terminates this Agreement with Consultant, NCTC shall pay Consultant the sum that was due to the Consultant under this Agreement prior to termination, unless the cost of completion to NCTC exceeds the funds remaining in the Agreement, in which case the overage shall be deducted from any sum due Consultant under this Agreement and the balance, if any, shall be paid to Consultant upon demand.
 - b. The maximum amount for which NCTC shall be liable if this Agreement is terminated is \$230,000.
 - c. In the event of termination by either party, all data shall become the property of NCTC subject to the provisions of Section 32.

- 13. **Interest of Members of NCTC and Others:** No officer, member, or employee of NCTC and no member of the governing body, and no other public official of the governing body of the locality or localities in which the project is situated or being carried out who exercises any functions or responsibilities in the review or approval of the undertaking or carrying out of this project, shall participate in any decision relating to this Agreement which affects his or her personal interest or have any personal or pecuniary interest, direct or indirect, in this Agreement or the proceeds thereof. In addition, Consultant shall notify NCTC of any such direct or indirect personal or pecuniary interest prior to entering into this Agreement, or if discovered after execution of the Agreement, immediately upon learning of such interest.
- 14. **Assignability:** Consultant shall not assign any interest in this Agreement, and shall not transfer any interest in the same (whether by assignment or novation), without the prior written consent of NCTC thereto; provided, however, that claims for money due or to become due to Consultant from NCTC under this Agreement may be assigned to a bank, trust company, or other financial institution without such approval provided there is no dispute as to the amount of funds due to Consultant. Notice of any such assignment or transfer shall be furnished promptly to NCTC.
- 15. **Rebates, Kickbacks, or Other Unlawful Consideration:** Consultant warrants that this Agreement was not obtained or secured through rebates, kickbacks or other unlawful consideration, either promised or paid to any NCTC employee. For breach or violation of this warranty, NCTC shall have the right (in its discretion) to: terminate the contract without liability to pay only for the value of the work actually performed; deduct from the contract price; or otherwise recover the full amount of such rebate, kickback or other unlawful consideration.

Furthermore, Consultant warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working for Consultant, to solicit or secure this Agreement; and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person other than a bona fide employee, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration, contingent upon or resulting from the award, or formation of this Agreement. For breach or violation of this warranty, NCTC shall have the right (in its discretion) to: terminate the contract without liability to pay only for the value of the work actually performed; deduct from the contract price; or otherwise recover the full amount of such rebate, kickback or other unlawful consideration.

- 16. **Findings Confidential:** Any reports, information, data, etc. given to, prepared by, or assembled by Consultant shall be held as confidential, and shall not be made available to any individual or organization by Consultant without the prior written approval of NCTC.
- 17. **Copyright:** No reports, maps, or other documents produced in whole or in part under this Agreement shall be the subject of an application for copyright by or on behalf of Consultant.
- 18. **Availability of Records/Audit Review Procedures:** Consultant shall document the results of the work to the satisfaction of NCTC, and if applicable, the State and U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT). Such documentation may include preparation of progress and final reports, plans, specifications and estimates, or similar evidence of attainment of contract objectives.

- a. <u>Retention of Records/Audit</u>: For the purpose of determining compliance with Public Contract Code 10115, et seq. and Title 21, California Code of Regulations, Chapter 21, Section 2500 et seq. (when applicable and other matters connected with the performance of the contract pursuant to Government Code 8546.7), Consultant, subconsultants, and NCTC shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of the contract, including but not limited to, the costs of administering the Agreement.
 - (1) All parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the contract period and for three years from the date of final payment under the Agreement. The state, State Auditor, NCTC, FHWA, or any duly authorized representative of the Federal Government shall have access to any books, records, and documents of Consultant and its certified public accountants' (CPA) work papers that are pertinent to the contract and indirect cost rates (ICR) for audit, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and copies thereof shall be furnished if requested.
 - (2) Subcontracts in excess of \$25,000 shall contain this provision.
- b. <u>Audit Review Procedures</u>:
 - (1) Any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under an interim or post audit of this contract that is not disposed of by agreement, shall be reviewed by NCTC's Executive Director.
 - (2) Not later than 30 days after issuance of the final audit report, Consultant may request a review by NCTC's Executive Director of unresolved audit issues. The request for review will be submitted in writing.
 - (3) Neither the pendency of a dispute nor its consideration by NCTC will excuse Consultant from full and timely performance, in accordance with the terms of this contract.
- 19. **Compliance with Applicable Laws:** Consultant agrees to conduct and execute the project in compliance with all applicable local, state and federal laws, codes, ordinances, regulations, orders, and decrees. This includes compliance with prevailing wage rates and their payment in accordance with California Labor Code, Section 1775. Consultant shall keep itself fully informed of and shall observe and comply with and shall cause any and all persons, firms, or corporations employed by it or under it to observe and comply with all state and national laws and county and municipal ordinances, regulations, orders and decrees which in any manner affect those engaged or employed in the services described by this Agreement or the material used or which in any way affect the conduct of the work.

Consultant warrants and represents to NCTC that Consultant shall, at its own cost and expense, keep in effect or obtain at all times during the term of this Agreement, any licenses, permits, insurance and approvals that are legally required for Consultant to practice its profession or are necessary and incident to the performance of the services and work Consultant performs under this Agreement. Consultant shall provide written proof of such licenses, permits, insurance and approvals upon request by NCTC. NCTC is not responsible or liable for Consultant's failure to comply with any or all of the requirements contained in this paragraph.

- 20. **Insurance:** Consultant shall maintain, at Consultant's own expense during the term hereof, insurance with respect to Consultant's business, the premises and all activities or services in the performance of this Agreement, of the types and in the minimum amounts described generally as follows:
 - a. Full Workers' Compensation covering all employees of Consultant as required by law in the State of California, and Employers' Liability Coverage of \$1,000,000. Consultant acknowledges that it is aware of the provisions of the Labor Code of the State of California which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to undertake self-insurance in accordance with the provisions of that code, and it certifies that it will comply with such provisions before commencing the performance of the work of this contract. Copies of the certificates evidencing such insurance shall be provided to NCTC upon request.
 - b. Comprehensive Public Liability Insurance or Comprehensive Liability Insurance (Bodily Injury and Property Damage) of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence, including, but not limited to, endorsements for the following coverages: personal injury, premises-operations, products and completed operations, blanket contractual, and independent contractor's liability. If Comprehensive Liability Insurance or other form has a general aggregate limit, such limit shall apply separately to this project/location or the general aggregate limit shall be twice the required occurrence limit.
 - c. Comprehensive Automobile Liability Insurance (Bodily Injury and Property Damages) on owned, leased, and non-owned vehicles used in connection with Consultant's business of \$1,000,000 combined single limit per occurrence.
 - d. Throughout the duration of the project, Consultant shall carry professional liability insurance in a standard form, including Errors and Omission coverage, with a company approved by NCTC. Said insurance shall be written with limits of \$500,000 for each incident and \$1,000,000 in the aggregate. NCTC may waive this Section "d" at its discretion, in the event such insurance is not available for the type of service being provided by Consultant.
 - e. <u>Deductibles and Self-Insured Retentions</u>: Any deductibles or self-insured retentions in excess of \$5,000 must be declared to and approved by NCTC.
 - f. <u>Required Provisions</u>: The general liability and automobile liability policies are to contain, or be endorsed to contain, the following provisions:
 - (1) For any claims related to this Agreement, Consultant's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects to NCTC, its directors, officers, employees and agents. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by NCTC, or its directors, officers, employees or agents shall be in excess of Consultant's insurance and shall not contribute to it.

- (2) Consultant's insurance shall apply separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the limits of the insurer's liability.
- g. <u>Acceptability of Insurers</u>: Insurance is to be placed with insurers with a current A.M. Best's rating of no less than A:VII, unless otherwise approved by NCTC.
- h. <u>Certificate of Insurance and Additional Insured Requirement</u>: **Consultant shall furnish to NCTC original Certificates of Insurance** on a standard ACORD form, or other form acceptable to NCTC, substantiating the required coverages and limits set forth above and also containing the following statement with respect to the General Liability policy: "Nevada County Transportation Commission and its directors, officers, employees and agents, are made additional insureds, but only insofar as the operations under this Agreement are concerned."
- i. <u>Certified Copies of Policies</u>: Upon request by NCTC, Consultant shall immediately furnish a complete copy of the Comprehensive Public Liability or Comprehensive Liability policy required hereunder, including all endorsements, with said copy certified by the insurance company to be a true and correct copy of the original policy.
- j. <u>Consultant's Responsibility</u>: Nothing herein shall be construed as limiting in any way the extent to which Consultant may be held responsible for damages resulting from Consultant's operations, acts, omissions, or negligence. Insurance coverage obtained in the minimum amounts specified above shall not relieve Consultant of liability in excess of such minimum coverage, nor shall it preclude NCTC from taking other actions available to it under this Agreement or by law, including but not limited to, actions pursuant to Consultant's indemnity obligations.
- k. <u>Notice</u>: Consultant agrees that none of the required coverages set forth in this Section 20 shall be suspended, voided, canceled, terminated, or reduced in coverage or limits, without thirty (30) days' prior written notice to NCTC by certified mail, return receipt requested.
- 21. **Indemnification:** Consultant agrees to indemnify, fund the defense of, and hold harmless, NCTC and its directors, officers, agents, and employees (the "Indemnitees") from and against any and all actions, suits, claims, demands, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees and costs, to the extent arising out of, pertaining to, relating to, or in any way connected with the performance of this Agreement, however caused, regardless of any negligent act of an Indemnitee, whether active or passive, excepting only such claims as may be caused by the sole active negligence or willful misconduct of an Indemnitee. Consultant shall pay all costs that may be incurred by NCTC in enforcing this indemnity, including reasonable attorneys' fees. The provisions of this Section shall survive the expiration, termination or assignment of this Agreement.
- 22. **Governing Law and Choice of Forum:** This Agreement shall be administered and interpreted under California law as if written by both parties. Any litigation arising from this Agreement shall be brought in the Superior Court of Nevada County.
- 23. **Prevailing Party:** Should any dispute arise hereunder, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorneys' fees and costs.

24. **Conflict of Interest:**

- a. Consultant shall disclose any financial, business, or other relationship with NCTC that may have an impact upon the outcome of this Agreement, or any ensuing NCTC construction project. Consultant shall also list current clients who may have a financial interest in the outcome of this contract, or any project, which will follow.
- b. Consultant hereby certifies that it does not now have, nor shall it acquire any financial or business interest that would conflict with the performance of services under this Agreement.
- c. Any subcontract in excess of \$25,000 entered into as a result of this contract, shall contain all of the provisions of this Article.
- c. Consultant shall immediately notify NCTC of any and all potential violations of this paragraph upon becoming aware of the potential violation.
- 25. **Political Reform Act Compliance:** Consultant is aware and acknowledges that certain contractors that perform work for governmental agencies are "consultants" under the Political Reform Act (the "Act") (Government Code § 81000, et seq.) and its implementing regulations (2 California Code of Regulations § 18110, et seq.). Consultant agrees that any of its officers or employees deemed to be "consultants" under the Act by NCTC, as provided for in the Conflict of Interest Code for NCTC, shall promptly file economic disclosure statements for the disclosure categories determined by NCTC, to be relevant to the work to be performed under this Agreement and shall comply with the disclosure and disqualification requirements of the Act, as required by law.
- 26. **Independent Contractor:** In performing services under this Agreement, Consultant is and shall act as an independent contractor and not an employee, representative, or agent of NCTC. Consultant shall have control of its work and the manner in which it is performed. Consultant expressly warrants that neither Consultant nor any of Consultant's employees or agents shall represent themselves to be employees or agents of NCTC.
- 27. **National Labor Relations Board Certification:** Consultant, by signing this Agreement, does swear under penalty of perjury that no more than one final unappealable finding of contempt of court by a federal court has been issued against Consultant within the immediately preceding two-year period because of Consultant's failure to comply with an order of a federal court which orders Consultant to comply with an order of the National Labor Relations Board (Public Contract Code § 10296).
- 28. Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990: By signing this Agreement, Consultant assures NCTC that it complies with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) of 1990 (42 U.S.C. § 12101, et seq.), which prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability, as well as all applicable regulations and guidelines issued pursuant to the ADA, including but not limited to, those found within the Code of Federal Regulations, Title 49, Parts 27, 37, and 38.
- 29. Equal Employment Opportunity/Title VI Compliance: Consultant shall comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, the provisions contained in 49 CFR Part 21 through Appendix C, 23 CFR Part 200, 23 CFR Part 230, 49 U.S.C. 5332, and the Title VI Assurance executed by California under 23 U.S.C. 324 and 29 U.S.C. 794.

- a. During the performance of this Agreement, Consultant and its subcontractors shall not unlawfully discriminate, harass, or allow harassment, against any employee or applicant for employment because of sex, sexual orientation, race, color, ancestry, religious creed, national origin, physical disability (including HIV and AIDS), mental disability, medical condition, age, marital status, denial of family and medical care leave, and denial of pregnancy disability leave.
- b. Consultant and its subcontractors shall ensure that the evaluation and treatment of their employees and applicants for employment are free from such discrimination and harassment.
- c. Consultant shall comply with Executive Order 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity" as amended by Executive Order 11375, and as supplemented in the Department of Labor Regulation (41 CFR Part 60), and any other applicable federal and state laws and regulations relating to equal employment opportunity, including the provisions of the California Fair Employment and Housing Act (Government Code § 12900, et seq.) and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder (California Code of Regulations, Title 2, § 7285.0, et seq.). The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment and Housing Commission implementing Government Code §§ 12990 (a-f), set forth in Chapter 5 of Division 4 of Title 2 of the California Code of Regulations, are incorporated into this Agreement by reference and made a part hereof as if set forth in full. Consultant and its subcontractors shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other agreement.
- d. Consultant shall also comply with the Older Americans Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. 6101), prohibiting discrimination on the basis of age, Section 324 of Title 23 U.S.C., prohibiting discrimination based on gender, and Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973 (29 U.S.C. 794), and 49 CFR Part 27 regarding discrimination against individuals with disabilities.
- e. Solicitations for Subcontractors, including procurement of materials and equipment: In all solicitations either by competitive bidding or negotiations made by Consultant for work to be performed under a subcontract, including procurement of materials or leases of equipment, each potential subcontractor or supplier shall be notified by Consultant of Consultant's obligations under this Agreement and the statutes and regulations relative to nondiscrimination set forth herein.
- f. Information and Reports: Consultant shall provide all information and reports required by applicable federal and state laws and regulations or directives issued pursuant thereto, and shall permit access to its books, records, accounts, other sources of information, and its facilities as may be determined by NCTC or the Federal Transit Administration to be pertinent to ascertain compliance with such laws and regulations, orders and instructions, including but not limited to permitting access to all records of employment, employment advertisements, application forms and other pertinent data and records by the State Fair Employment Practices and Housing Commission or any other agency designated to investigate compliance with this section. Where any information is required of

Consultant which is in the exclusive possession of another who fails or refuses to furnish this information, Consultant shall so certify to NCTC or the Federal Transit Administration as appropriate, and shall set forth what efforts it has made to obtain the information.

- g. Sanctions for Noncompliance: In the event of Consultant's noncompliance with the nondiscrimination provisions of this Agreement, NCTC shall impose such contract sanctions as it or the Federal Transit Administration may determine to be appropriate, including but not limited to:
 - (1) Withholding of payments to Consultant under the Agreement until Consultant complies, and/or,
 - (2) Cancellation, termination or suspension of the Agreement, in whole or in part.
- h. Incorporation of Provisions: Consultant shall include the provision of this Section 29 in every subcontract, including procurement of materials and leases of equipment, unless exempt by the Regulations, or directives issued pursuant thereto. Consultant shall take such action with respect to any subcontract of procurement as NCTC or the Federal Transit Administration may direct as a means of enforcing such provisions including sanctions for noncompliance: provided, however, that, in the event a contractor becomes involved in, or is threatened with, litigation with a subcontractor or supplier as a result of such direction, Consultant may request that NCTC enter into such litigation to protect the interests of NCTC. In addition, Consultant may request the United States to enter into such litigation to protect the interests of the United States.
- 30. **Drug-Free Certification**: By signing this Agreement, Consultant hereby certifies, under penalty of perjury under the laws of the State of California, Consultant will comply with the requirements of the Drug-Free Workplace Act of 1990 (Government Code § 8350, et seq.) and will provide a drug-free workplace by taking the following actions:
 - a. Publish a statement notifying employees that unlawful manufacture, distribution, dispensation, possession, or use of a controlled substance is prohibited, and specifying actions to be taken against employees for violations.
 - b. Establish a Drug-Free Awareness Program to inform employees about:
 - (1) The dangers of drug abuse in the workplace;
 - (2) The person's or the organization's policy of maintaining a drug-free workplace;
 - (3) Any available counseling, rehabilitation, and employee assistance programs; and
 - (4) Penalties that may be imposed upon employees for drug abuse violations.
 - c. Every employee of Consultant who works under this Agreement shall:

- (1) Receive a copy of Consultant's Drug-Free Workplace Policy Statement; and
- (2) Agree to abide by the terms of Consultant's Statement as a condition of employment on this Agreement.
- 31. **Union Organizing**: By signing this Agreement, Consultant hereby acknowledges the applicability of Government Code § 16645 through § 16649 to this Agreement, excluding § 16645.2 and § 16645.7.
 - a. Consultant will not assist, promote, or deter union organizing by employees performing work on this Agreement if such assistance, promotion, or deterrence contains a threat of reprisal or force, or a promise of benefit.
 - b. Consultant will not meet with employees or supervisors on NCTC or state property if the purpose of the meeting is to assist, promote, or deter union organizing, unless the property is equally available to the general public for meetings.
- 32. **Ownership of Documents:** Original document, methodological explanations, computer programs, drawings, designs and reports generated by this Agreement shall belong to and become the property of NCTC. Consultant is not liable for changes made by others or any use beyond the scope of this Agreement. Any additional copies, not otherwise provided for herein, shall be the responsibility of NCTC.

It is understood that in addition to NCTC, state and federal funding agencies shall have the right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and authorize others to use, the information developed from federally reimbursed projects.

- 33. Campaign Contribution Disclosure: Consultant has complied with the campaign contribution disclosure provisions of the California Levine Act (Government Code § 84308) and has completed the Levine Act Disclosure Statement attached hereto as Exhibit C.
- 34. **Entire Agreement and Amendment:** This Agreement contains the entire agreement of the parties, and supersedes any prior written or oral agreements between them concerning the subject matter contained herein. There are no representations, agreement arrangements, or understandings, oral or written, between the parties relating to the subject matter contained in this Agreement, which are not fully expressed herein.

The provisions of this Agreement may be waived, altered, amended, or repealed in whole or in part only upon written consent of all parties to this Agreement. Consultant shall only commence work covered by an amendment after the amendment is executed and notification to proceed has been provided by NCTC.

35. **Severability:** If any term or provision of this Agreement or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall, to any extent, be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Agreement, or the application of such term or provision to persons or circumstances other than those to which it is invalid or unenforceable, shall not be affected thereby, and each term and provision of this Agreement shall be valid and shall be enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law, unless the exclusion of such term or provision, or the application

of such term or provision, would result in such a material change so as to cause completion of the obligations contemplated herein to be unreasonable.

- 36. **Headings:** The headings of the various sections of this Agreement are intended solely for convenience of reference and are not intended to explain, modify, or place any interpretation upon any of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 37. **Authority:** Each person signing this Agreement on behalf of a party hereby certifies, represents, and warrants that he or she has the authority to bind that party to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 38. **Counterparts:** This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which shall constitute an original, and all of which taken together shall constitute one and the same instrument. Documents executed, scanned, and transmitted electronically and electronic signatures shall be deemed original signatures for purposes of this Agreement and all matters related thereto, with such scanned and electronic signatures having the same legal effect as original signatures.
- 39. **Necessary Acts:** Each party to this Agreement agrees to perform any further acts and execute and deliver any further documents that may be reasonably necessary to carry out the provisions of this Agreement.
- 40. **Disadvantaged Business Enterprise:** It is the policy of NCTC that Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE), as defined in Title 49, Part 26 of the Code of Federal Regulations (49 CFR 26) entitled, "Participation by Disadvantaged Business Enterprises in Department of Transportation Financial Assistance Programs," shall have the maximum opportunity to participate in the performance of contracts financed in whole or in part with Federal funds under this Agreement. Consequently, the DBE requirements of 49 CFR Part 26 apply to this Agreement.

Exhibit 10-O1 Consultant Proposal DBE Commitment and **Exhibit 10-O2 Consultant Contract DBE Commitment** are attached to the Agreement. The purpose of these forms is to provide information regarding DBE participation and to reference them as necessary forms to collect data required under 49 CFR 26. Even if no DBE participation will be reported, Consultant agrees to complete and sign the forms and return them with the executed Agreement.

- a. Non-discrimination: "The Contractor or subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin, or sex in the performance of this contract. The contractor shall carry out applicable requirements of 49 CFR, Part 26 in the award and administration of U.S. DOT-assisted contracts. Failure by the contractor to carry out these requirements is a material breach of this contract, which may result in the termination of this contract or such other remedy, as recipient deems appropriate." Each subcontract signed by the Consultant in the performance of this Agreement must include an assurance that the Consultant and subcontractor shall not discriminate on the basis of race, color, national origin or sex in the performance of this Agreement.
- b. Prompt Payments to DBE and Non-DBE Subcontractors: Subrecipient shall insert the following clauses in any contract funded under this Agreement:

- (1) Contractor agrees to pay each subcontractor under this Agreement for satisfactory performance of its contract no later than 30 days from the receipt of each payment Contractor receives from Consultant. Any delay or postponement of payment from the above-referenced time frame may occur only for good cause following written approval of Consultant. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontracts.
- (2) Contractor agrees to return retainage payments to each subcontractor within 30 days after the subcontractor's work is satisfactorily completed. Any delay or postponement of payment from the above-referenced time frame may occur only for good cause following written approval of Consultant. Pursuant to 49 CFR Section 26.29, a subcontractor's work will be deemed satisfactorily completed when all the tasks called for in the subcontract have been accomplished and documented as required by Consultant agency. If Consultant makes an incremental acceptance of a portion of the work hereunder, the work of a subcontractor covered by that acceptance will be deemed satisfactorily completed. This clause applies to both DBE and non-DBE subcontracts.

In the event Contractor fails to promptly return retainage as specified above, Consultant shall consider it a breach of this Agreement, which may result in the termination of this Agreement or other such remedy as Consultant agency deems appropriate including, but not limited to, administrative sanctions or penalties, including the remedies specified in Section 7108.5 of the California Business and Professions Code.

- (3) The foregoing requirements shall not be construed to limit or impair any contractual, administrative, or judicial remedies otherwise available to Contractor or subcontractor in the event of a dispute involving late payment or non-payment to the Contractor or deficient subcontract performance or noncompliance by a subcontractor.
- c. Records: The Consultant shall maintain records of all subcontracts entered into with certified DBE subcontractors and records of materials purchased from certified DBE suppliers. The records shall show the name and business address of each DBE subcontractor or vendor and the total dollar amount actually paid each DBE subcontractor or vendor. The records shall show the date of payment and the total dollar figure paid to all firms. Upon completion of the contract, with submittal of the final invoice, the Consultant agrees to complete **Exhibit 17-F Final Report-Utilization of Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBE), First-Tier Subcontractors** (attached) whether or not DBE participation is obtained. A summary of the DBE records shall be prepared, certified correct, and submitted on the form. The Consultant is to show total dollars paid to each DBE subcontractor and supplier.
- d. Termination of a DBE: In conformance with Federal DBE regulation Section 26.53(f)(1) and 26.53(f)(2), Part 26, 49 CFR, the Consultant shall not:
 - (1) Terminate for convenience a listed DBE subcontractor and then perform

that work with its own forces (personnel), or those of an affiliate, unless the Consultant has received prior written authorization from the project representative of NCTC to perform the work with other forces (other than the Consultant's own personnel) or to obtain materials from other sources; and

(2) If a DBE subcontractor is terminated or fails to complete its work for any reason, the Consultant shall be required to make good faith efforts to replace the original DBE subcontractor with another DBE.

(3) Noncompliance by the Consultant with the requirements of this paragraph is considered a material breach of this Agreement and may result in termination of the Agreement or other such appropriate remedies for a breach of this Agreement as NCTC deems appropriate.

e. DBE Certification and Decertification: If a DBE subcontractor is decertified during the life of the contract, the decertified subcontractor shall notify the Consultant in writing with the date of decertification. If a subcontractor becomes a certified DBE during the life of the contract, the subcontractor shall notify the Consultant in writing with the date of certification. The Consultant shall then provide to the project representative of NCTC written documentation indicating the DBE's existing certification status.

Any subcontract entered into as a result of the Agreement shall contain all of the provisions of this section.

- 41. **Debarment, Suspension, and Other Responsibilities**: Consultant certifies and warrants that neither Consultant firm nor any owner, partner, director, officer, or principal of Consultant, nor any person in a position with management responsibility or responsibility for the administration of funds:
 - a. Is presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any federal or state department or agency.
 - b. Has within the three-year period preceding this Agreement, been convicted of or had a civil judgment rendered against it for commission of fraud or a criminal offense in connection with obtaining, attempting to obtain, or performing a public (federal, state, or local) transaction or contract; violation of federal or state antitrust statutes; or commission of embezzlement, theft, forgery, bribery, falsification or destruction of records, making false statements, or receiving stolen property.
 - c. Is presently indicted for or otherwise criminally or civilly charged by a government entity (federal, state, or local) with commissions of any of the offenses enumerated in paragraph "b" above.
 - d. Has within a three-year period preceding this Agreement, had one or more public transactions or contracts (federal, state, or local) terminated for cause or default.

Consultant further certifies that it shall not knowingly enter into any transaction with any subconsultant, material supplier, or vendor who is debarred, suspended, declared ineligible,

or voluntarily excluded from covered transactions by any federal or state department/ agency.

- 42. **Non-lobbying Certification:** Consultant certifies, to the best of his or her knowledge and belief, that:
 - a. No State or Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid, by or on behalf of Consultant, to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any state or federal agency, a Member of the State Legislature or United States Congress, an officer or employee of the Legislature or Congress, or any employee of a Member of the Legislature or Congress in connection with the awarding of any State or Federal contract, the making of any State or Federal grant, the making of any State or Federal loan, the entering into of any cooperative agreement, and the extension, continuation, renewal, amendment, or modification of any State or Federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement.
 - b. If any funds other than State or Federal appropriated funds have been paid or will be paid to any person for influencing or attempting to influence an officer or employee of any Federal agency, a Member of Congress, an officer or employee of Congress, or an employee of a Member of Congress in connection with this federal contract, grant, loan, or cooperative agreement, Consultant shall complete and submit **Exhibit 10-Q Disclosure of Lobbying Activities** (attached) in accordance with its instructions.
 - c. This certification is a material representation of fact upon which reliance was placed when this Agreement was entered into. Submission of this certification is a prerequisite for making or entering into this Agreement, imposed by Section 1352, Title 31, U.S. Code. Any person who fails to file the required certification shall be subject to a civil penalty of not less than \$10,000, and not more than \$100,000 for each such failure.
 - d. Consultant also agrees by signing this Agreement that it shall require that the language of this certification be included in all lower-tier subcontracts which exceed \$100,000 and that all such subrecipients shall certify and disclose accordingly.
- 43. **Clean Air Act:** Consultant agrees to comply with all applicable standards, orders or regulations issued pursuant to the Clean Air Act, as amended, including sections 174 and 176, subdivisions (c) and (d) (42 U.S.C. §§ 7504, 7506 (c) and (d)) and 40 CFR Part 93 ("Clean Air requirements"). Consultant agrees to report each Clean Air requirement violation to NCTC and understands and agrees that NCTC will, in turn, report each Clean Air requirement violation as required to assure notification to FTA and the appropriate EPA Regional Office. Consultant also agrees to include these requirements in each subcontract exceeding \$100,000 financed in whole or in part with Federal assistance provided by FTA.
- 44. **Disputes:** Any dispute, other than audit, concerning a question of fact arising under this contract that is not disposed of by agreement shall be decided by a committee consisting of NCTC's Executive Director and Chairperson, who may consider written or verbal

information submitted by Consultant. Not later than 30 days after completion of all work under the contract, Consultant may request review by NCTC's Governing Board of unresolved claims or disputes, other than audit. The request for review will be submitted in writing.

Any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under an audit of this Agreement shall be reviewed by NCTC's Executive Director. Not later than 30 days after issuance of the final audit report, Consultant may submit a written request for review by the Executive Director of unresolved audit issues.

Neither the pendency of a dispute, nor its consideration by the committee or Executive Director, will excuse Consultant from full and timely performance in accordance with this Agreement.

45. **Equipment Purchase:**

- a. Written prior authorization by NCTC's Project Representative is required before Consultant enters into any unbudgeted purchase order, or subcontract exceeding \$5,000 for supplies, equipment, or services not included in Exhibit A. Consultant shall provide an evaluation of the necessity or desirability of incurring such costs.
- b. For purchase of any item, service or consulting work not covered in Consultant's Cost Proposal and exceeding \$5,000, prior authorization by NCTC's Project Representative must be obtained, three competitive quotations must be submitted with the request, or the absence of bidding must be adequately justified.
- c. Any equipment purchased as a result of this agreement is subject to the following: "Consultant inventory nonexpendable shall maintain an of all property. Nonexpendable property is defined as having a useful life of at least one year and an acquisition cost of \$5,000 or more. If the purchased equipment is removed from use for the Project before the end of its useful life, Consultant may either keep the equipment for non-project purposes and credit NCTC in an amount equal to its fair market value, or sell such equipment at the best price obtainable at a public or private sale, and credit NCTC in an amount equal to the sales price. If Consultant elects to keep the equipment, fair market value shall be determined at Consultant's expense, on the basis of a competent independent appraisal of such equipment. Appraisals shall be obtained from an appraiser mutually agreeable to NCTC and Consultant, and if it is determined to sell the equipment, the terms and conditions of such sale must be approved in advance by NCTC."
- d. All subcontracts in excess \$25,000 shall contain the above provisions.
- 46. **Safety:** Consultant shall comply with any applicable OSHA regulations regarding necessary safety equipment or procedures, and safety instructions issued by NCTC, if any.
- 47. **State Prevailing Wage Rates:** The State of California's General Prevailing Wage Rates are not applicable to this Agreement.

Status Report on the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) Update and Draft SUBJECT: **Policy Element**

DATE: March 20, 2023

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Receive a presentation on the status of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) update and provide feedback on the draft policy element.

BACKGROUND: As the State-designated Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) for Nevada County, NCTC is required to prepare and adopt a RTP every five years. The RTP is a long range (20-year minimum) transportation funding plan that identifies the County's priorities in addressing traffic congestion, mobility needs, safety improvements, and maintenance of the existing transportation infrastructure. Not only does the plan comply with state statues for continuous, cooperative, and comprehensive planning, the RTP serves as the mechanism by which state and federal funds are allocated to local transportation projects. The current RTP was adopted in 2018.

The update is an opportunity to revisit the goals and policy statements of the plan, locally identified project priorities, funding assumptions, and alignment with new state transportation policies such as the Caltrans' California Transportation Plan 2050 and the California State Transportation Agency's Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI).

NCTC staff kicked off the RTP Update with the assistance of the consulting firm DKS Associates in July 2022. Since that time, the consultant team, NCTC and local agency staff have collected background demographic data; transportation data such as travel patterns, congestion levels, truck traffic, collisions, travel time reliability; and recently began confirming transportation projects for consideration. Future efforts will consist of developing financial revenue estimates, engaging the public on project priorities, financially constraining the plan's projects to revenue estimates, evaluating the performance of the plan, and preparing an environmental document.

The RTP document will generally consist of the following sections:

- Introduction Summarizes the regional setting and key characteristics of Nevada County such as demographics, population and employment growth, and travel characteristics.
- Policy Element Sets the policy framework by which the County's mobility needs are identified and met. The Policy Element identifies the transportation goals, objectives, performance measures, and policies to meet the needs of the region and reflects environmental, social, and economic goals.
- Action Element Identifies the short- and long-term multi-modal projects to address the needs of the transportation system and meet the goals and objectives of the RTP.
- Financial Element Outlines the financial assumptions and forecasts of transportation costs and revenues necessary to implement the Action Element. The Financial Element presents a constrained funding scenario that includes revenue that is reasonably expected to be available from existing funding sources over the life of the plan.

As an important first step, NCTC staff and Jim Damkowitch from DKS Associates will present a more detailed overview of the RTP update, key milestones, and lead a discussion on the draft RTP Goals, Objectives, and Policies. DKS Associated reviewed the currently adopted RTP Goals, Objectives, and Policies and have suggested several additional topical areas to better align with new statewide transportation policies and planning requirements. The topical areas include:

- Minimization of vehicle miles traveled (VMT)
- Supporting micro-transit and other emerging service to rural residents
- Supporting practices to minimize the adverse impacts of future growth
- Preparing the future transportation system for connected systems and alternative fuels
- Taking steps to ensure infrastructure resiliency and disaster preparedness

We are writing today to express our strong support for the submission of the Nevada County Transportation Commission's (NCTC) and Caltrans District 3's Grass Valley Wildfire Evacuation Route Project on State Route 49 (SR 49) for State Transportation Infrastructure Climate Adaptation Program/Promoting Resilient Operations for Transformative, Efficient, and Cost-Saving Transportation (PROTECT) funding, and submission of the SR 49 Corridor Improvement Project – Phase II for 2023 Rebuilding American Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) grant funding that would include a Caltrans Letter of Support.

Caltrans District 3, in partnership with NCTC, developed the proposed SR 49 Grass Valley Evacuation Route Project to address all of the goals and eligibility requirements for the State Transportation Infrastructure Climate Adaption Program/PROTECT funding program. The project focuses on improving evacuation efficiency, which is one of the most critical transportation and resiliency strategies from the READY Nevada County Extreme Climate Event Mobility and Adaptation Plan (2022) by improving the proposed segment to current design standards providing shoulders and a two-way left turn lane that could be utilized to improve efficiency of evacuation egress and ingress of emergency responders.

The SR 49 Corridor Improvement Project – Phase II will eliminate a southbound State Route 49 bottleneck created by the transition from a four-lane freeway to two-lane highway through the construction of a southbound truck climbing lane. The project will also construct a new access point to the Nevada County Transit Operations Center and Zero Emission Bus (ZEB) charging infrastructure. The project will improve evacuation egress, enhance goods movement, reduce auto and freight related emissions on adjacent AB 1550 communities, as well as Historically Disadvantage Community areas and Areas of Persistent Poverty, and reduce community impacts related to I-80 detours.

Years of extended drought conditions continue to increase the significant wildfire risk for the counties within District 1, as verified by the recently updated 2022 CAL FIRE Wildfire Risk Area designations. The updated designations increased the wildfire risk for multiple areas within District 1, such as Nevada County, to "Very High Wildfire Risk Areas". In Nevada County, 92% of the County's residents live in a High or Very High Wildfire Severity Zone.

According to evacuation modeling conducted by the Nevada County Office of Emergency Services, a wildfire requiring the evacuation of the cities of Grass Valley, Nevada City, and adjacent residential areas would take approximately 7 hours and 44 minutes to evacuate the approximately 25,000 residents to the Bear River High School evacuation center located approximately 14 miles to the south. That time frame threatens the safety of all residents in the area. I cannot stress more the importance of implementing both of these projects within the SR 49 corridor to improve the efficiency of evacuation egress. These projects have the potential to drastically reduce evacuation timeframes and save lives.

These projects are supported by the CAL FIRE Nevada-Yuba-Placer Unit, Nevada County Office of Emergency Services, Nevada County Consolidated Fire District, Nevada County Sheriff's Department, Nevada County Firewise Communities Coalition, Citizens for Highway 49 Safety, Nevada County, City of Grass Valley, and City of Nevada City.

Between 2018 and 2022 California experienced 38,807 wildfires resulting in a total of 9,490,075 acres burned, 148 fatalities, and 40,796 structures damaged or destroyed. Within California Senate/Assembly District 1, approximately 2,772,945 acres were burned during this time frame. The federal PROTECT formula funding combined with the Governor's one time budget augmentation present a historic funding opportunity to make an investment in climate adaptation strategies to improve critical community evacuation routes in California.

We would welcome the opportunity to meet with you and the project sponsors to highlight how the planned improvements in this corridor will achieve key state and regional goals.

Meetings and Events

In 2022, the Commission continued to focus on advancing key state transportation goals related to equity, climate, safety, economic growth, and asset management through its policy, planning, and funding decisions. The Commission held seven regular two-day meetings, six interagency Equity Listening Sessions, two Equity Advisory Roundtable meetings, two joint meetings with the California Air Resources Board and the California Department of Housing and Community Development, two rural Town Hall meetings, four Road Charge Technical Advisory Committee meetings, and over two dozen program workshops. Meetings were primarily held in-person, in accordance with public health guidance related to the COVID pandemic, with the option for virtual participation, as well as sign language and interpretative services, to ensure public accessibility.

Programs and Project Allocations

This past year, the Commission approved new projects in the first three programs shown in the table below and prepared to award new projects in the other four programs next spring.

Prior to awarding new projects, the Commission updates guidelines for each program through a collaborative process via public workshops open to all stakeholders and the public. Updates this cycle focused on equity, climate, public engagement, and performance measurement.

The Commission also continued to allocate funds to previously approved projects totaling \$7.5 billion, which will create over 80,000 jobs across the state. These projects, now underway, are bringing roadways up to a state of good repair, as required by Senate Bill 1 (Beall, Chapter 5, 2017), the Road Repair and Accountability Act, while advancing state climate goals, reducing congestion, enhancing goods movement, and making streets more accessible and safer for bicyclists and pedestrians. Communities throughout California, particularly its most disadvantaged, are benefitting from these investments.

In June, the Commission approved a funding distribution for the federal Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act that infused substantial new funds in several programs.

The Active Transportation Program also benefitted from a \$1 billion one-time increase from the state's General Fund. Despite these funding augmentations, this program remains severely oversubscribed and in need of an ongoing, sustainable funding solution to address state climate, safety, mobility, and equity goals.

Equity and Public Engagement

In 2022, the Commission continued to implement its Racial Equity Statement. Adopted in January 2021, this statement acknowledges historical and present racial inequity in the transportation sector and outlines the Commission's commitment to address racial equity in our work.

Equity Advisory Roundtable. Established in 2021 by the Commission, this body brought together equity experts, practitioners, and community leaders from throughout the state to assist in the development of the Commission's equity initiatives, including the establishment of a standing interagency Equity Advisory Committee. The Roundtable held six convenings, with its final meeting occurring in April.

Interagency Equity Advisory Committee. In June, the Commission approved the formation of an interagency Equity Advisory Committee in partnership with the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans), and the California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA). The Committee is intended to elevate diverse and historically marginalized voices to advise the three agencies on how to achieve meaningful outcomes in transportation equity, environmental justice, and equitable economic opportunities especially as related to transportation planning and programming.

Equity Listening Sessions. In 2022, the Commission, Caltrans, and CalSTA co-hosted six sessions to allow people from underserved communities in different areas of the state to share their personal stories about impacts to them or their communities resulting from the transportation system. While these initial sessions have been completed, the Commission continues to build upon these efforts to reach additional communities and respond to their equity concerns.

Equity-Focused Staffing and Training. The Commission requested and received funding for a position dedicated to equity in the 2022-23 budget. The Commission also hired a contractor to provide Racial Equity Training for Commissioners and select Commission staff.



Funded through the Trade Corridor Enhancement Program, the Fyffe Avenue Grade Separation project constructed a four-lane overcrossing over the Fyffe Avenue rail line and removed an at-grade intersection. This project reduces travel times for vehicles entering the Port of Stockton, thereby facilitating the movement of goods. Removing the at-grade intersection also provides vehicle and rail safety improvements and enables a critical emergency evacuation route.

Transportation, Climate, and Housing

CAPTI Implementation. At its August 2021 meeting, the Commission endorsed CalSTA's Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure (CAPTI) framework and strategies to invest discretionary transportation dollars to combat and adapt to climate change while supporting public health, safety, and equity. With the adoption of updated program guidelines at its August 2022 meeting, the Commission successfully implemented every Commission-led strategy identified as short-term and has begun working on strategies identified as medium-term.

Clean Freight Corridor Efficiency Assessment. Under Senate Bill 671 (Gonzalez, Chapter 769, 2021), the Commission is to identify freight corridors that are priority candidates for the deployment of zero-emission medium- and heavy-duty vehicles; projects to support the deployment; and barriers and potential solutions. The Commission has assembled a work group of over 150 stakeholders and held seven workshops to develop the Assessment, which is due to the Legislature by December 1, 2023.

Joint Meetings. In 2022, the Commission held joint meetings in April and November with the California Air Resources Board and the California Department of Housing and Community Development to coordinate policies.

Legislative Recommendations

The Commission recommends the following to advance state transportation goals:

- Authorize compensation for transportation advisory committee members, and adjust Commissioner compensation for inflation, to alleviate financial barriers to serving the state.
- Increase the Active Transportation Program by \$1 billion per year to fund critical climate, safety, mobility, and equity projects.
- Provide support for transit operators to address the continued impacts of the pandemic on their operations funding.
- Clarify provisions of the Commission's existing statutory authority to approve road tolling/pricing, such as converting un-tolled lanes to tolled lanes, which are critical for achieving state mobility and climate goals.
- Authorize a funding needs assessment for California's general aviation airports, including recommendations to ensure that California airports can fully leverage available federal funds, address community impacts, and support electrification.
- Authorize a study on the implementation of weight-based passenger vehicle fees to account for the disproportionate effects of larger vehicles on pedestrian injuries and fatalities.

The California Transportation Commission was established in 1978 as an independent state agency. The Commission is responsible for funding highway, local road, transit, intercity passenger rail, active transportation, and aviation projects throughout California. The Commission also advises and assists the California State Transportation Agency Secretary and the Legislature on state transportation policies and plans. SUBJECT: Reissuance of the Fiscal Year 2023-24 State of Good Repair Program Allocation Preliminary Estimate

The State Controller's Office (SCO) is issuing a revision to the allocations stated in the summary schedule of State of Good Repair (SGR) program funds available to be allocated for fiscal year (FY) 2023-24, which was originally released on January 31, 2023. This revision uses Public Utilities Code (PUC) section 99314.10 allocations based on the SCO transmittal letter, Reissuance of the FY 2020-21 SGR Program Allocation Estimate, dated August 1, 2022, for each Transportation Planning Agency (TPA), county transportation commission, and the San Diego Metropolitan Transit System for the purposes of Public Utilities Code (PUC) section 99312.1(c). Allocations for the SGR program are calculated pursuant to the distribution formulas in PUC sections 99313 and 99314. Also enclosed is a schedule detailing the estimated available amount calculated pursuant to PUC section 99314 for each TPA by operator.

PUC section 99313 allocations are based on the latest available annual population estimates from the Department of Finance. The revenue basis will be updated in the August 2023 Fiscal Year 2023-24 State Transit Assistance estimates with the most current Financial Transactions Report data available.

According to the FY 2023-24 proposed California Budget, the estimated amount of SGR program funds budgeted is \$125,619,000. Prior to receiving an apportionment of SGR program funds in a fiscal year, an agency must submit a list of proposed projects to the California Department of Transportation (DOT). DOT reports to SCO the eligible agencies that will receive an allocation quarterly pursuant to PUC sections 99313 and 99314. SCO anticipates that the first quarter's allocation to eligible agencies will be paid by November 30, 2023. Please refer to the schedule for the amounts that relate to your agency.

CALTRANS DISTRICT 3 STATE ROUTE 49 EVACUATION IMPROVEMENT PROJECT PROPOSAL - STATE TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE CLIMATE ADAPTATION PROGRAM

Caltrans District 3 has submitted a climate adaptation funding proposal focused on improving evacuation efficiency in the State Route 49 corridor between Ponderosa Way, just north of Alta Sierra Drive, and Wolf Road/Combie Road for consideration in the State Transportation Infrastructure Climate Adaptation Program. This project implements adaptation and resiliency strategies from the READY Nevada County Extreme Climate Event Mobility and Adaptation Plan (2022) by improving the proposed segment to current design standards through the construction of shoulders and a two-way left turn lane that could be utilized to improve efficiency of evacuation egress and ingress of emergency responders.

These improvements can be utilized during evacuation events to help address the significant traffic volumes anticipated. In the mostly likely case of a southbound evacuation, the northbound travel lane will be allocated for emergency responder ingress while the two-way left-turn lane, southbound lane and shoulder could be used to assist with evacuation of the public.

This new funding program is part of the Infrastructure Investment Jobs Act (IIJA) federal funding authorization bill. This funding program presents a unique funding opportunity to make an investment in the State Route 49 corridor that could help increase the ability to more efficiently evacuate residents and improve safety.

<u>UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA, LOS ANGELES WILDFIRE REASEARCH CENTER</u> <u>EVACUATION MODELING RESEARCH PROJECT WESTERN NEVADA COUNTY</u>

Nevada County Transportation Commission staff have been working in coordination with the UCLA Wildfire Research Center and the Nevada County Office of Emergency Services in pursuit of grant funding opportunities to conduct a wildfire evacuation research project focused on western Nevada County. The research project aims at developing a comprehensive, multi-purpose, community-centered Wildfire Evacuation Modeling and Simulation platform. The platform will integrate aspects of wildfire dynamics, traffic, and human behavior models through a probabilistic approach for assessing the likelihood of safe evacuation of communities endangered by wildfires. The result will be a robust and user-friendly platform that will allow for:

- Assessing the impact of transportation infrastructure on the probability of a community's safe egress and comparing different scenarios, informing resource allocation.
- Evaluating the vulnerability of community residents to wildfires considering their sociodemographic profile and access to exit roads, assisting managers and planners before and during evacuation efforts.
- Identifying the most vulnerable communities in California, informing actions across sectors and regions.

The project is intended to accomplish the following objectives:

- Integrate a robust traffic model that will allow comparing the impact of different scenarios on community evacuation, e.g., increased roads capacity, modified roads network, blockage of roads at a particular time.
- Integrate aspects of community resilience for developing metrics for assessing and improving the resilience of communities in danger of wildfires.
- Expand the human behavior model, extending the adopted socio-demographic factors and their impact on residents' evacuation awareness, decision-making, and movement times.
- Integrate different sources of wildfire spreading data, considering not only historical fires but also projections that include climate change.
- Develop a user-friendly interface for the decision-making of different stakeholders, including planners, evacuation managers, firefighters, and researchers.

Integrating robust fire, traffic, and human behavior models, along with community resilience and infrastructure aspects, will provide a risk-informed, model- and data-driven approach for wildfire evacuation management. Once developed, it is intended to be utilized to increase the safety of California communities vulnerable to wildfires, optimally informing resource allocation, and helping save lives.

<u>CALTRANS FISCAL YEAR 2023/24 SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORTATION PLANNING</u> <u>GRANT PROGRAM</u>

NCTC staff in coordination with the Nevada County Transit Services Division will be submitting a grant application for Fiscal Year 2023/24 Sustainable Communities Grant funding to conduct a Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA) of the western Nevada County fixed route and paratransit public transit services (Nevada County Connects/Nevada County Now). The analysis will include an evaluation of the existing transit/paratransit services and is intended to help guide the transit systems' emergence from depressed pandemic ridership. The study will also analyze alternative operating models with a key focus of improving transit system efficiency, effectiveness, accessibility, and sustainability. The COA will consider an entire spectrum of service options ranging from minor modifications to a full "revisioning" of the system. Grant awards will be announced in the summer of 2023, and if NCTC is successful the planning study will be amended into the Fiscal Year 2023/24 Overall Work Program.
