9. <u>Draft Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan</u> Comments provided.

Genevieve Evans from LSC Transportation gave a presentation on the Draft Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan. NCTC staff has been working with the Town of Truckee and LSC Transportation to look at existing transit services in the Town of Truckee, how things are working in terms of ridership, cost-effectiveness, and a number of different indicators of the system. LSC Transportation also shared input from public engagement regarding what the public would like to see, and what is working well for them, with a focus on the goal of Town of Truckee maintaining a fare free public transit system. LSC Transportation presented a draft plan that looked at different scenarios of how transit might look in the next five years in the Town of Truckee.

Executive Director Mike Woodman highlighted a letter submitted in opposition of Senate Bill 1216 by Senator Blakespear that would have prohibited Class III bikeways from being funded in the state's Active Transportation Program. NCTC staff and NCTC's state advocacy firm Politico Group coordinated with the California State Association of Counties, the Rural County Representatives of California, the California League of Cities, and several other rural regional transportation planning agencies, to ensure that agencies are able to maintain flexibility in determining the most appropriate type of bicycle improvements for their local context. As a result of these efforts, Senator Blakespear accepted the proposed amendments to the bill, which would allow Class III facilities to be funded in the Active Transportation Program as part of a connected low stress bicycle network. In light of the acceptance of the proposed amendments, NCTC will be withdrawing their position of opposition.

A Class III bikeway has a bicycle pavement marking and signage to alert motorists of cyclists sharing the roadway. The majority of the Class III facilities that are recommended in the 2019 Countywide Active Transportation Plan feature a five foot striped multi-use shoulder, which provide a safe buffer and a lower stress facility within the existing constraints found in our local area.

In the future NCTC plans to update the Active Transportation Program with a project that looks at bicycle and pedestrian improvements across the county, in coordination with the update of the Town of Truckee Trails and Bikeways Master Plan. New technology is available that can provide estimates of real-time data on what roadways people are riding on within the county, and that data can be used to focus on efforts to make those well-used roadways safe.

15. <u>Executive Director's Report</u>

Executive Director Mike Woodman gave an overview of his report. The Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan update and the associated environmental documentation is currently underway. Following completion of the draft documents there will be a 30-day public review period and then it will be presented to the Commission for comment. Comments received will be incorporated as appropriate into the final Regional Transportation Plan.

NCTC received approval from Caltrans for the FY 2023-24 Sustainable Transportation Planning Grant entitled Reenvisioning Transit in Western Nevada County Comprehensive Operational Analysis, for the amount of \$170,000. NCTC will manage this study in coordination with Nevada County Transit Services Division. This study will analyze the existing transit services in Western Nevada County as well as alternative transit models such as microtransit to identify the most cost-effective way of providing public transit services. Transit Manager Robin Van Valkenburgh expressed his thanks to NCTC staff for their perseverance on applying for this grant. The operational analysis will utilize public involvement to determine interests, options, and ideas of what the transit system could potentially look like, and from there create a solid plan to move forward with.

12. Project Status Reports

A. Caltrans Project – Sam Vandell, Caltrans District 3 Project Manager for Nevada County.

Project Manager Sam Vandell was not able to stay in attendance to give his report, but there was some discussion at the meeting during his agenda item.

There was a request to place merge arrows on Highway 49 southbound at the acceleration and deceleration lanes at the Wolf Road/Combie Road intersection. There was also a request to place traffic cameras at the junction of Highways 49 and 80 in Auburn, to get more accurate reports of the traffic conditions in that area so that people would be able to visually see where the backups are.

Executive Director Mike Woodman gave an overview of the status of the State Route 49 Multi-Modal Corridor Improvement Project. The project will be in the environmental documentation phase soon, which will provide some opportunities for public input. Staff have received comments and concerns regarding the plans at Coyote Street and State Route 49 to limit access to right in and right out only, and a pedestrian crossing with a median barrier, and those comments have been forwarded to staff at Nevada City as well as the County and Caltrans. It is anticipated that the proposed improvements for that intersection will be studied to see if there is potentially still a way to provide the connectivity and safety for pedestrian crossings with a more flexible alternative. The initial study included a roundabout as one of the alternatives, however the Project Advisory Committee settled on the lower-cost recommendation instead of the roundabout. For a roundabout to be considered at this point it would need to secure other funding. Staff will be looking at possibilities with Caltrans and talking with Nevada City and County staff as well.

B. Truckee Tahoe Area Regional Transit Report – Alfred Knotts, Transportation Program Manager for Town of Truckee

Alfred Knotts, Transportation Manager for Town of Truckee, introduced the Transit Tour scheduled to begin after the conclusion of the meeting. He thanked everyone for traveling to Truckee for the meeting and looked forward to the opportunity to show what makes Truckee a very special place to work, live and play. The Transit Tour included highlights of the Brockway Art and Trail Connection, Railyard Mobility Hub, TART Connect, Bike Share Program, Truckee Artist Lofts, Trout Creek Restoration, Reimagine Bridge Street, West River Streetscape, West River Park, and Legacy Trail Phase 4A.

<u>COMMISSION ANNOUNCEMENTS</u>: There were no commission announcements.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 24-27 approving the attached State of Good Repair (SGR) Project for Fiscal Year 2024/25.

BACKGROUND: On April 28, 2017 Governor Brown signed Senate Bill (SB) 1, known as the Road Repair and Accountability Act of 2017. SB 1 will provide over \$50 billion in new transportation funding over the next decade to repair highways, bridges and local roads, to make strategic investments in congested commute and freight corridors and to improve transit service. A portion of SB 1 will provide approximately \$105 million annually, with annual inflationary adjustments, to transit operators in California for eligible transit maintenance, rehabilitation and capital projects. This funding program is referred to as the State of Good Repair (SGR) program; see attached 2024-25 State of Good Repair Program Allocation Estimate, August 1, 2024.

The SGR program is funded from a portion of a Transportation Improvement Fee on vehicle registrations. This program has a specific goal of keeping transit systems in a state of good repair, including the purchase of new transit vehicles, and maintenance and rehabilitation of transit facilities and vehicles.

Prior to receiving an apportionment of SGR funds in a given fiscal year, a potential recipient agency must submit a list of projects proposed to be funded to their Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA). For FY 2024/25, NCTC coordinated with the Town of Truckee and the County of Nevada on the distribution of funding and jointly decided to allocate funding to the Town of Truckee New Transit Center Property Acquisition, Facility Design and Construction. Approval of Resolution 24-27 will allocate \$184,977 to the Town of Truckee New Transit Center Property Acquisition, Facility Design and Construction, Facility Design and Construction project.

Prior to receiving SGR funds, recipients must identify an agent who has authority to act on behalf of the agency. The Executive Director of NCTC will be authorized to execute all required documents of the SGR program.

WHEREAS, the fund recipient (Town of Truckee) agrees to comply with all conditions and requirements set forth in the Certifications and Assurances document and applicable statutes, regulations and guidelines for all SGR funded transit projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Town of Truckee New Transit Center Property Acquisition, Facility Design and Construction project is approved for \$184,977 of State of Good Repair funding for FY 2024/25. This approval is contingent upon Truckee Town Council approval and receipt of the fully executed SGR Subrecipient Agreement for FY 2024/25.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Executive Director of NCTC is authorized to execute all required documents of the SGR program and any Amendments thereto with the California Department of Transportation.

Enclosed is the summary schedule of State of Good Repair (SGR) program funds available to be allocated for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 for each Transportation Planning Agency (TPA), county transportation commission, and the San Diego Metropolitan Transit System for the purposes of Public Utilities Code (PUC) section 99312.1(c). Allocations for the SGR program are calculated pursuant to the distribution formulas in PUC sections 99313 and 99314. Also enclosed is a schedule detailing the estimated available amount calculated pursuant to PUC section 99314 for each TPA by operator.

PUC section 99313 allocations are based on the latest available annual population estimates from the Department of Finance. Pursuant to PUC section 99314.10, the PUC section 99314 allocations are based on the State Controller's Office (SCO) transmittal letter, Reissuance of the FY 2020-21 SGR Program Allocation Estimate, dated August 1, 2023.

According to the FY 2024-25 enacted California Budget, the estimated amount of SGR program funds budgeted is \$137,953,000. Prior to receiving an apportionment of SGR program funds in a fiscal year, an agency must submit a list of proposed projects to the California Department of Transportation (DOT). DOT reports to SCO the eligible agencies that will receive an allocation quarterly pursuant to PUC sections 99313 and 99314. SCO anticipates the first quarter's allocation will be paid by November 29, 2024. Please refer to the schedule for the amounts that relate to your agency.

SUBRECIPIENT AGREEMENT

BETWEEN THE NEVADA COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION

AND

THE TOWN OF TRUCKEE

FOR FY 2024-25 STATE OF GOOD REPAIR FUNDS

THIS SUBRECIPIENT AGREEMENT ("Agreement") is entered into effective <u>September</u> <u>18, 2024</u>, by and between the Nevada County Transportation Commission ("NCTC") and the Town of Truckee, California ("SGR Subrecipient").

WHEREAS, NCTC has been awarded certain State of Good Repair ("SGR") funds administered through the California Department of Transportation ("Caltrans"), to implement and support capital projects that maintain the public transit system in a state of good repair; and

WHEREAS, SGR Subrecipient is eligible to receive SGR funds as a public body corporate and politic of the State of California; and

WHEREAS, NCTC shall provide oversight and management of the SGR funds distributed to SGR Subrecipient pursuant to this agreement.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the promises and covenants herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. <u>Certifications and Assurances</u>: SGR Subrecipient agrees to comply with the SGR Recipient Certifications and Assurances.
- 2. <u>Deposit Account</u>: SGR Subrecipient shall establish a special account for the purpose of depositing therein all payments received from NCTC pursuant to this Agreement. The special account shall be in accordance with State of Good Repair Program Guidelines issued by Caltrans and the Recipient Certifications and Assurances.
- 3. <u>Third Party Contracting Requirements</u>:
 - a. SGR Subrecipient shall not award a construction contract over \$10,000 or other contracts over \$25,000 (excluding professional service contracts of the type which are required to be procured in accordance with Government Code Sections 4525 (d), (e) and (f)) on the basis of a noncompetitive negotiation for work to be performed.
 - b. Any subcontract or agreement entered into as a result of disbursing funds received pursuant to this Agreement shall contain all of the fiscal provisions of this Agreement; and shall mandate that travel and per diem reimbursements and thirdparty contract reimbursements to subcontractors will be allowable as project costs only after those costs are incurred and paid for by the subcontractors.

- c. Pre-award requirements of third-party contractors or consultants shall be consistent with Local Assistance Program requirements published by Caltrans.
- 4. <u>Accounting</u>: SGR Subrecipient shall establish and maintain an accounting system and records that properly accumulate and segregate fund expenditures by line item. The accounting system, including contractors and all subcontractors, shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices.
- 5. <u>Audit</u>: SGR Subrecipient, contractors, and subcontractors shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of contracts utilizing SGR funds, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering such contracts. The SGR Subrecipient shall make such materials available at their offices at all reasonable times for three years from the date of final payment of funds. NCTC, Caltrans, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of the State of California, shall each have access to all books, records, and documents that are pertinent for audits, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and shall be furnished copies of the same if requested.
- 6. <u>Project Completion</u>: SGR Subrecipient agrees to provide to NCTC a report summarizing total project costs and milestones for each project using SGR funds within sixty (60) days of project completion.
- 7. <u>Successors</u>: This Agreement will be binding on the parties hereto, their assigns, successors, administrators, executors, and other representatives.
- 8. <u>Waivers</u>: No waiver of any breach of this Agreement will be held to be a waiver of any prior or subsequent breach. The failure of NCTC to enforce at any time the provisions of this Agreement or to require at any time performance by the SGR Subrecipient of these provisions, will in no way be construed to be a waiver of such provisions, nor to affect the validity of this Agreement or the right of NCTC to enforce these provisions.
- 9. <u>Litigation</u>: SGR Subrecipient will notify NCTC immediately of any claim or action undertaken by it or against it that affects or may affect this Agreement or NCTC and will take such action with respect to the claim or action as is consistent with the terms of this Agreement and the interests of NCTC.
- 10. <u>Costs and Attorneys' Fees</u>: If either party commences any legal action against the other party arising out of this Agreement or the performance thereof, the prevailing party in such action may recover its reasonable litigation expenses, including court costs, expert witness fees, discovery expenses, and reasonable attorneys' fees.

- 11. <u>Governing Law and Choice of Forum</u>: This Agreement will be administered and interpreted under California law as if written by both parties. Any litigation arising from this Agreement will be brought in the Superior Court of Nevada County.
- 12. <u>Headings</u>: The headings of the various sections of this Agreement are intended solely for convenience of reference and are not intended to explain, modify, or place any interpretation upon any of the provisions of this Agreement.
- 13. <u>Authority</u>: Each person signing this Agreement on behalf of a party hereby certifies, represents, and warrants that he or she has the authority to bind that party to the terms and conditions of this Agreement.
- 14. <u>Counterparts</u>: This Agreement may be executed in multiple counterparts, each of which will constitute an original, and all of which taken together will constitute one and the same instrument.

This agreement, when countersigned, authorizes the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) to perform contract management and oversight of the RSTP exchange funds distributed to County of Nevada, hereinafter referred to as "RSTP Exchange Recipient".

The RSTP Exchange Recipient agrees to the following:

- 1. To use RSTP exchange funds for projects as authorized under Article XIX of the California State Constitution.
- Establish a special account for the purpose of depositing therein all payments received from NCTC pursuant to this Agreement: (a) for cities, within their Special Gas Tax Street Improvement Fund, (b) for counties, within their County Road Fund, and (c) for all other sponsors, a separate account.
- 3. To return RSTP exchange funds to NCTC if the funds received are not used in accordance with the terms of this agreement.
- 4. Cost Principles
 - a. To comply with Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200, Cost Principles for State and Local Government and the Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.
 - b. That (A) Contract Cost Principles and Procedures, 48 CFR, Federal Acquisition Regulations System, Chapter 1, Part 31, Et Seq., shall be used to determine the allowability of individual project cost items, and (B) those parties shall comply with Federal Administrative

Procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments. Every subrecipient receiving funds as a contractor or subcontractor under this agreement shall comply with Federal administrative procedures in accordance with 2 CFR 200, Uniform Administrative Requirements for Grants and Cooperative Agreements to State and Local Governments.

- c. Repay any RSTP exchange fund expenditures for costs that are determined by subsequent audit to be unallowable under Office of Management and Budget Supercircular 2 CFR 200. Any reimburse fund moneys are due within 30 days of demand, or within such other period as may be agreed in writing between the parties.

Any subcontract or agreement entered into as a result of disbursing funds received pursuant to this agreement shall contain all of the fiscal provisions of this agreement; and shall mandate that travel and per diem reimbursements and third-party contract reimbursements to subcontractors will be allowable as project costs only after those costs are incurred and paid for by the subcontractors.
 - c. In addition to the above, the pre-award requirements of third-party contractor/consultants should be consistent with Local Program Procedures as published by the California Department of Transportation.

The accounting system, including contractors and all subcontractors, shall conform to Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP), enable the determination of incurred costs at interim points of completion, and provide support for reimbursement payment vouchers or invoices.
- 7. Right to Audit
 - a. For the purpose of determining compliance with this agreement and other matters connected with the performance of contracts with third parties, the RSTP Exchange Recipient, contractors, and subcontractors shall maintain and make available for inspection all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of contracts, including, but not limited to, the costs of administering those various contracts. All of the above referenced parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times for three years from the date of final payment of funds. The California Department of Transportation, the California State Auditor, or any duly authorized representative of State of California or the United States Department of Transportation, shall each have access to any books, records, and documents that are

pertinent for audits, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and shall be furnished copies thereof if requested.

- 8. Travel and Subsistence
 - a. Payments for travel and subsistence expenses claimed for reimbursement or applied as local match credit shall not exceed rates authorized to be paid exempt non-represented State employees under current State Department of Personnel Administration (DPA) rules. If the rates invoiced are in excess of those authorized DPA rates, then recipient of funds is responsible for the cost difference and any overpayments shall be reimbursed on demand.
- 9. Project Completion
 - a. Agrees to provide to NCTC a report summarizing total project costs and milestones for each project using RSTP Exchange Funds within sixty (60) days of project completion.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 24-29 approving the updated Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) Policies and Procedures Manual.

BACKGROUND: The Nevada County Transportation Commission initially adopted the Policies and Procedures Manual in 1994 to provide guidelines concerning administrative procedures and activities and to ensure the smooth and proper execution of NCTC business. It is designed to be a working guide for the NCTC staff and Commissioners, committee members, and local jurisdiction staff regarding administrative roles and responsibilities.

NCTC staff recommends updating the language in the Congestion Mitigation Air Quality Improvement Program section, found on page 47, to include the following paragraph:

"NCTC's Executive Director is authorized to execute CMAQ loan agreements with other Regional Transportation Planning Agencies for the strategic delivery of larger future projects and to minimize the risk of CMAQ funds being lost. Often times loans of CMAQ funds are necessary towards the end of the Federal Fiscal Year if a local jurisdiction indicates they will not be able to meet federal approval deadlines. The ability to act quickly to execute a loan can prevent funding from being lost. Staff will inform NCTC of the loan agreement at the next NCTC meeting."

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 24-30 approving the updated Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) Administrative Operating Procedures Manual.

BACKGROUND: The NCTC Administrative Operating Procedures Manual outlines the procedures and authority of NCTC staff related to accounting, budgeting, grant applications, contracts, procurement, capital assets, surplus property, and NCTC files. Nevada County Transportation Commission's (NCTC) Administrative Operating Procedures are approved by the Commission and the procedures may be modified by the Commission, based on recommendations made by the Executive Director, the Nevada County Auditor-Controller, NCTC's fiscal and compliance auditor, or NCTC's legal counsel. In reviewing the currently adopted NCTC Administrative Operating Procedures related to Professional Contracts and Work Orders, NCTC's Executive Director and Legal Counsel identified that the current monetary threshold amounts related to Executive Director contract authority warranted review and consideration for updates.

The currently adopted Administrative Operating Procedures authorizes the Executive Director to approve contracts up to \$10,000 for items that are identified in the adopted Overall Work Program (OWP). Any contract over \$10,000 or a contract for an item not identified in the OWP are required to be presented to the NCTC for consideration and approval. NCTC's professional services contract threshold has not been increased since 1998. The intent of the threshold policy is to provide the Executive Director with authority to execute contracts for items in the approved OWP, for example, Transportation Engineering Services used to investigate or answer traffic operational, travel demand modeling, or other technical engineering issues on projects and programs. Expediting small contracts can facilitate time sensitive procurement of services and reduce the administrative burden on the NCTC. Consulting costs over the last twenty-six years have increased significantly, reducing NCTC's ability to utilize this option. NCTC's Executive Director recommends updating the threshold to allow procurement of needed services in a more expeditious manner and reduce delays in procurement of consultant services that are necessary to conduct NCTC's regional transportation planning activities.

Update to the NCTC Administrative Operating Procedures, Resolution 24-30 Page 2

NCTC's Executive Director conducted outreach with multiple Regional Transportation Planning Agencies and found that most agencies have increased the Executive Director's contract authority to \$50,000. NCTC's legal counsel Sloan Sakai Yeung & Wong LLP was also consulted about updating the professional services contracting threshold and indicated that the \$50,000 threshold is typically what most of their clients have adopted and they would support an increase.

NCTC's Executive Director recommends updating <u>Section V. Contracts</u> of the NCTC Administrative Operating Procedures Manual as follows (changes highlighted in yellow):

V. CONTRACTS

A. Professional Services Contracts

Professional service contracts provide for work to be performed by other than NCTC staff, such as attorneys, engineers, or other consultants possessing a high degree of technical skill. The Executive Director may award contracts for professional services identified in the current OWP that cost less than \$5,000, \$10,000 through direct negotiation without conducting a Request for Proposal (RFP). Professional service contracts over \$5,000, \$10,000, but less no more than \$10,000, \$50,000, which are identified in the current OWP, may be awarded and signed by the Executive Director after going through the RFP process, unless a sole source contract is justified. Professional service contracts that exceed \$10,000, or any contract that is not identified in the current OWP, must be presented to the NCTC for consideration and approval.

RFPs provide consultants an outline of the work or services that are being requested, and contain information specifying the format of the proposal in order to facilitate the equitable comparison of those proposals. RFPs will be posted on the NCTC website and/or distributed via email or mail. The purpose of the RFP process is to establish an open, fair, and competitive selection of qualified professional consultants. RFPs contain the criteria that will be used to select a consultant for the project. RFPs will be distributed to consultants listed in an established NCTC file or those who appear to be qualified for a specific project. The Executive Director is responsible for taking all reasonable steps to ensure that Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) are afforded a maximum opportunity to participate in the proposal process. A DBE consultant list is maintained by the ASO. If state and/or federal funds are used for a project, the ASO and project manager are responsible for following correct DBE procedures throughout the project.

After proposals are received, NCTC staff organizes a panel of technically competent persons to review the proposals. Each proposal is evaluated for its responsiveness to the RFP and the established evaluation criteria. Based on recommendations from the review panel and direction from the Executive Director, a draft contract is drawn by the ASO and sent to NCTC's legal counsel for review and signature. A contract that exceeds \$10,000 \$50,000, or is not identified in the current OWP, will be presented to the NCTC for review and approval. Successful proposals, statements of qualifications, and evaluation materials for RFPs will be retained through project completion plus an additional five years. Unsuccessful proposals and statements of qualifications will be retained for two years.

B. Work Orders

The Executive Director may use a work order to establish specific tasks to be performed by a consultant.

- 1. Any task requiring more than an estimated eight hours of work or charges in excess of \$1,000 will be authorized through a written work order. The work order will describe the work to be performed, any deliverable products, scheduled completion, and the fees to be paid.
- 2. Tasks requiring less than eight hours of a consultant's time or charges less than \$1,000 will be completed under written or verbal authorization of the Executive Director.
- 3. For projects in excess of \$5,000 \$10,000, the NCTC's procedures for Professional Services Contracts will be followed. A contract that exceeds \$50,000, or is not identified in the current OWP, will be presented to NCTC for review and approval.

WHEREAS, the NCTC's professional services contract threshold for the Executive Director has not been increased since 1998; and

WHEREAS, the intent of the threshold policy is to provide the Executive Director with authority to execute contracts for items in the approved OWP, to expedite procurement of services and reduce administrative burden on the NCTC; and

WHEREAS, Section V. Contracts of the NCTC Administrative Operating Procedures Manual will be updated as follows:

V. CONTRACTS

A. Professional Services Contracts

Professional service contracts provide for work to be performed by other than NCTC staff, such as attorneys, engineers, or other consultants possessing a high degree of technical skill. The Executive Director may award contracts for professional services identified in the current OWP that cost less than \$10,000, through direct negotiation without conducting a Request for Proposal (RFP). Professional service contracts over \$10,000, but no more than \$50,000, which are identified in the current OWP, may be awarded and signed by the Executive Director after going through the RFP process, unless a sole source contract is justified. Professional service contracts that exceed \$50,000, or any contract that is not identified in the current OWP, must be presented to the NCTC for consideration and approval.

RFPs provide consultants an outline of the work or services that are being requested, and contain information specifying the format of the proposal in order to facilitate the equitable comparison of those proposals. RFPs will be posted on the NCTC website and/or distributed via email or mail. The purpose of the RFP process is to establish an open, fair, and competitive selection of qualified professional consultants. RFPs contain the criteria that will be used to select a consultant for the project. RFPs will be distributed to consultants listed in an established NCTC file or those who appear to be qualified for a specific project. RECOMMENDATION: Adopt Resolution 24-31 approving Amendment 1 to the FY 2024/25 Overall Work Program (OWP).

BACKGROUND: Resolution 24-31 approves the changes to the FY 2024/25 OWP work elements and budgets described below:

As part of completing the year-end financial reports and reconciliation of expenditures for the 2023/24 fiscal year, staff amends the FY 2024/25 OWP to update the estimated revenue carryover amounts. The FY 2024/25 OWP Budget Tables have been adjusted as shown in Table 1, Budget Summary:

- The FY 2024/25 State Rural Planning Assistance (RPA) Formula Funds decreased by \$4,672.13 based on year-end expenditures. Also, the amount of RPA grant funds carried into FY 2024/25 decreased by \$299,068.09 based on year-end expenditures.
- The State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) Planning (PPM) Funds carried into FY 2024/25 increased by \$15,479.33 based on year-end expenditures.
- The Local Transportation Fund (LTF) Carryover Funds decreased by \$84,009.17 based on the year-end expenditures. The LTF Administration Funds increased by \$52,333.94 and the LTF Planning Funds decreased by \$52,333.88, and the Contingency Funds decreased by \$106,893.64.
- There was no change in Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) Funds.
- Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) funds were reduced by \$1,910.59 based on year-end expenditures.
- A Strategic Partnership Grant (Work Element 2.3.4, Reenvisioning Transit in Western Nevada County) provided \$170,000 of Federal Transit Administration (FTA) 5304 funds.

These adjustments resulted in a total net budget decrease of \$282,574.24.

Table 2, Direct Costs Budget, shows the changes made to the identified projects based on year-end accounting and has a net decrease of \$134,166.38.

Table 3, Indirect Costs Budget, shows adjustments that were made based on an increase of \$206 in the Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association (TNT TMA) membership, and an increase of \$230 in the Professional & Service Organization budget. The changes resulted in a net increase of \$436.00.

Tables 4, 5, and 6 show the details of the changes summarized in Tables 1, 2, and 3.



Although the Overall Work Program is a requirement of Caltrans, the program serves to inform elected officials and residents about the upcoming transportation planning efforts in Nevada County.

Funding Sources

NCTC uses a variety of local and state formula and discretionary funding sources to deliver the OWP. The FY 2024/25 Amendment #1 budget is \$2.1 million to support the fiscal administration, planning activities, and consultant contracts.



- -Eastern Nevada County Transit Development Plan (WE 2.3.3) Planning study that evaluates transit service models for the Town of Truckee.
- -Nevada County Local Road Safety Plan (WE 2.4.1) Funding for Nevada County to develop a comprehensive roadway safety plan identifying safety problems and solutions.
- -Rural Induced Demand Study (WE 2.4.4) NCTC is managing a study on induced travel in rural regions of California. The study will examine the connection between roadway widening and the extent to which rural residents drive more as a result. Research on rural travel behavior is lacking and urban standards have been applied to rural areas, limiting improvements to address roadway safety, traffic flow, and goods movement needs.
- -Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan (WE 2.4.6) NCTC is funding a fleet electrification planning study to identify how the County of Nevada can transition county owned vehicles to meet the upcoming California clean vehicle fleet regulations for light, medium, and heavy duty vehicles.

FY 2024/25 New Planning Activities

- -Zion St. Mobility/School Access Study (WE 2.4.3) NCTC is funding a planning study to analyze cost-effective improvements on Zion Street in Nevada City to improve safety and pedestrian and bicycle connectivity to school facilities.
- -Rural Counties Task Force Administration (WE 2.4.5) NCTC serves as the fiscal administrator and moderator for the rural advisory group to the California Transportation Commission.



-Reinvisioning Transit in Western Nevada County (WE 2.4.3) -NCTC is funding a comprehensive review of exitings transit services and future service models.


MISSION STATEMENT

- ✓ NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media outlets, the NCTC website, and through social media platforms.
- ✓ NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP) that is consistent with the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.
- ✓ NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- ✓ NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- ✓ NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- ✓ NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.
- ✓ NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- ✓ NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds, Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program funds, Carbon Reduction Program, and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC)

NCTC is a Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA) created pursuant to Title 7.88 of the State of California Government Code, Section 67920. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee. The NCTC board has seven members. Four members are appointed by the Board of Supervisors and three are appointed by the incorporated municipalities in the County. The Board of Supervisors appoints two of its members and two County at-large representatives. The municipalities appoint three city/town council members; one each from Nevada City, Grass Valley, and the Town of Truckee.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)

The TAC is made up of representatives of public transit operators, local public works and planning departments, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, and Caltrans. The Committee provides technical input on transportation issues and ensures there is coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC)

The SSTAC is made up of potential transit users who are representatives of the general public; seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local social service and consolidated transportation providers; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Latino communities. The goal of the SSTAC is to maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the underserved and under-represented members of the community, such as the elderly and disabled. The SSTAC recommends action to the Commission relative to the unmet transit needs findings, and advises the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.

Airport Land Use Commissions (ALUCs)

The Nevada County Transportation Commission has been designated as the Airport Land Use Commission for the Nevada County Airport and provides staff for the Truckee Tahoe ALUC. The purpose of Airport Land Use Commissions is to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within the areas around the airports, to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses.

Nevada County Demographics

As of January 1, 2024, the population of Nevada County was estimated at 100,177. The largest municipality is Truckee with a population of 16,778, followed by Grass Valley at 13,400 and Nevada City at 3,347. The population of the unincorporated portion of the County was 66,652. The Race and Ethnicity data for Nevada County on Census.gov reported the racial makeup of the county as 83.7% White, followed by 10.2% Hispanic, 1.4% Asian, 1.0% Native American, 0.4% Black or African American, 0.1% Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander, and 3.4% Some Other Race. The data at Census.gov indicates that 11% of the population was below the poverty level.

OVERALL WORK PROGRAM INTRODUCTION

NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program (OWP). This work program includes specific "Work Elements" that describe the planning projects and associated activities that are to be conducted, and identifies the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures, such as Rural Planning Assistance (RPA), Local Transportation Funds (LTF), Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP), Planning, Programming, and Monitoring (PPM), or Federal Transit Administration (FTA). A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between NCTC, the Cities of Grass Valley and Nevada City, the Town of Truckee, and the County of Nevada provides the framework for NCTC's coordination of regional transportation planning with local governments in Nevada County. The Commission staff prepares a draft OWP and in accordance with the MOU, solicits and integrates comments from each of the jurisdictions. The proposed work program is then submitted to the Commission for approval and forwarded to Caltrans. Caltrans, as the grantor of Rural Planning Assistance funds and Federal Transit Assistance funds, approves the OWP. The budget reflects the on-going regional transportation planning process in Nevada County. Major concerns of each of the jurisdictions and Caltrans are reflected in the elements and levels of funding. The OWP is updated each year to report on the progress of identified projects, propose new or continuing projects for the ensuing year, and to provide an estimate of the required funding of the OWP work elements.

Public Participation

Public involvement is a major component of the transportation planning and programming processes. NCTC makes a concerted effort to solicit public input from all Nevada County residents, including under- represented groups, in many aspects of transportation planning within Nevada County. Specific examples are listed below:

- NCTC maintains a website (<u>www.nctc.ca.gov</u>), a Facebook page, and a Twitter account to keep the public informed of transportation planning and programming efforts underway in Nevada County. Agendas are posted on the bulletin boards of local jurisdictions and emailed to mobile home parks, residential homeowners associations, senior centers, environmental advocates, associations representing the private sector, and individuals that have asked to be included on the distribution list. Citizens are encouraged to attend and speak at NCTC meetings on any matter included for discussion on the agenda at that meeting.
- Articles on the preparation of the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) and Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), as well as the public comment periods, are posted on the NCTC website.
- Copies of the Draft RTP are made available for review at the main public libraries in western and eastern Nevada County, as well as on the NCTC website.
- Press releases are sent to the media establishments in western and eastern Nevada County announcing the Draft RTP is available for review and comment and noting some key findings.
- Public hearings are held and noticed in the main newspapers in western and eastern Nevada County prior to adoption of the RTP and RTIP.
- Each year public notifications are sent out to encourage participation in transportation planning processes, such as the annual unmet transit needs public hearing and numerous public workshops relating to the transportation projects and planning activities of NCTC.
- In accordance with AB52, NCTC conducts outreach and Tribal Consultation on any projects for which NCTC is lead agency and files a Notice of Preparation, Notice of Mitigated Negative Declaration or Notice of Negative Declaration. While there are currently no federally recognized tribes located within Nevada County, NCTC consults with the Native American Heritage Commission to identify Native American tribal organizations with historic or cultural interests regarding lands in Nevada County. These groups include but are not limited to the Nisenan of the Nevada City Rancheria and United Auburn Indian Community (UAIC).
- NCTC consults with USDA Forest Service Tahoe National Forest and Bureau of Land Management.

Regional Issues, Needs, and Goals

The main transportation issues in western Nevada County are related to providing adequate multimodal transportation infrastructure and services to meet the needs of the County, while maintaining and enhancing the rural character and environmental qualities of the area. In western Nevada County, interregional traffic adds to the existing challenge and need to maintain and improve the transportation system.

In eastern Nevada County, the issues also stem from the challenges to meet the needs related to the high volumes of traffic generated by travelers taking advantage of the world-class recreational opportunities available in the Truckee-North Tahoe area. In addition to discretionary recreation demand travel, high housing costs have increased daily commuter trips into and out of the Truckee/North Tahoe region. To address these issues requires a multimodal and multijurisdictional approach to transportation planning in the region.

Acquiring adequate and timely funding for transportation improvements is the central need within all of the Nevada County issues. Implementation of highway and regional roadway improvements will be key to providing efficient operations, while improving safety and air quality. The 2020 Census reported that approximately 28.5% of the county population was over 65 years of age, between 2010 and 2020 that population increased from 19.6% to 28.5%, and it is projected that by 2030 this population is expected to increase to over 40%. As the population of residents over the age of 65 increases, it will result in increased demand for public transit services in Nevada County. Additional local, state, and federal transit operating and capital revenues, will be necessary in order to meet the additional demand placed on the public transit systems.

Transportation issues facing Nevada County which have been identified as regionally significant include the following:

- Insufficient state, federal, and local transportation revenues
- Air quality/greenhouse gas emission reductions
- Coordination of land use, air quality, and transportation planning
- Providing and maintaining a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information, and environmental quality
- Efficient implementation of new technologies, including zero-emission bus fleets and charging technology
- High cost of housing and short-term rentals increasing commute trips and distances
- Improvements to the regional transportation system to ensure safe and efficient emergency evacuation

Recognition of these issues leads to the overall goal of the Regional Transportation Plan, which is to provide and maintain a transportation system that enhances safety, the efficient movement of all people, goods, and services, and environmental quality. In the Policy Element this overarching goal is divided into the following four goals:

- 1) Provide for the safe and efficient movement of all people, goods, services, and information;
- 2) Reduce adverse impacts on the natural, social, cultural, and historical environment and the quality of life;
- 3) Develop an economically feasible multimodal transportation system;
- 4) Create and maintain a comprehensive, multi-modal transportation system to serve the needs of the County.

- 3. Increase the security of the transportation system for motorized and non-motorized users.
- 4. Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and for freight.
- 5. Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life, and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth, housing, and economic development patterns.
- 6. Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight.
- 7. Promote efficient system management and operation.
- 8. Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system.
- 9. Improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system and reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.
- 10. Enhance travel and tourism.

WORK ELEMENT 1 - COMMUNICATION AND COORDINATION

Public involvement is a major component of NCTC's planning process. The activities and products from Project 1.1, General Services and Communication, are intended to provide the public with complete information and timely notices, thereby giving full public access to key decisions.

Work Element 1 incorporates the following activities that are an integral part of accomplishing NCTC's Mission:

- > NCTC interacts with the community through workshops, news media outlets, NCTC webpage, and social media platforms.
- NCTC conducts a comprehensive planning process in the development of its annual Overall Work Program so that funds expended on planning projects will implement the goals of the RTP.

NCTC has the statutory responsibility to administer Transportation Development Act (TDA) funds, and to ensure that all expenditures of TDA funds are in conformity with the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). NCTC also administers funds received from the Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP) and the Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF) program. The work performed under Project 1.2, Fiscal Administration, has been incorporated into the NCTC Mission as follows:

- > NCTC administers Transportation Development Act funds to ensure all statutory requirements are met, including the identification of the region's transit needs.
- NCTC manages Regional Surface Transportation Program funds, Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee funds and Regional Improvement Program funds in accordance with Federal acts and statutes promulgated by the State of California, selecting and funding eligible transportation improvement projects based upon those that are most effective and beneficial to the region.

Through communication, collaboration, and public outreach activities, Work Element 1 incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors (see page I-5) into the NCTC planning program.

Information and data developed through these activities are included in the Regional Transportation Plan and in transit planning documents.

WORK ELEMENT 2 - REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING

NCTC has the responsibility to prepare and adopt a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) directed to the achievement of a coordinated and balanced regional transportation system. The plan is to be action-oriented and pragmatic, considering both the short-and-long term future, and is to present clear, concise policy guidance to local and state officials. Projects 2.1 (Transportation Planning), 2.1.1 (Nevada County Regional Transportation Plan Update), 2.2 (Transportation Improvement Programs), 2.3 (Transit and Paratransit Programs), and 2.4 (Coordination of Regional Planning), are tied to the NCTC Mission by the following activities:

- NCTC develops a Regional Transportation Plan (RTP) which includes the actions, funding recommendations, and policy direction necessary to meet the needs of each transportation system component in the region.
- > NCTC develops and adopts a Regional Transportation Improvement Program that is consistent with the RTP.
- NCTC reviews transportation plans and programs of member agencies and endorses them based on consistency with the RTP and RTIP. In keeping with this responsibility, the NCTC strives to be creative in assisting the region in developing the revenues to construct improvement projects.
- NCTC communicates and participates in workshops with Caltrans on proposed projects to be developed in the County of Nevada to ensure that the policies and goals of the RTP are implemented.
- NCTC coordinates with regional transportation planning agencies on legislation and statewide policy issues to ensure the region receives appropriate attention and funding from the State of California and the Federal government.
- NCTC participates in interregional planning projects to ensure Nevada County projects support both regional and statewide transportation goals.

The following activities and products included in Work Element 2 are appropriate uses of Rural Planning Assistance Funds:

- ✓ Participate in Federal and State Clean Air Act transportation related air quality planning activities. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Develop and/or modify tools that allow for better assessment of transportation impacts on community livability and emergency preparedness (e.g. integration of GIS and census data into the regional traffic model and development of performance measurement tools and strategies). (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)
- ✓ Identify and document transportation facilities, projects, and services required to meet the regional and interregional mobility and access needs. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, and 2.3)
- ✓ Define solutions and implementation issues in terms of the multimodal transportation system, land use and economic impacts, financial constraints, air quality and environmental concerns (including wetlands, endangered species, and cultural resources). (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Assess the operational and physical continuity of transportation system components within and between metropolitan and rural areas, and interconnections to and through regions. (Projects 2.1, 2.3, and 2.4)

WORK ELEMENT 2 - REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLANNING (continued)

- ✓ Conduct transit needs public hearings and prepare transit development plans and transit marketing plans as appropriate. (Project 2.3)
- ✓ Investigate methods to reduce vehicle travel and methods to expand and enhance travel services. (Projects 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Incorporate transit and intermodal facilities, bicycle transportation facilities, and pedestrian walkways in projects where appropriate. (Projects 2.1, 2.2 and 2.3)
- ✓ Participate with regional, local and state agencies, the general public, and the private sector in planning efforts to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that maximize and implement the regional transportation infrastructure. (Projects 2.1, 2.2, 2.3, and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct collaborative public participation efforts to further extend transportation planning to communities previously not engaged in discussion. (Project 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Create, strengthen, and use partnerships to facilitate and conduct regional planning activities between Caltrans, RTPAs, Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs), transit districts, cities, counties, the private sector, and other stakeholders. (All WE 2 Projects)
- ✓ Use partners to identify and implement policies, strategies, programs and actions that enhance the movement of people, goods, services, and information. (Projects 2.1 and 2.3)
- ✓ Ensure that projects developed at the regional level are compatible with statewide and interregional transportation needs. (Projects 2.2 and 2.4)
- ✓ Conduct planning and project activities (including corridor studies, and other transportation planning studies) to identify, develop, and monitor current and future STIP projects. (Projects 2.1 and 2.2)
- ✓ Implement ways to meet transportation needs by using existing transportation facilities more efficiently. Encourage owners and operators of transportation facilities/systems to work together to develop operational objectives and plans maximizing utilization of existing facilities. (Projects 2.1, 2.3 and 2.4)
- ✓ Document environmental and cultural resources and develop and improve coordination between agencies using Geographic Information Systems (GIS), Intelligent Transportation Management Systems (ITMS), and other computer-based tools. (Projects 2.1 and 2.4)

Work Element 2, Regional Transportation Planning, incorporates the ten Federal Planning Factors into the NCTC planning program (see page I-6).

Monitoring safety and operational data of transportation facilities and services in Projects 2.1 and 2.3 will aid NCTC efforts to incorporate "safety" and "security" within the planning process. Through expanded Technical Advisory Committee meetings, transportation planning will be coordinated with emergency preparedness plans in the region. Systems management and operational data will be used to identify opportunities to increase transit ridership and develop operational improvements for regional transportation facilities. Management and operations data will also be key components in guiding capital investment plans for regional transportation system facilities and services. Planning activities will include coordination with nonemergency human service transportation providers. NCTC will also provide information to regional transit operators to ensure appropriate safety, security, and operational training opportunities are provided.

- NCTC and the Nevada County Office of Emergency Services continued to discuss coordination and partnership opportunities in relation to a mutual desire to conduct coordinated wildfire/evacuation research with the University of California Los Angeles Environmental Engineering Department utilizing western Nevada County as a test bed region for the testing and further development of the latest technical modeling platforms.
- NCTC staff also participated in meetings with Nevada County OES regarding other current evacuation planning initiatives underway.
- NCTC continued conversations with the University of California Los Angeles Environmental Engineering Department on wildfire research and prepared a letter of collaboration in support of a grant submittal to the National Science Foundation to establish a Research Center *CyPRES* (*Community Pyro-Resilience, Equitability, and Sustainability*).
- NCTC coordinated with Caltrans District 3 Safety Division to analyze and review accident data in the SR 20 corridor between Grass Valley and the Yuba County line.
- NCTC monitored the development and status of all Caltrans projects located within the boundaries of the SR 49 Corridor System Management Plan (CSMP) and monitored accident data for regional roadways within Nevada County.
- NCTC enhanced its public engagement activities and outreach efforts by expanding its social media footprint and identified disadvantaged and vulnerable community groups, in an effort to better serve those communities.

Project 2.3.4 – Reenvisioning Transit in Western Nevada County/Comprehensive Operational Analysis (COA)

The Reenvisioning Transit in Western Nevada County / Comprehensive Operational Purpose: Analysis (COA) will comprehensively review the existing transit services offered and identify areas and opportunities to transition to alternative operating models to provide greater system efficiency and ridership benefits. Similar to many other transit systems across the nation, Nevada County Connects (fixed route transit service) has not rebounded from the impacts of the COVID 19 Pandemic and it is imperative to identify the most cost effective and efficient services with the limited operational funding streams available to meet the needs of the residents and visitors of Western Nevada County. NCTC will manage this study in coordination with Nevada County Connects, the Cities of Nevada City and Grass Valley, key stakeholders, and residents to capture the vision that most successfully explores the relationships between effective transit and land-use, population growth and employment patterns, as well as social equity and areas of high transit need. The COA will generate recommendations based on extensive data analysis, public outreach, and industry best practices for deploying various public transportation modes and integrating with the Statewide Transit and Rail Plans, and the COA shall consider an entire spectrum of service options ranging from minor modifications to a full "reset" of the system. These options may include traditional fixed route service, dial-a-ride service, micro-transit service, micromobility options, and/or a combination to address the challenges of meeting the transit needs outside the fixed route/ADA service areas and outlying communities.

Project 2.4.4 – Rural Counties Task Force Rural Induced Demand Study

<u>Purpose</u>: On behalf of the Rural Counties Task Force, the Nevada County Transportation Commission is managing a study to be conducted by qualified transportation consulting firms in partnership with legal firms with expertise in the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) to review the previous research on induced demand, as well as current available data, related guidance documents, and causal factors, to determine the significance and applicability of induced demand on rural highway improvements. In addition, the study will provide recommendations on how to appropriately address induced demand on rural highway improvements, including recommendations for addressing these rural highway improvements in relation to CEQA and recommendations for incorporating the study findings into future updates of state guidance documents.

- NCTC continued to coordinate with the consultant team to prepare administrative drafts of several deliverables which included the Literature Review, a technical memo on the National Center Sustainable Transportation (NCST) Induced Demand Calculator Tool sensitivity analysis, and recommendations on addressing rural induced demand on State Guidance documents.
- NCTC staff reviewed the updated Infrastructure Projects listed in the Project Data Base.
- NCTC staff in coordination with consultant staff finalized the Short-List of Projects collected pre and post construction data and conducted a sensitivity analysis of the National Center Sustainable Transportation induced demand calculator tool.
- Consultant analyzed several of the selected project corridors to identify other factors that may be influencing VMT results.
- Consultant team completed their analysis of selected project corridors and various factors that would have influenced VMT results over a five, 10, and 20-year period.
- Consultant team prepared a technical memorandum which included a description of the projects and corridors evaluated, increases in actual VMT, a comparison and evaluation to the NCST Induced Demand Calculator Tool, and a peer review of the findings.
- NCTC staff reviewed the preliminary findings and provided comments to the consultant team on the State Guidance recommendations memo.
- Consultant team and NCTC also gave presentations providing a summary of the preliminary findings to the Caltrans SB 743 Implementation Working Group and Rural Counties Task Force.

- Consultant team conducted VMT sensitivity analysis to evaluate reliability of the NCTS calculator in estimating induced vehicle miles traveled.

Project 2.4.6 – Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan for County of Nevada

<u>Purpose</u>: On behalf of the County of Nevada, the Nevada County Transportation Commission will manage a fleet electrification planning study to identify how the County of Nevada can make the transition to electrification of public fleets to comply with upcoming California Air Resource Board (CARB) regulations related to the Innovative Clean Transit and lightweight, medium-duty, and heavy-duty public fleet electrification regulations.

The study will guide Nevada County in its endeavor to meet the regulations by evaluating and identifying a detailed plan to successfully convert the county vehicle fleet to electric vehicles within the timeline specified by CARB. The infrastructure needs for power delivery and charging, maintenance needs, and capital replacement considerations will be incorporated into the overall plan. Where electrification of certain vehicle fleet mixes (e.g. heavy-duty trucks) may not be possible due to market readiness, other zero-carbon alternatives will be explored and evaluated for fleet replacement and infrastructure improvements needs.

Previous Work:

- NCTC staff coordinated with the consultants, the Nevada County Fleet Manager, Town of Truckee Transit Manager, and the Nevada County Transit Manager to create existing and future fleet inventory data reports and needed future energy use estimates for all fleet, and review transition plans for each agency.
- NCTC staff worked closely with the local agencies and consulting staff on the cleaned and validated fleet data, energy use estimates, and a transition plan for each department, and the cleaned and validated facility data, and recommendations for charging stations at each facility.
- NCTC staff and local agency staff reviewed recommendations for resiliency that align with emergency operation plans for off-grid and energy storage, and possible locations of public/workplace charging stations, and the possible use of hydrogen energy.
- NCTC staff worked with the Nevada County Transit Manager and the Town of Truckee Transit Manager on their ZEB Rollout Plans, which were submitted to the Air Resources Board (ARB) in June 2023 and approved by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors and the Town of Truckee Town Council in July 2023.
- NCTC staff coordinated with the consultant staff to develop the SWOT Analysis of Alternative Fuels and the EV Testing Weights and Measures Report. The Analysis and Report were reviewed by the PAC and comments and edits were noted.
- NCTC staff worked closely with the local agencies and consulting staff on the Nevada County ZEV replacement phase strategies.
- NCTC staff participated in the March 2024 check-in meeting to review the consultants proposed Draft Report for the Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan, including Vehicle Replacement Phases, Baseline Assumptions (vehicle capital and operation costs), Charging Strategy Considerations (dedicated, shared, and recommended strategies). NCTC staff and local agency staff requested edits and corrections be made to the Draft Report to reflect larger charging units/stations at certain locations.
- NCTC staff participated in check-in meetings with consultant staff, to discuss status of plan and to ensure project deliverables are on track with project schedule.

<u>Active Transportation Plan</u>: Identifies a network of pedestrian and bicycle facilities and projects to support pedestrian and bicycle safety for people of all ages and abilities. Specifically, the Active Transportation Plan aims to:

- Identify barriers and innovative solutions to encourage walking and bicycling as viable travel modes
- Effectively build on recently completed and current active transportation planning efforts
- Develop walking/bicycling networks supportive of existing and future land uses and projects
- Develop a clearly defined implementation strategy with specific, creative, yet practical and financially feasible projects matched to specific funding opportunities

<u>Active Transportation Program (ATP)</u>: Created in 2013 by the passage of SB 99 and AB 101, the Active Transportation Program consolidates existing federal and state transportation programs into a single program with a focus to make California a national leader in active transportation. The purpose of the Active Transportation Program is to encourage increased use of active modes of transportation by achieving the following goals:

- Increase the proportion of trips accomplished by biking and walking,
- Increase safety and mobility for non-motorized users,
- Advance the active transportation efforts of regional agencies to achieve Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals, pursuant to SB 375 (of 2008) and SB 341 (of 2009),
- Enhance public health and ensure that disadvantaged communities fully share in the benefits of the program, and
- Provide a broad spectrum of projects to benefit many types of active transportation users.

<u>Airport Land Use Commission (ALUC)</u>: The fundamental purpose of ALUCs is to promote land use compatibility around airports. As expressed in state statutes, this purpose is "... to protect public health, safety, and welfare by ensuring the orderly expansion of airports and the adoption of land use measures that minimize the public's exposure to excessive noise and safety hazards within areas around public airports to the extent that these areas are not already devoted to incompatible uses." The statutes give ALUCs two principal powers by which to accomplish this objective:

- 1. ALUCs must prepare and adopt an airport land use plan; and
- 2. ALUCs must review the plans, regulations, and other actions of local agencies and airport operators for consistency with that plan.

<u>Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (ALUCP)</u>: A document referred to by ALUCs and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of an airport. The ALUCP defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight within the Airport Influence Area (AIA).

<u>Allocation</u>: A distribution of funds by formula or agreement. With regard to Transportation Development Act funds, allocation is the discretionary action by the RTPA which designates funds for a specific claimant for a specific purpose.

<u>Apportionment</u>: Distribution of funds by a formula. Apportionment under the Transportation Development Act is the determination by the RTPA of each area's share of anticipated LTF for the ensuing fiscal year.

<u>California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA</u>): A statute that requires state and local agencies to identify the significant environmental impacts of their actions and to avoid or mitigate those impacts, if feasible.

<u>Capital Improvement Program (CIP) or Capital Improvement Plan</u>: A short-range plan, which identifies capital projects and equipment purchases, provides a planning schedule and identifies options, for financing the plan.

<u>Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ)</u>: A federal funding program that is available in western Nevada County for transportation projects that demonstrate emission reductions to help attain federal air quality standards. Western Nevada County was classified in 2004 as "non-attainment" for 8-hour ozone standards. Project categories eligible for CMAQ funding include:

- Alternative fuels and vehicles
- Congestion reduction and traffic flow improvements
- Transit improvements
- Bicycle and pedestrian facilities
- Public education and outreach
- Diesel engine retrofits
- Carpooling and vanpooling

Projects are submitted by local jurisdictions for consideration and are ranked based on air quality benefits and project readiness. NCTC then reviews the ranking and chooses projects to be funded.

<u>Corridor System Management Plan (CSMP)</u>: Foundational documents supporting a partnership-based, integrated management of all travel modes (cars, trucks, transit, bicycles, and pedestrians) and infrastructure (highways, roads, rail tracks, information systems and bike routes) so that mobility along a corridor is provided in the most efficient and effective manner possible.

<u>Federal Highway Administration (FHWA)</u>: An agency within the U.S. Department of Transportation that supports state and local governments in the design, construction, and maintenance of the Nation's highway system (Federal Aid Highway Program) and various federally and tribal owned lands (Federal Lands).

Federal Transit Administration (FTA): A federal agency that provides financial and technical assistance to local public transit systems, including buses, subways, light rail, commuter rail, trolleys and ferries.

Findings of Apportionment: Prior to March 1 of each year, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC), pursuant to the California Code of Regulations Section 6644, transmits "Findings of Apportionment" for all prospective claimants. The apportionments are determined from the Nevada County Auditor-Controller's estimate of Local Transportation Funding (LTF) for the ensuing fiscal year, less those funds allocated for Transportation Development Act (TDA) administration, transportation planning and programming, pedestrian/ bicycle projects, and community transit services. The remaining funds are then apportioned according to the population of each applicant's jurisdiction in relation to the total population of the County.

Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act: A federal law enacted in 2015 to provide long-term funding for surface transportation infrastructure planning and investment. The FAST Act authorizes \$305 billion over fiscal years 2016 through 2020 for highway, highway and motor vehicle safety, public transportation, motor carrier safety, hazardous materials safety, rail, and research, technology, and statistics programs.

<u>FTA Section 5310</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5310 provides formula funding to states for the purpose of assisting private nonprofit groups in meeting the transportation needs of older adults and people with disabilities when the transportation service provided is unavailable, insufficient, or inappropriate to meeting these needs.

<u>FTA Section 5311</u>: This program set forth in United States Code (U.S.C.) Title 49 Section 5311 provides grants for Rural Areas providing capital, planning, and operating assistance to states to support public transportation in rural areas with populations of less than 50,000 where many residents often rely on public transit to reach their destinations.

Interregional Transportation Improvement Program (ITIP): The ITIP is a five-year program of projects funded through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) that obtains funding primarily through the per-gallon State tax on gasoline. The ITIP is prepared by the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) and is submitted to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for approval.

Level of Service (LOS): A qualitative measure used to relate the quality of traffic service. LOS is used to analyze highways by categorizing traffic flow and assigning quality levels of traffic based on performance measures like speed, density, etc. North American highway LOS standards use letters A through F, with A being the best and F being the worst, similar to academic grading.

Local Transportation Fund (LTF): The LTF is derived from a 1/4-cent general sales tax collected statewide. The State Board of Equalization, based on the sales tax collected in each county, returns the sales tax revenues to each county's LTF. The LTF was created in 1971when legislation was passed to provide funding to counties for transit and non-transit related purposes.

<u>Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)</u>: An agreement between two (or more) parties. It expresses a convergence of will between the parties, indicating an intended common line of action. Many government agencies use MOUs to define a relationship between agencies.

<u>Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO)</u>: MPOs are the regional planning entities in urbanized areas, usually an area with a population of 50,000 or more. There are 18 MPOs in California, accounting for approximately 98% of the state's population.

<u>Nevada County Airport Land Use Commission (NCALUC)</u>: The Nevada County Transportation Commission was designated by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors and the city selection committee as the ALUC for the Nevada County Airport in May 2010. The NCTC Executive Director serves as the NCALUC Executive Director with support from the NCTC staff.

<u>Nevada County Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (NCALUCP)</u>: The basic function of this plan is to promote compatibility between the airport and surrounding land uses. The plan serves as a tool for use by the NCALUC in fulfilling its duty to review airport and adjacent land use development proposals. Additionally, the plan sets compatibility criteria applicable to local agencies and their preparation or amendment of land use plans and ordinances and to land owners in their design of new developments.

North State Super Region (NSSR): Regional transportation planning agencies from 16 counties in Northern California came together on October 20, 2010, to sign a memorandum of agreement. This agreement created an alliance between the agencies to work together and support each other on issues related to transportation and to have a unified voice representing the North State.

Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District (NSAQMD): The Northern Sierra Air Quality Management District was formed in 1986 by the merging of the Air Pollution Control Districts of Nevada, Plumas and Sierra Counties. The District is required by state law to achieve and maintain the federal and state Ambient Air Quality Standards, which are air quality standards set at levels that will protect public health. The District is composed of three primary entities, each with a specific purpose: District staff, Governing Board of Directors, and Hearing Board.

Overall Work Program (OWP): NCTC annually adopts a budget through the preparation of an Overall Work Program. This work program describes the planning projects and activities or work elements that are to be funded, and the type of funds that will pay for the expenditures.

<u>Planning, Programming, and Monitoring (PPM)</u>: PPM is funding allocated by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) through the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). Designated uses of PPM include:

- Regional transportation planning includes development and preparation of the regional transportation plan;
- Project planning includes the development of project study reports or major investment studies conducted by regional agencies or by local agencies, in cooperation with regional agencies;
- Program development includes the preparation of regional transportation improvement programs (RTIPs) and studies supporting them; and
- Monitoring the implementation of STIP projects includes project delivery, timely use of funds, and compliance with state law and CTC guidelines.

Plans, Specifications, and Estimates (PS&E): In this stage of project development, the scope of the selected alternative is refined; design surveys and photogrammetric mapping is obtained; and reports including traffic data, hydrology and hydraulics, geotechnical design, pavement design, and materials and sound wall design reports are completed. Final right-of-way requirements are determined, and procurement is initiated. At the completion of the PS&E stage, a complete set of project plans have been developed that will allow a competent contractor to bid and build the project. These plans include a refined estimate of the construction costs and any required specifications on how the work is to proceed.

Project Approval and Environmental Documentation (PA/ED): The PA/ED step of project development reinforces the philosophy of balancing transportation needs with community goals and values. Outputs of the PA/ED step are the project report and environmental document. The project report is an engineering document that evaluates the various alternatives for selection of a preferred alternative. The environmental document is a disclosure document that assesses the potential impacts of the project on the environment.

<u>Project Initiation Document (PID)</u>: a report that documents the purpose, need, scope, cost, and schedule for a transportation project. The PID identifies and describes the viable alternatives to a transportation problem.

<u>Project Study Report (PSR)</u>: A report of preliminary engineering efforts, including a detailed alternatives analysis, cost, schedule, and scope information for a transportation project. A PSR also includes estimated schedule and costs for environmental mitigation and permit compliance.

Public Transportation Modernization Improvement & Service Enhancement Account (**PTMISEA**): PTMISEA was created by Proposition 1B, the Highway Safety, Traffic Reduction, Air Quality, and Port Security Bond Act of 2006. Of the \$19.925 billion available to Transportation, \$3.6 billion dollars was allocated to PTMISEA to be available to transit operators over a ten-year period. PTMISEA funds may be used for transit rehabilitation, safety or modernization improvements, capital service enhancements or expansions, new capital projects, bus rapid transit improvements, or rolling stock (buses and rail cars) procurement, rehabilitation or replacement. Funds in this account are appropriated annually by the Legislature to the State Controller's Office (SCO) for allocation in accordance with Public Utilities Code formula distributions: 50% allocated to Local Operators based on fare-box revenue and 50% to Regional Entities based on population.

Regional Improvement Program (RIP): The RIP is one of two funding programs in the State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP). The RIP receives 75% of the STIP funds and the second program, the Interregional Improvement Program receives 25% of STIP funds. RIP funds are allocated every two years by the California Transportation Commission (CTC) to projects submitted by Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) in their Regional Transportation Improvement Programs (RTIPs).

<u>Regional Surface Transportation Program (RSTP)</u>: The RSTP was established by the State of California to utilize federal Surface Transportation Program funds for a wide variety of transportation projects. The State exchanges these federal funds for less restrictive state funds to maximize the ability of local agencies to use the funds for transportation purposes including planning, construction of improvements, maintenance and operation of public streets, and pedestrian and bicycle projects.

<u>Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP)</u>: NCTC submits regional transportation projects to the California Transportation Commission (CTC) for funding in a list called the RTIP. The RTIP is a five-year program that is updated every two years. Projects in the RTIP are funded from the Regional Improvement Program (RIP).

Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee (RTMF): The Western Nevada County Regional Transportation Mitigation Fee Program was established in 2001 through a partnership of Nevada County, City of Nevada City, City of Grass Valley, and the Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC). The RTMF Program was developed to collect impact fees from new development to help fund transportation improvement projects needed to accommodate growth in the region of western Nevada County.

<u>Regional Transportation Plan (RTP)</u>: The Regional Transportation Plan has been developed to document transportation policy, actions, and funding recommendations that will meet the short- and long-term access and mobility needs of Nevada County residents over the next 20 years. This document is designed to guide the systematic development of a comprehensive multi-modal transportation system for Nevada County.

<u>Regional Transportation Planning Agency (RTPA)</u>: County or multi-county entities charged by state law in meeting certain transportation planning requirements. As the RTPA for Nevada County, NCTC coordinates transportation planning for Grass Valley, Nevada City, Nevada County, and the Town of Truckee.

<u>Request for Proposal (RFP)</u>: A document that solicits proposals, often made through a bidding process, by an agency or company interested in procurement of a commodity, service, or valuable asset, to potential suppliers to submit business proposals.

<u>Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF)</u>: There are 26 rural county Regional Transportation Planning Agencies (RTPAs) or Local Transportation Commissions represented on the Rural Counties Task Force (RCTF). The RCTF is an informal organization with no budget or staff that generally meets every other month. A member of

the CTC, usually acts as liaison to the RCTF, and CTC and Caltrans staff typically attend these meetings to explain and discuss changing statewide transportation issues that may be of concern to the rural counties.

<u>Rural Planning Assistance (RPA)</u>: Annually the 26 rural RTPAs receive state transportation planning funding, known as RPA, on a reimbursement basis, after costs are incurred and paid for using local funds.

Social Services Transportation Advisory Council (SSTAC): Consists of representatives of potential transit users including the general public, seniors and/or disabled; social service providers for seniors, disabled, and persons of limited means; local consolidated transportation service agencies; and Truckee residents who represent the senior and Hispanic communities. The SSTAC meets at least once annually and has the following responsibilities:

- To maintain and improve transportation services to the residents of Nevada County, particularly the elderly and disabled.
- Review and recommend action to the NCTC relative to the identification of unmet transit needs and advise the Commission on transit issues, including coordination and consolidation of specialized transportation services.
- Provide a forum for members to share information and concerns about existing elderly and handicapped transportation resources.

<u>State Highway Operations and Protection Program (SHOPP)</u>: The SHOPP is a four-year listing of projects prepared by Caltrans.

State Transit Assistance (STA): These funds are provided by the State for the development and support of public transportation needs. They are allocated by the State Controller's Office to each county based on population and transit performance.

State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP): The STIP is a multi-year capital improvement program of transportation projects on and off the State Highway System, funded with revenues from the Transportation Investment Fund and other funding sources. STIP programming generally occurs every two years. The STIP has two funding programs, the Regional Improvement Program and the Interregional Improvement Program.

Technical Advisory Committee (TAC): The Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) is made up of representatives of local public works and planning departments, Caltrans District 3, public airport operators, the air pollution control district, public transit operators, and the NCTC consultant engineer on retainer. Members are assigned by staff of local jurisdictions and other participating organizations. Any decisions made or actions proposed by the TAC shall be subject to the review and approval of the NCTC.

TAC responsibilities include:

- Provide technical input, assistance, and recommendations to the Commission to ensure there is comprehensive coordination and cooperation in the transportation planning process for Nevada County.
- Review and comment on comprehensive regional transportation plans for the area, which include the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP), the Regional Transportation Improvement Program (RTIP), and the Overall Work Program (OWP).
- Coordinate efforts and discussions to create and maintain circulation elements of the General Plan and specific plans of the member governments.

Transit Development Plan (TDP): Transit Development Plans study the County's transit services. They help identify transit service needs, prioritize improvements and determine the resources required for implementing modified or new service. The plans also provide a foundation for requests for State and federal funding,

Transit Services Commission (TSC): This commission oversees and advises as necessary the daily operations of the western Nevada County transit system. The TSC has the following responsibilities:

- Establish fares;
- Adopt the level of transit and paratransit services, including route structure and service areas;
- Monitor public response;
- Approve proposed purchase of additional vehicles;
- Review and approve the annual budget for transit and paratransit operations.

Transportation Development Act (TDA): The Transportation Development Act was enacted in 1971 and provides two major sources of funding for public transportation: the Local Transportation Fund (LTF) and the State Transit Assistance fund (STA). The TDA funds a wide variety of transportation programs, including planning and programming activities, pedestrian and bicycle facilities, community transit services, and public transportation projects. One of NCTC's major responsibilities is the administration of TDA funding in Nevada County.

Travel Demand Model (also Traffic Model): A computer model used to estimate travel behavior and travel demand for a specific future time frame, based on a number of assumptions. In general, travel analysis is performed to assist decision makers in making informed transportation planning decisions. The strength of modern travel demand forecasting is the ability to ask critical "what if" questions about proposed plans and policies.

Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association (TNT/TMA): The Truckee North Tahoe Transportation Management Association is dedicated to fostering public-private partnerships and resources for the advocacy and promotion of innovative solutions to the unique transportation challenges of the Truckee-North Lake Tahoe Resort Triangle. The TNT/TMA is a planning stakeholder and partner with NCTC.

Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Commission (TTALUC): The Truckee Tahoe Airport is an "intercounty" airport situated in both Nevada County and Placer County; therefore, a special ALUC with representatives from both counties was formed. Six members are selected, one each, by Placer and Nevada Counties' Board of Supervisors, City Selection Committees, and Airport Managers of each county. A seventh member is chosen by the other six members to represent the general public. NCTC authorized its staff on May 19, 2010, to provide staff support to the TTALUC.

Truckee Tahoe Airport Land Use Compatibility Plan (TTALUCP): A document referred to by the TTALUC and individuals seeking to review standards for land use planning in the vicinity of the Truckee Tahoe Airport. The plan defines compatible land uses for noise, safety, airspace protection, and overflight. The TTALUC performs consistency determinations for proposed projects in the area covered by the Compatibility Plan as needed.

<u>Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT)</u>: VMT is a metric of the total miles traveled by vehicles in a defined area over a defined period of time and is often used to estimate the environmental impacts of driving, such as Greenhouse Gases and air pollutant emissions. Factors that influence VMT include travel mode, number of trips, and distance traveled. California jurisdictions are transitioning from a Level of Service (LOS) metric to a Vehicle Miles Traveled (VMT) metric within the California Environmental Quality Act's (CEQA) transportation analysis.

<u>RECOMMENDATION</u>: Adopt Resolution 24-32 accepting the Nevada County Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan as complete.

BACKGROUND:

In April 2023, the California Air Resources Board (CARB) adopted the Advanced Clean Fleets (ACF) regulation, which requires all California municipalities to gradually transition their medium heavy-duty (MHD) fleets to zero-emission technologies. The regulation, which applies to municipalities and all other California fleets, is designed to accelerate the transition of medium and heavy-duty vehicles (over 8,500 pounds), off-road yard tractors and light-duty mail and package delivery vehicles to Zero Emission Vehicles (ZEVs). The ACF is part of California's broader strategy to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and combat climate change.

As a part of the transition process, the CARB ACF regulation requires that new MHD municipal fleet purchases be ZEVs. Designated small counties, including Nevada County, are permitted to delay implementation of ACF requirements until 2027, when 100% of new MHD fleet purchases must be ZEVs.

As a result of these regulations, Nevada County Transportation Commission (NCTC) contracted with Frontier Energy, who collaborated with Momentum, DKS Associates, and Sugarpine Engineering to develop the plan to address the complexities of fleet transition and infrastructure development for the County.

On May 14, 2024, Frontier Energy presented the draft ZEV Transition Plan to the Nevada County Board of Supervisors. Minor recommendations from that presentation were incorporated and the final plan is ready for Board approval. The following are highlights from the Nevada County staff Executive Summary:

- Nevada County will focus its initial transition on light-duty electric vehicles for the first several years of its transition to increase operational familiarity with the technology before requirements to purchase ZEVs for MHD fleet begin. And during this time, purchase one (1) class 7 (MHD) vehicle taking advantage of grants, vouchers, and tax credits.
- A three (3) phase transition (2024-2029, 2030-2034, and 2035-2053) with corresponding charging infrastructure at 16 County facilities.
- A list of recommended ZEV replacement is provided, initially focused on battery-electric vehicles (EVs) rather than hydrogen fuel cell electric vehicles (FCEVs), for the lack of hydrogen fueling facilities in the area. FCEVs will be considered beginning in 2035 with the focus of hydrogen technology on long-range and heavy-duty capacity vehicles that need fast fueling.
- 1 vehicle per plug versus multiple vehicles sharing a plug is recommended to ensure County vehicles are appropriately charged without staff supervision. Although more expensive to construct a 1:1 ratio, long term cost savings will be achieved through staff time savings and vehicles being charged and readily available for any emergent or non-emergent needs.

The plan currently estimates that the County's full transition to electric vehicles is calculated to cost an additional \$10 million above what an internal combustible engine (ICE) would cost over the 29-year transition period, without consideration of grant, voucher, and tax credit offerings. The additional cost of installing and maintaining Electric Vehicle Supply Equipment (EVSE) has not been calculated. Significant cost savings are expected from fuel and Low Carbon Fuel Standard (LCFS) credits. Total greenhouse gas reduction is expected to be over 39,000 metric tons of carbon dioxide between 2024 - 2053.

WHEREAS, Momentum, Frontier Energy, DKS Associates, and Sugarpine Engineering have produced the final Nevada County Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan, incorporating feedback provided after the draft transition plan presentation to the Nevada County Board of Supervisors on May 14, 2024; and

WHEREAS, the transition plan will take place in three phases, over 29 years, from 2024-2053; and

WHEREAS, the plan was adopted by the Nevada County Board of Supervisors on July 9, 2024; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that upon review of the Nevada County Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan prepared by Frontier Energy, the Commission accepts the documents and finds the Nevada County Zero Emission Vehicle Transition Plan complete per terms of the contract.

Enclosed is the summary schedule of State of Good Repair (SGR) program funds available to be allocated for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 for each Transportation Planning Agency (TPA), county transportation commission, and the San Diego Metropolitan Transit System for the purposes of Public Utilities Code (PUC) section 99312.1(c). Allocations for the SGR program are calculated pursuant to the distribution formulas in PUC sections 99313 and 99314. Also enclosed is a schedule detailing the estimated available amount calculated pursuant to PUC section 99314 for each TPA by operator.

PUC section 99313 allocations are based on the latest available annual population estimates from the Department of Finance. Pursuant to PUC section 99314.10, the PUC section 99314 allocations are based on the State Controller's Office (SCO) transmittal letter, Reissuance of the FY 2020-21 SGR Program Allocation Estimate, dated August 1, 2023.

According to the FY 2024-25 enacted California Budget, the estimated amount of SGR program funds budgeted is \$137,953,000. Prior to receiving an apportionment of SGR program funds in a fiscal year, an agency must submit a list of proposed projects to the California Department of Transportation (DOT). DOT reports to SCO the eligible agencies that will receive an allocation quarterly pursuant to PUC sections 99313 and 99314. SCO anticipates the first quarter's allocation will be paid by November 29, 2024. Please refer to the schedule for the amounts that relate to your agency.

Pursuant to PUC section 99314.3, each TPA is required to allocate funds to the STA-eligible operators in the area of its jurisdiction.

PARTICIPATION ON RURAL PLANNING ORGANIZATIONS OF AMERICA COUNCIL OF PEERS

NCTC's Executive Director Mike Woodman was nominated and subsequently elected on July 30, 2024, to serve as a member of the Rural Planning Organizations of America (RPO) Council of Peers representing California. The National RPO Council of Peers serves as the leadership of RPO. Members of the Council are appointed by the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) president, with the advice and consent of the NADO board, to serve a two-year term.

RPO was established in June 2006 by the NADO Board of Directors to serve as the national professional association for regional and rural transportation planning professionals, practitioners and policy officials in the field of rural and small metropolitan area transportation planning and development. The purpose of RPO America is to provide a structure through NADO, under which regional planning and development organizations can work together in cooperation with state and federal government officials in devising and implementing effective laws, policies, and programs whose principal objectives are to improve transportation infrastructure, expand regional economies, strengthen local governments, and improve both the quality of life and access to economic opportunity for all residents. The RPO Council of Peers provides advice, input and ideas to the NADO Board of Directors, transportation policy task force, and management.

Established in 1967, NADO provides federal advocacy, education, research, and training for the nation's regional planning and economic development organizations, including the emerging network of nonmetropolitan regional transportation planning organizations (RTPOs). The association and its members promote regional strategies, partnerships, and solutions to strengthen the economic competitiveness and quality of life across America's local communities.

NCTC 2024 ANNUAL COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENT

NCTC's Compensation Policy adopted by Resolution 22-30 on July 20, 2022, includes the provision that NCTC will adjust its salary ranges annually, as budget allows, by the average cost of living increase provided by the local labor market for the journey level planner classification.

In August, staff received the final cost of living adjustments (COLA) provided by the local jurisdictions for the local labor market:

- County of Nevada: 3.0%
- City of Grass Valley: 0.0%
- City of Nevada City: 4.0%

The average of the labor market increases for 2024 is 2.33%. NCTC's Executive Director determined that there are adequate revenues in the budget to apply the COLA increase for Fiscal Year 2024/25, effective retroactive to July 1, 2024, for all NCTC employees. The NCTC Compensation Policy also provides that NCTC will conduct a comprehensive review of its compensation with comparison to other similar Regional Transportation Planning Agencies approximately every five years to ensure wages and compensation remain competitive, which is scheduled to next occur in 2026.
